

Raw transcript of interview:

Graham and John Speak with Alan Novak about the SA victory for vaccine injuries...

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Well, G'day everyone. And welcome to another episode of Club Grubbery. We're putting this one out quickly. This is a show that has just eventuated in the last five minutes for obvious reasons, Wednesday, January 31. And we'll post this one tonight, Johnny. Be great to have you back on again, mate. Mike, great to be here.

And, uh, yeah, some exciting news. Yeah, it is. And it's all happening and some people are aware of it already. We're going to be talking about issues in South Australia and we have joining us. A prominent figure in, uh, freedom circles in South Australia and Adelaide in particular. We have Alan Novak. Great to have you with us, Alan.

Thanks Graeme and John. Good to be here. And we thank you so much for the work that you've done. You've done a lot of organizing. You organized a Seymour Hatcher and you're always organizing events and, uh, speaking at them in the Adelaide area. And, uh, we met, I think it was at Gammaracka? No, I didn't actually attend that, Graham.

So we've never, I've never shaken your hand in person. But next time you come to Adelaide, you're more than welcome to come and stay with me and my wife. That'd be lovely, mate. That'd be lovely. And yeah, you look very familiar to me, but obviously we've looked at a lot of the same things. But it's great to have you on.

And, um, and before we go to that, uh, some news items. First of all, I want to say to anybody who's been trying to join the Hoodies Heroes Network, And you've been rejected it's because there's been a computer glitch in the social media structure. And we ask you now to, that's all been rectified. Please don't take offense.

You, it was done automatically by, uh, by AI. And we ask you now to go back, answer the questions, and tick all the necessary boxes. We'd love to have you on board at Hoodies Heroes. So please do that. I can assure you from our team it's all been rectified. Um, Johnny, interesting issues happening. Once again, Gerard Rennick posting something here.

Yeah, Gerard Rannock, he's all over everything, isn't he, uh, he says the nation's top public health agency did not send an alert on COVID 19 vaccines and heart inflammation because officials were concerned they would cause panic, according to an email that's been obtained by the Epoch Times.

So in order to protect everybody and get everybody protected, they decided to withhold information that would cause them to panic because the protection might be worse than the disease. I mean, in the light of all these, uh, court cases, Woody, uh, these, these people will be shown to be absolutely, uh, criminally, um, um, implicated here.

This is an absolute disgrace. It's like, um, a restaurant owner not going out to tell his patrons that he's just found salmonella in the fish because he doesn't want to panic them and letting them eat it anyway. Anyway. Hmm. Uh, no, it doesn't pass the pub test or having a tour bus full of, uh, people with peanut allergies, uh, turn up at a Thai restaurant and giving them the, uh, the sardine chicken.

As I said, when I had that, uh, back and forth with Daniel Nino, when I brought up all these adverse events, he basically, he, he actually stated, he goes, um, for the small percentage of severe reactions, it's price worth paying. So here's a cardiologist that, you know, I guess. Well, I wonder if Daniel Nino would think that if the

children that he vaccinated his own children, uh, whether he'd think that, um, yeah, well, there's a lot of things can be said about that, but the less said the better I think about our friend Daniel Nino, but we love you, Daniel, and you're entitled to your opinions, but anyway, let's move on from there.

Um, so much going on in the world today. Um. We, uh, we're on the brink of a whole bunch of stuff happening at the moment. Uh, the Canberra rally going ahead. Um, we've had some interviews. We just posted, um, Wade Northousen's, uh, uh, promotion of the, of the rally. Looking forward to seeing some people there. Uh, we're looking forward to, uh, speaking to a lot of people there.

We won't, we won't, we're not participating in any other aspect other than we're going to be there with the thousands we hope will turn up. But, uh, looking forward to that. Um, it is clear. It is crystal clear from the new D. A. N., D. A. E. N. data that Sharon Cousins has been putting out just how severe are the reactions and it's frustrating, uh, I'm talking about the, uh, the clot shot.

It's frustrating to hear commentators still on the ABC and others saying on the very rare event of a reaction. Now, uh, Brad from the Kelly Hotel. Uh, has been saying to us, the Kelly Hotel, sadly is a meeting place for wakes of funerals that happen in the Hunter Valley. It's one of the go to places where guys go to and people go to say goodbye to their loved ones and celebrate their life.

