

Raw transcript of interview:

Graham and John reflect on Australia Day 2024...

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G'day everyone, Thursday the 25th of January and this one will be going straight out after we do it. Johnny, great to see you on, mate. How are you? I couldn't be better and great to see you too, Woody. Yeah, it's a good, uh, a good day when we can face each other and, uh, we're going to be, we're going to be doing that soon in Canberra in person, mate, in the flesh.

And it's always better when we get together and do a couple of shows like that. We have a bit of a fun and a bit of giggle and whatever. And, uh, we're going to be talking about, uh, happenings in Canberra of February over the next few days. But, um, before we get into that now, um, some news items, Johnny.

What is going on about Australia Day? What is going on about Australia Day, Hoody? I, I don't know. I think, uh, this country's just lost its, uh, lost its way, really. Uh, we've got the CEO of Cricket Australia that doesn't want to acknowledge Australia Day. We've got this idiot at Woolworths, um, doesn't want to sell any thongs.

And then, uh, we've got Tennis Australia. They're happy to, uh, put on their calendar that, uh, Pride Day's on the 25th, but now acknowledgement of, uh Australia Day on the 26th.

What is going on? I mean, surely, you know, every Australian would have to sit there and say, well, hang on. Despite the arguments either way, they're sick and tired of these corporations doing all this social engineering. It's not their role. It's not their role to change the culture of the country. Well, I think sadly, Hoody, um, they've been, uh, Morrison's, Morrison's set the pace on this, hasn't he?

Uh, he, he certainly allowed these corporations to, um, play a role in, in everyday life in Australia that, uh, should, should not be, uh, allowed. It should, uh, be frowned upon. Um, and so did Kevin Rudd. I mean, Kevin Rudd was all that stuff as well, wasn't he? I mean, John, look, you, you know what? They are slapping.

A majority of everyday Australians in the face, they are slapping them in the face. They do not deserve our business. Well, I tell you, it makes me sick hoodie when these corporates get involved in these, uh, political debates, these, whatever you want to call them, uh, like the voice, et cetera. When you, when you know the plight of people under the care of Daniel Cinzio and others, uh, that are camping.

Um, in, in hostile conditions. It's, I don't know how else you'd describe it. Third world stuff. Uh, we've got 400 plus million to throw at things like that. These corporates are throwing money left, right, and center to promote their woke agendas, uh, to make, I don't know who feel good, but anyway, it's just a complete waste of corporate money.

Uh, that could be going to good causes, uh, like Daniel Cinzia. Well. Um, Daniel has just been in touch with me and, um, I believe Malcolm Roberts is on the case now, but Daniel Sincio, everyone should remember that we did that in a couple of interviews with Daniel. He's been feeding the homeless people sleeping in their cars.

And Michelle and I spent Christmas Day with Daniel and a dozen or so of those people trying to give him a bit of Christmas cheer and a bush picnic. And, um, and, um, a lot of these people are in this position because of what the government's done in the last three years. Uh, we're seeing, um, you know, we're seeing greed on behalf of property owners sending rents through the roof.

There's a housing crisis in Australia that this Government talks about, but doesn't seem willing to do anything. I mean, immediately about it. I mean, people are sleeping with their, in their cars and those people have got kids. They've lost their jobs because of mandates. They lost their homes, their properties.

They can't afford any rent. They're sleeping in their cars. The councils have been up to date, allowing them to stay in certain areas and not bothering them too much. Department of Child Protection comes in and takes their kids off them. I mean, we've talked about this on previous shows. And these kids are whisked away from their parents.

Now, the Christmas day that we spent with those people, Michelle called Daniel and said, Hey, how many kids are going to be there? Because we've got some toys we want to give to the kids. And he said, none. And she said, why? He said, because all the kids have been taken from them. Now, right now, 25th of January, we are three and a half hours from welcoming in the 26th, which is our Australia Day.

And I believe the Logan City Council tomorrow will be sending in a task force. To move on hundreds of people who are sleeping in their cars from a certain area. Daniel's aware of that. Um, this is the last thing these people need. It is the last thing they need. A heavy handed local government coming in to move people on.

Now we've either got compassion for it, for these people, or we haven't. And anybody in the Logan Shire or any Shire for that matter, should be ringing their council and saying, if you're going to take any action. In this homeless situation, relax some restrictions on people who've got acreage to allow them to put tiny homes on and caravans on and let people come and live on their properties until this housing crisis is sorted.

Do something tangible. Instead of getting heavy handed, actually think about what can we do to help these people be accommodated in other areas. Because as it stands tomorrow, As you and I are talking right now, there is an organization getting ready to go in and wholesale move on a whole bunch of people who've got nowhere to live on Australia Day, Johnny.

No wonder they don't want to recognize Australia Day because who want to be proud of that? Tell you what, Hootie, doesn't it make a mockery of that CEO sleep out program? Exactly. Exactly. You couldn't make that stuff up. Couldn't make it up. Tennis Australia having a Pride Day. They're trying to cancel Anzac Day.

They're trying to cancel Australia Day. Now because of the um, the whole gender fluidity movement, maybe they better cancel Father's Day and Mother's Day. Why not go the whole hog? Let's strip us of every, everything that made us Australian. Now I, I agree that, you know, that, um, ultra nationalism can be very ugly and it should be frowned upon.

I don't think there's a place in society for ultra nationalism. But, a bit of national pride has carried us through a whole lot of dark times in this country. I'll tell you what, it carried me through the last two years and I know it did you. Yeah. I just can't believe this rubbish, John. Well, it's hard to believe too, Hoody, that these sporting elites that people look up to in times of darkness, you know, because they get a bit of a lift from cricket team doing well or the football team doing well, socceros, um, I mean, to have them carrying on with all this white nonsense.

It is beyond belief if they're not, if they're not happy to it, they should hand their, hand their badges in. Hand the baggy green in. If you're an Australian cricketer and you're going along with this, you don't deserve to wear the baggy green. What would John Bradman do? Look, I'm just, I love this country, John, like you do, but sometimes there are days like today when I'm ashamed to call myself Australian.

I'm just ashamed. And um, and you know what? I've seen a lot of messaging from Aboriginal people who are saying the same thing. I think it's wrong. Sure. Look, we saw that. Remember the Australia Day riots in Cronulla years ago, when a bunch of drunken yobbos got into fights with, you know, some of these Middle Eastern gangs from Western Sydney and they took it to Cronulla beach.

It was ugly. That was horrible. And that's the kind of ultra nationalism that doesn't serve anybody any good. But tomorrow is the day where we celebrate what used to be a great nation and can still be a great nation. I mean, it's crazy. And here we are, another news item today from that woke garbage, the ABC.

I cannot believe it, John. It's one of their top stories today. This is as it reads on their website. It's a health story. Heat waves and cyclones are affecting the health of unborn babies in Australia, experts say. Our changing climate may compromise the health of our babies before they've even exited the womb.

There's growing evidence extreme temperatures and natural disasters are linked to premature births, stillbirths, and even abnormal gestational weight and, and, um, size, sorry, abnormal gestational weight and size in many parts of the world, including Australia. And with the global temperatures on the up and up, and natural disasters becoming more frequent, the World Health Organization says mothers and their babies are in danger.

Mothers and their babies have been in danger since the pandemic. And the, the proof is there for everyone to see. So here we have another smoke screen. To cover up one agenda and promote another and they believe, do they really believe that the people of the world are that stupid? And that from our own ABC.

I've got to put it on for me. Here she is. Here she is. Put her on mate. Put her on. Here we go.

They're clowns at the ABC. Clowns at the ABC. They need a psychiatric assessment. I mean, if, how could you write that nonsense? That is just complete and utter garbage. Who's fact checking that? Experts say. Well, go and speak to, uh, Dr. Luke McClindon, who is now selling sheds. See what he thinks of that. Yeah, Dr.

Luke McClindon, the, uh, former head of obstetrics and gynecology at Brisbane's world class mater hospital, who was fired because he published statistics from his own client cohort to say that these vaccinated women were having major issues. A 73 percent increase in failed pregnancies. And when he presented his case to the hospital board, they fired him.

What's he doing now? He's selling sheds and bagolas.

And you know, like tomorrow night, our, our, our beautiful family here at Club Grubber, you're going to be watching Steve Kirsch, the interview we shot with Steve, what an amazing interview that was and the common sense statistics that he puts out there. Make it very clear that this is a massive coverup.