Um, from what we're getting from Brad, it's, it's like a monthly event is awake at the Kelly Hotel once a month has been the norm. And what we're hearing now that it's kind of like every day. Uh, and these are young men who are dying, young men and women, but people ranging from their twenties into their late forties.

And nobody's asking the question, but Brad is, Brad's saying what's going on. He's asking of his patrons, what do you think's happening? And everyone's saying, Oh no, it's just might be climate change or something like that. I mean, be honest, everybody. Uh, you know, somebody or know of somebody who has died or been severely injured by this vaccine.

Um, and, uh, you know it and the world knows it, but nobody's talking about it until now, because in a recent landmark case in South Australia, I think January 15. The, um, the courts have awarded damages to a man who suffered a vaccine injury as a result of being forced to do so by his employer, now causing the employer to pay compensation, which is sending shockwaves through corporations and organizations who have applied mandates for their staff to get vaccinated.

And I think we should go to you straight away now, Alan, and ask. Tell us a little bit more about that case and what you know about it and what's been happening, happening in Adelaide since Gerard Rennick has raised it, uh, has done a great job raising the issue. And this is an issue we've got to forward because it's actually good news for our cause.

Well, the gentleman's name is Daniel Shepherd. He's 44 and he worked for Baptist care is the article that I read about it. So again, a Christian organization that was, uh, forcing these. Vaccines on their staff with, um, such callousness. Um, I actually took on Lutheran education, uh, on behalf of the teachers at one point back in 2022.

And I spoke to John Proby. He was the head of Lutheran schools in Northern Territory, South Australia and WA and spoke to him on the phone. He was, I was respectful to him and he was respectful, respectful back to me. And he seemed like a decent man, but as I really delved into it, I had a lot of teachers contacting me.

Sorry, I'm going just a little bit off track, but um, um, one of the most starkest cases is this teacher that contacted me and she worked in rural South Australia. Now she had an immediate reaction with her heart after the first jab and it was documented from a doctor that it was 100 percent from the vaccine and she had an exemption.

Now the exemption was running out and Lutheran education were applying pressure to her to have the second jab. Not kidding you, she had a heart monitor on her. Um, the doctor that originally gave her that exemption was too scared to give her another exemption and she was going to be fired from Lutherans.

And it wasn't. Well, it was for the, uh, 11th hour, um, intervention by another doctor to give her another exemption that she was able to keep working without having a second injection. So, this case, you know, with the Baptist care and. And what they've done to this young man and then, and then fighting it in court and trying to basically get out of compensating him, it's just hideous to me, especially that it's coming from Christian organizations, so called.

Well, we shouldn't be surprised given that a lot of Christian organizations caught up in the, uh, the, uh, institutional responses to childhood sexual abuse. uh, Royal Commission are still yet to compensate the victims that they've been ordered to compensate. So look, we, we know there's a lot of ethical and moral issues going on inside, uh, corporatized religion around the world at the moment, especially around the abuse of children.

So we shouldn't be amazed. And it's, it's another clear instance. That churches and states should not be combining in any way at all. In fact, the churches should be keeping the state honest, but that's a story for another time relating very much to our Commonwealth of Australia constitution, which was bounded on good principles that have been ignored.

Um, but now what, what's happening in Adelaide as a result of this case, mate, what, what's going on in South Australia? Are you getting much, uh, people talking about this? Well, they are. And so ABC radio this morning, which is the reason why I contacted you, um, had a, um, a program on this morning and they were discussing the case and, uh, the Attorney General for South Australia, Kayem Mayer, came on the program.

And of course, in the first couple of sentences, he, um, stated that, well, of course, these, uh, events are extremely rare. And, um, that just incenses me now. You know, I mean, I mean, it's just ridiculous. And here we have like the Danes, the TGA Danes database. So under the provisional approval process and the strict guidelines, they were going to accept rolling data.

So the very people that we entrusted to make sure they were monitoring that database on a daily basis are clearly not doing their job. And that was part of the original provisional approval guidelines. Um, there's over 16,000 cardiac work. Disorders on the TGA Danes database. There's close to 5,000 myocarditis and pericarditis, you know, um, three of my young friends have all three of those conditions, um, including POTS and two of them, um, I was able to get on the stage and they told their stories at the SEMA Ultra event here, Danny Morgan and Joanna Moore, um, brave kids, but they're in their 20s and navigating this, you Well, the, the, the medical system that is almost pitted against them and, you know, until they find good doctors, which they have now.

And, um, thankfully they're showing some signs of improvement now, which is, um, well, it's very encouraging for me and a big sense of relief, but that these people continue to, um, state that these events are rare is just beyond comprehension now. And we know that that's not the case. And so we really need to use our voices collectively.

The ABC has a. I text phone in line so I posted that on Guardian South Australia and as well as my own Action for Humanity and Healing group, and it's had a pretty robust response. I believe there's probably been 150 text messages sent already to ABC radio and we want to shake them up, make them nervous, and hopefully we're going to achieve that and I think that you know the more that we share this, I'd like to see it go viral and ABC get 10,000 text messages.

Absolutely, and I was just looking down there while you were talking because I was looking for the data from that, uh, DAEN's, uh, site. I just couldn't get it at the moment. I'm having a few internet issues here, but the numbers clearly state, Johnny Larder, that this is not, these are not rare events. I mean, you know, this is, this is not, uh, the 30,000 bottle of claret, is it, that's a rare, A rare find in somebody's cellar somewhere.

This is happening to everyday people every day in Australia. Yeah, well, you judge that hoodie by those that you speak to on a daily basis. And I don't know of, of many people, uh, in, in Australia today that wouldn't have a friend or a loved one or somebody that they know indirectly, uh, that has been affected in some way by these vaccines.

It, it, it, it just beggars belief that we're still having this, you know, debate. I mean, it's, it's, it's absolutely bringing this country to its knees. I mean, whether it be, I mean, we're still going through this nonsense where the economy and, uh, people are, uh, are kept out of a workplace for seven days because of a positive test, rat test, asymptomatic, can't work, can't go to work.

I mean, what is that doing? Uh, to, to the economy. I mean, do these people have sick leave? I mean, if they do have sick leave, uh, are they, are they able to be replaced? Uh, who is, uh, who's funding all this? I mean, it, it just is absolutely ridiculous for a cult. I mean, we used to go to, we used to go to work with a cult.

I mean, you tell me someone that didn't go to work with a cult. It, it, it happened all the time. And here we've got this excuse. I mean, it's almost like a, uh, Get outta jail card free. I've got Covid. I can't come to work. See you in seven days. Uh, but look, I I, I really think the, uh, the big issue here, uh, guys is, uh, where, where this leads to, because I mean, this is dealing with an injury that is visible.

I mean, but we, we both know, uh, that, uh, the injuries are not so visible. Uh, people have, uh, been struck down by this nonsense. Uh, in so many other ways, whether it be from financial situation, uh, whether it be, um, a social situation, whether they've ended up having a divorce or, uh, they're not speaking to members of the family, they're not able to go and say goodbye to their parents at a nursing home.

I mean, the, the extent of this. This, uh, has been so much worse. The injuries, the impacts are real, uh, they're not always visible, but they're there, uh, mental health issues for one. So I think this is Pandora's box now, uh, that this tribunal has ruled in this manner. And the fact that the ABC are covering it is, uh, I think a good thing.

Right. So, um, you're right. People have got a text or get in touch with open line and just bombard them. Um, if you know somebody. Uh, who is vaccine injured or has lost a loved one because of vaccine injury or perhaps that's you let them know that you are over being told that this is a rare event. I mean, good grief.

Um, and, you know, and please guide them to some of the interviews that we've done, particularly, uh, Professor Angus Dalglish from, uh, St. George's Hospital in London, uh, one of the world's leading oncologists who said that oncologists around the world are now terrified at the data they're seeing of, of turbo cancers and people having, uh, coming straight out of remission into aggressive cancers.

It's never been seen. And these guys have done the pathology and they know it's been caused by this shot. Uh, it doesn't deserve to be called a vaccine and it shouldn't be called a jab because that minimizes, you know, it's just a jab. Don't worry about it. This is a death shot to a lot of people. Now some people have gotten away with no side effects, that's okay, maybe they got the different batches or, there are lots of reasons why people don't seem to be getting it, and, and a lot are, uh, and that's all the more reason why this should be stopped immediately and investigated so that we can, we can ascertain what's causing all this so we can move forward with confidence.