This, like we have a cyclone every week. That's got to put a lot of kids in jeopardy, hasn't it? We're about to have our second cyclone in North Queensland. Um, you know, for goodness sake, the picture behind me, John, is at Cairns airport, which recently flooded. I've never seen it flooded. There was massive rain out of that last cyclone we had.

But those aircraft that, you know, I was a pilot on one of those. Every time a cyclone came, we used to mount up and fly those things to Mount Isa. So they weren't destroyed on the, in the winds. And that was back in the eighties. Now, I remember when, uh, I remember when there was a heat wave in Sydney and you'd wait for the big southerly buster to come in.

You remember the southerly buster? It still comes. Uh, but when the, um, when the heat wave was on, this is how the news reported it. Uh, Big heatwaves hit Sydney and massive crowds at Bondi Beach making the most of a day in the water. That's how they, that's how they broadcast it. Now, what do they do? You see ambulances with sirens and ramping up at hospitals and they're blaming the heat for that.

I mean, come on, come on. Uh, if we have a 36 or 37 degree day in the cities. Um, you know, and, and Dr. Willie Soon was on, uh, Tucker Carlson, uh, Professor Willie Soon, a Harvard 35 year, uh, 35 year veteran of Harvard University is professor in, uh, geophysics and astrophysics. He said, um, it's all garbage. It's all garbage.

The temperature changes have been caused by sunspot activity. Um, they, they've got the data on that and yet they're making up this whole story. But now the mainstream media are turning every weather event into a major disaster. And now a cyclone is going to cause our children to be born unwell. Well, I'm just waiting for the volcano to erupt down the road here.

Can't be too far away, can it, Woody? I'll be reporting on that shortly. Yeah, you've got one on your doorstep living in the Alps. We've got one on our doorstep. We've got Mount Warning just up the road. Um, I mean, it's just crazy, John. But anyway, let's get on to matters. Uh, Canberra, um, that big crowd behind you, that was great.

Now look, there's, there's a bunch of farmers, uh, who have got real concerns. Now their concerns are about, there's five or six issues that they're concerned about and they're all rallying in Canberra. There's several convoys coming of farmers to Canberra to be there on the 6th. And, um, yeah, I remember us talking a lot, John, that, um, that a lot of the people who slept through COVID would wake up when other issues happened.

That's what we're seeing with this particular rally. A lot of Australians who perhaps didn't see any, any, uh, disaster happening around the COVID mandates are now upset about things like, um, um, the rising cost of electricity, renewable energy, uh, water rights. Uh, the decline of agriculture in Australia, uh, the restrictions being placed on them by bureaucracy.

All these things are bringing more people out of the woodwork. So we're likely to see a big crowd of people with a whole fresh outlook that perhaps weren't there in that photo behind you. And we want to encourage them. We want to encourage them and good on them. The organizers of that group, uh, heading to Canberra and not only them, there's a group called the, uh, national, let me get it.

I've got to get it right. The NRA, uh, who, uh, organizing the rally called the reckless renewables rally. It's happening on the same day. And these guys. The

NRAAA, anyhow,

you know what I mean, they're going to be there as well. So there's going to be, there's going to be a couple of rallies sort of coming together on the same day. And it's bringing people from all over the place and we've got to support our farmers. Yeah, say that this whole renewable energy thing and this, this, um, this, uh, you know, this zero carbon neutral by 2030.

I mean, that's only, that's like a few days away. Let's face it in a, the way things travel. None of this stuff is gonna work. Yeah. I mean, in a town near it, excuse me. In a town near me, small town, they put in a small electric vehicle charging station. Next to the creek where the swimming pool is, which floods every year.

It was suggested, why don't you put it up on the hill, which is near the cafe. So when people are waiting for hours to get their cars charged up and queuing up, because there's only one charge point, they can at least go and have a coffee. No, they put it in a flood area. So that's going to be as useful as you know, what's on a bull.

And, and we've seen with this, this trial between these two BMWs of the same make 350, 000 car, apparently the electric car and the petrol version on a run from Sydney to Melbourne, it costs 40 less for the petrol car to get to Melbourne than the electric car. And the petrol car got there two hours ahead of the electric car because it had trouble charging.