But there is no confidence anymore. People who allow themselves to go through these procedures are just playing Russian roulette. Alan, that surely. Oh, yeah. And these are our friends. They're our family. There are our colleagues. And, you know, I say that when you're if you're going to send a text message, just write really respectfully and don't use curse words.

Speak from the heart and we can speak from the heart and you have to try and reach these people. Um, and, and find some sort of sense of humanity that's left in them because you know, like the TGA Danes, I think it tapered off at 140, 000 events. And I think that's more reflection now that there's very few people getting any more shots.

But now we're seeing what's even more frightening is that two years down the track, we're seeing these turbo cancers and sudden deaths. Um, they're not from recent shots in many cases, and that's probably the most frightening of all, but, um, we just have to do our part and continue to stand in our truth, and, um, that's easy for me.

I, like, I think a lot of people are getting sort of weary and full of despair, and even myself sometimes, and I've sent so many emails, but Um, after after every email I send, I hit the send button and I feel a sense of relief because I know that I've done my part. I know that in the test of time, my kids, my grandkids are going to know where I stood and that I tried my damndest to awaken other people and to and speak to the hearts of those that we trusted in the past.

And I, I think that we, that's all we can do. That's all we can do. And keep, keep going forward because, um, these things are happening and they're going to continue to happen. And, um, we just have to keep standing. I know this gets tiring for people. We're looking for solutions too. And there's plenty of those around, including the one we're talking about now.

Be proactive and contact your local ABC and tell them your story. I think the brick, sorry John, I think the, the damn wall we've been chipping away and chipping away at it and I see something like this as an opportunity, particularly with that texting line at the ABC radio is. We're going to pull two or three bricks out of that wall in one foul swoop there.

And, you know, and eventually that wall is coming down. We know that, and this is just going to expedite that. We'll put some links in the comments about how you can do that with the numbers and so on to contact the ABC. Um, you sent them a message today, Alan, have you got it there handy to read to people?

Because I think it really touched my heart. Oh, that was the letter I wrote to the, uh, Attorney General, but yeah, I'm happy to read that, Graham. I'll put my glasses on. This is again, you know, it doesn't take me a long time to write these. Um,

uh, so, Dear Kayem, I listened to you on ABC Radio this morning. I'm curious where you get your data from in regards specifically to the comment that these incidences are very rare. I know three kids in their 20s with various forms of heart ailments post vaccination. If you'd like to speak to them, contact me.

I know several adults with varying degrees of injuries, some of them very severe. Of course, these are just all anecdotal. I like to deal with hard facts. The TGA Danes was set up to closely monitor the vaccine rollout. Under the provisional approval guidelines, it was clearly stated that because the process of the approval was so expedited, they would have to accept rolling data.

There's over 16, 000 cases of heart or cardiac events. There's over 5, pericarditis. See attached and note that this was up to June 2023. So I've always monitored the TGA Danes and I'd take snapshots and put down a bunch of data. This certainly does not seem rare to me, or I certainly would not use those words, especially if I was in a position of authority like yourself.

We have excess mortality at levels not witnessed since World War II. It seems that all of the people we trusted are just completely ignoring so much misery and pain, but also unrefuted evidence. Is it a wonder so many of us are just frustrated beyond comprehension? I am a good citizen. I'm a good man.

I'm a father. I'm a grandfather and I'm a Christian and I'm praying people like you will find some courage and start acknowledging what is happening in this country. And for that matter, globally, says it all. That says it all. And it says it all in a respectful way. And, um, you know, I want to draw attention to a program on the ABC that started screening on Monday night at eight o'clock.

The program is called Nemesis. Now, I'm not promoting the ABC at all, but, um, I've, I've been a viewer of ABC Eyeview for many years. I like some of the documentaries that come out on there and, and, um, I used to look at it. I used to watch Q and A for a laugh. I couldn't believe how left wing that program was, but every now and then there's some really great stuff that comes out.

And Nemesis is about the relationship and the events that unfolded within the Liberal Party in Canberra during the reign of Tony Abbott. And it examines the roles of Tony Abbott, Scott Morrison and Malcolm Turnbull and others in the parliament. They interview a lot of prominent figures. Uh, Russell Broadbent is interviewed, a frequent visitor on our program acquits himself beautifully, but I've got to tell you, uh, after an hour 40 of the first episode, you will be disgusted at the smarmy sneering, uh, deceitful way that our politicians work.

And it is clear from watching it. That when you look at the inner workings of Parliament House, these scumbags, and I use it, I don't use the term loosely. Some of these scumbags are in it for the sport of the backroom deals that are going on. They're not interested in their constituents at all. It's all a political game within a political game.

I, I commend everybody to watch it because it gives you a clear picture of what's going on and why we're in this mess in this country. And the Labor Party went through it with Rudd, Gilard Rudd. There's a program also in, in the ABC archives about that. Are the same machinations happening in the same, the same group.

These guys are all in the same club. They all eat at the same dinner table. They all sleep in the same bed and it's the light night of the long knives. And if anyone thinks it's not about to happen to Anthony Albanese, he is writing, uh, writing the bottom out of the barrel. Um, we're in for a shock. This stuff is going on all the time.

It's all about who's going to unseat who and who's going to play this game on that person and who's going to keep this secret and that secret. We now already know that sin and evil thrives when people keep secrets and misinformation and disinformation and, um, conspiracy theories, as they call them, are left to flourish because governments do not tell the truth.

And you're quiet when you watch this program. It is absolutely disgusting. It's not often I recommend the ABC to anybody, but watch the program Nemesis. And telling John is the fact that the ABC approached Tony Abbott to appear on that program and he refused. And they made comment about that at the beginning.

That's the first time that a prime minister has refused. But Tony Abbott has agreed to come on Club Grubbery, which gives you an idea of the standard. Uh, and the difference in the standards between Australia's national broadcaster and a little old club grubbery, which is starting to kick goals all around the world.

So Tony Abbott, you'll be respected on this program. Um, we, we want to talk frankly with you. We're looking forward to that. Just waiting for you and John to tidy up the details for that to be scheduled. Also want to report to a lot of people watching us that. We are currently negotiating some interviews that are absolutely outstanding.

These are world class interviews with people who are on the world stage in a very, very big way in 2024. Um, I'm itching to tell you, but we'll leave it until the first one in a series that we're about to broadcast happens in the next couple of weeks. So stay watching and please support Club Grubbery.

This is, um, some of this will be world changing stuff, I can assure you. So many more things to discuss. Um, Alan, uh, thank you for, um, for standing up and continuing to spread the word. And I like the T-shirt you're wearing. If anyone's not reading the light, Australia get amongst issue number 10 out now, John.

Yeah. And, uh, proudly, uh, on, uh, on the counters in drifter shops too. And I think Drift is still sending them out in the merchandise, which is really good. And you can purchase them if you want to, uh, buy a few extras to, uh, to put in letter boxes yourself. Absolutely. On those politicians, Graham, I, I wanted to just mention too, like, um,

I've had quite a few encounters with some, um, most notably was Stephen Marshall just after he lost the election.

I, um, confronted him on a flight from Adelaide to Brisbane, he was sitting right in front of me. And, uh, that's all recorded, actually. It's on YouTube and it quickly got over 5,000 views, but he, um, you know, when, when confronted, and I was just talking about, like, why wasn't the public just notified of boosting their vitamin D levels?

Because Ian Brighthope was talking about how important that is. And when he got frustrated, he just said, I'm out of it now, mate. Tell somebody who cares. Just typical politician. I, uh, Amanda Richworth is in my, um, she's the MP, federal MP. She's in my local constituent and um, I managed to get her on the phone and I started telling her about my young friends with vaccine injuries and she was all like seeming genuinely concerned and showing an ounce of humanity and I said, Well, great.

Would you mind having a conversation with them because they're not able to access the vaccine compensation scheme. Um, the criteria is so tight. So like some of the Yeah. Adverse events, they're not listed. If they're not listed, well, you, you don't, you don't qualify. And if you didn't stay overnight in the hospital, you don't qualify.

And she was quite shocked to hear this and didn't know much about it. Promised that she was going to phone my friends. Of course, she never did. And then when I challenged her on Facebook, because I could no longer reach her, she blocked me. So Amanda Rishworth, I can type her name in on Facebook. It doesn't exist.