What could possibly go wrong?

Look, yeah, I know. Well, it doesn't matter what the issue is, whether it's power lines from the snowy hydro, wanting to go through people's farms. Uh, we saw that, uh, down at Ballarat and, uh, people are angry down there. Osgrid, I mean, the, the anger is palpable all over Australia. Uh, towards the government, uh, they are, they are, uh, out of control.

Uh, Albanese is a complete misfit. Uh, I mean, for goodness sake. So it really doesn't matter what your gripe is. I mean, you just need to get down to Canberra, uh, and voice your concerns, whether it be cost of living, whether

it be this reckless garbage that Bowen goes on about with the renewables, whether it be COVID mandates, whether it be MRNA.

Injections. It doesn't matter what it is. Just get there and, uh, be heard, be heard. And a lot of people are going to do that and hats off to the organizers for both those groups. As I said, I don't know what their position was during the mandate drama, which is still going on. Johnny, a lot of people are saying all that's over now.

Everyone's back at work. No, they're not. I'm telling you, they're not, you know, they're not because you're not. Um, and so, uh, it be, uh, it be holds everybody to give the government a message that the people of Australia are unhappy because nothing puts the wind up a politician more than an unhappy electorate.

And we've got to show them that. And it's time to go and support our farmers and support the people who are being affected by these reckless renewables. Um, we spoke to a group at Portland and Victoria. Uh, I think they call it the Wilderness Coast or the Shipwreck Coast or something like that. Mate, it's beautiful, pristine coastline and, uh, Bowen is going to put, um, a whole bunch of wind turbines off the coast in the ocean, where the, where the whales migrate.

Um, and he, uh, he was there at a meeting of locals and the locals voiced their concern and he basically told them to suck it up. It's going in whether they like it or not. Now, there's no need for it, John. The whole of Victoria is under, under wind turbines. You, you, no matter where you drive Victoria and South Australia, there's, it's hard to find a horizon that isn't dotted with wind turbines.

Is, is he the dopest politician you've ever, you've ever, uh, come across Woody? I mean, he'd have to be up there, wouldn't he, Bowen? He'd have to be. He'd have to be. And, and is he on our war cabinet as well? Well, it wouldn't surprise me. I mean, it's a real who's who of oxygen thieves on there, isn't it? Yeah, it is.

But listen, we're, we're going to endeavor to interview some of the leaders of the people who are, uh, of the groups that are going to Canberra. Um, and, um, we're going to be talking to the chair of the NRAA, uh, not the National Rifle Association, no, the something, National Renewable Energies, so anyhow. I know the AFA, whoops, the AFA is the Australian Firefighters Alliance, haven't seen it.

They'll be there. Actually, we'll be there. Uh, Michael Gray Griffiths going, I think there's going to be a whole bunch of people turn up there. And we're not going to, um, we, we haven't been invited to, nor do we request to speak at the rally at all. We just want to go there as concerned Australians and we'll be there.

So I'm going to do the 15 hour drive to Canberra and, um, you and I will be there for that day on the 6th. Oxy will be there. Oxy will be there and a lot of the crew from Club Grubby that are on our program a lot will be there and it'll be great to get together and support those people who've set up this rally.

It's their rally and they need our support. Australia needs to support agriculture. A hundred percent. So let's do that and we'll bring together a few bits and pieces and snippets from various interviews we're going to do over the next few days to let everyone know the flavor of what's going on that, that day and just make sure you get there.

Do it for Australia, do it for yourself, do it for your grandkids because you've often been heard to say, Johnny, you just couldn't make this stuff up. You couldn't make this stuff up. And Canberra, stay out of the trees and, uh, or stay under the trees. I don't know. Um, but anyhow, let's not go there and, um, and, uh, let's, let's pray for this event.

Lord father in heaven, we thank you that we, uh, we can come together as a peace loving people who just want our freedoms back. We want our country back because you died for our freedom. And so we just pray that we live in the light of truth, that we live in the light of John eight 32, knowing that the truth will set us free.

And when we are free, we are free indeed. But truth and, and freedom come at a cost. And so Lord, we need to put ourselves out there. So please grant us the serenity to accept the things we cannot change, the courage to change the things we can, and the wisdom to know the difference. We ask in Jesus name, Amen.