SA Health did the same to me when they were putting up bogus figures for COVID cases, um, blocked me as well. Um, typical politicians, when are we going to find a hero politician or more heroes like Alex Antic and Gerard Rennick and, um, several others, you know, Ralph Babbitt? Malcolm Roberts. I mean, they're there.

They are there. I mean, Alex Sandek is a standout in South Australia and more power to him. Um, love to see Gerard Rennick getting the kind of support Alex is getting in South Australia from Liberals in Queensland and more reason why people should join the Liberal Party. Um, Alex Antic is really kicking some serious butt with that, that whole process and, uh, it doesn't cost a lot of money to be in that party.

If you want an opposition to become a credible government that stands for you and your rights, then maybe we've got to work with the parties that are already there, uh, to, to give them some meat to go forward. But Stephen Marshall, what a comment. Uh, tell someone who cares, I don't, I'm out of it now. Well, you shouldn't have been in it in the first place, you grub, you grub.

I mean, I followed him, I followed him up the air bridge filming all the way and halfway across the airport till he almost started crying through his mask and then scurried back to the bathroom. At which point I said, are you a man or a mouse? Come on, squeak up. And he just ignored you, eh? Oh, yeah. You're, you're harassing me now.

You're harassing the cheese factory. A rat in the cheese factory. Look, if you're going to say, I'm out of it now, tell someone who cares. You shouldn't have been there in the first place. Hmm. Absolutely hard to be there. You know, Russell Broadbent has got 14 months left to go and he's out of it. Uh, he could say, oh, well, I'll just cruise from now on.

And he's getting more active than he ever was. You know, representing the seat of Monash for the Liberal Party in Victoria, federally. Um, Russell Broadbent, you're a champion. You're a decent human being. And these are the people who are being boosted, booted out like Gerard Rennick. These, uh, Dutton needs to make a decision on, on Rennick.

He needs, he really needs to, because this guy's a powerhouse in, uh, in tax reform and, and financial management, it should be, it should be on the front bench. Um, but no, no, the, the factions are dealing with that the way that they do putting in the popular figures there. I mean, we saw Craig Kelly ousted out of the Liberal Party for speaking a truth that's well known now.

He should have been lauded. Absolutely. He should have been lauded. And now he's, he's, um, he's been kicked out. I mean, Russell Broadbent kicked out. Um, I, I challenged David Spears, the Liberal opposition leader here in South Australia at a forum for the Liberal party on why he wasn't going to go to the defense of all these nurses and doctors in South Australia.

And he, he said to me, point blank, that he still thinks there would be broad public support for mandates. And this was like six months ago, you guys. Six months ago, I was like, what? There's, there's zero rationale for that now whatsoever. And, you know, 300 nurses all received, um, letters on their files of gross misconduct.

And meanwhile, on the news, almost nightly, we see hospital shortages or ambulance ramping. But here we have 300 highly trained, skilled professionals that could go back in and probably relieve a large part of that pressure. But instead, SA Health, tyrants that they are, um, actually sacked a lot of them.

It's, it's, it, I want to shake people till their teeth rattle out of their head. Well, we're going to continue to do that, and that's what we do. And for those of you who think that, um, you know, what's the point? Don't, don't fall into that trap. You're actually winning. You are actually winning. We are gaining more and more traction every single day and these things are causing discomfort and discomfort leads to scratching and scratching leads to bleeding and before you know it you've got a wound that's open that needs to be healed and that's how we change the country.

So don't give up. Don't give up and, and, you know, look at these victories as they are and see them for what they are. And we're going to keep fighting. It's just, you know, don't be depressed about, you know, oh, there's never any good news. There's a lot of good news out there. And every day the sun comes up and every afternoon the sun goes down and what you did yesterday got you to today.

So, you know, hang in there, everybody. You're worth it. You're valuable. You're, um, You know, we should be loving each other in this country because we're all intrinsically required to keep each other going in a sense of community that they're trying to take from us. So don't let them do it. Um, I think that's a good note to probably pray it out.

I don't know how you feel about it, Alan. Do you want to pray us out tonight? Uh, you do, you go for it, Graham. All right, okay. Lord, Father in heaven, we just want to thank you, Lord, that um, that those of us who have faith and believe in you are comfortable knowing that you are in control. Others will say, well, when's he going to show up?

He's there. Believe me, this has been a character development exercise and everything about faith and about humanity is about developing our character from the womb to the grave. A great book.
