Graham and John give a wrap-up of the rally in Canberra...

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G'day

everybody and g'day Johnny. G'day Odie. How are you? I'm a bit better now, mate. We've recovered from a very hectic start to the week. Yeah, hectic couple of days, big drive. Big drive, yeah, I, uh, left 30 yesterday morning and got home about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. And that explains the bags under my eyes.

Not that anyone ever sees them, do ya? Good to see you all. Great to have you back on our show again, Johnny. Uh, Canberra. Uh, we were back there again almost two years since we, well, it was two years since we were there last time. A bit different. Different numbers though, John. A bit different. Yeah. And, uh, oddly enough, there was a lot more media coverage of this event, Woody.

And a lot more politicians speaking from the stage. Interesting. Even his Royal Highness, Barnaby Joyce. Yes. Leader of the, uh, leader of the nationals to David Little proud. There was a, it was a who's who, wasn't it? It was a who's who except, uh, there were no labor or greens there. No labor or greens. No, uh, Chris Bowen, no elbow.

No Penny Wong. Nobody. Interesting to hear Barnaby Joyce telling us we should all form an army and protest against government's overreach. And I couldn't help myself. I had to yell out at him. Barnaby, where were you two years ago when the paddock was full of people? Yeah. Barnaby. Now listen, we've got to give the organisers a big rev because they did a great job.

Look, they're great people. They did a wonderful job. The set up was really well handled there. But sadly, John, the people just didn't turn up. Yeah, it was disappointing. Uh, I, I think for the organizers, I, I dunno whether it was just a, uh, a victim of being midweek, uh, or, uh, what the circumstances were. But, uh, yeah, very, very disappointing.

I suppose what he, but, uh, look, those that were there were, were, uh, were pretty, uh, persuasive and, uh, they, they were well behaved, but, uh, they were, they were, uh, really on, on song, weren't they? They were and they were, they were saying what we're all thinking and, uh, just a pity a few more people aren't there.

The media, I didn't see any reports from the mainstream media about the protest. I guess there were a couple, but, um, at the end of the day, Johnny, it wasn't a European farm protest. Um, some of the photos coming out of Paris of, uh, you know, several story high. Um, lines of, of bales of hay, blocking streets, I mean, uh, what has it got to get to Australia to get it, get everybody fired up?

Um, farmers, come on, uh, by the, by the time you realize the train's arrived, it's too late. It's too late. We've got to get to it before that. But anyhow, those who turned up. And I think in fairness to the farmers too, Woody, I mean, you've said this, uh, previously that, uh, a lot of them couldn't make it because they can't, can't leave their farms and, uh, some of them run well and, uh, that's why we're going to be, uh, talking to some of those guys, uh, in, in the upcoming, uh, uh, weeks.

Yeah, that's right. There's been an outbreak of illness amongst the farming community. Funny about that. Uh, but also sad, but we're going to be doing Farmers with Voices and we'll be starting with a beekeeper. Interestingly enough, he's going to have a very incredible tale to tell us. Also coming up, uh, On Monday, we're interviewing Kim Staten, who is the, uh, producer, filmmaker, who's made a docu movie on Julian Assange, the trustful Julian Assange, and it is brilliant. Michelle and I are going to watch that tonight. Um, it is an absolute, uh, travesty of justice, what's happening to that man. I mean, the courage he has spent the last, I don't know, what, 14 years or more. Uh, in solitary confinement and the way he's being treated is terrible. And this is a case of, uh, the honest guy, the good guy being, being persecuted by evil, pure and simple.

There's nothing more you can say about it. So looking forward to interviewing Kim Statton. Uh, also a great show on Wednesday night, Johnny. We're getting Dr. Judy Wileyman and Elizabeth Hart back together. To discuss new revelations and some great headway they're making on the lack of informed consent.

It's a whole new approach to it. And we look forward to hearing from these two amazing women who've been on our show many times. We're looking forward to that and the update on Tony Abbott's interview, John. Yeah, well, I had a, uh, a conversation today or text conversation with, uh, Mr. Abbott and, uh, yeah, he's still coming on, more likely next week now.

He's just been a bit tied up, uh, but he is, uh, as keen as mustard to get on, uh, Club Gubri hoodie and, uh, Uh, we'll be discussing the mandates and he's very keen to discuss a very high profile case that I won't go into now, but, uh, that AFL solicitors are, uh, are looking after. And, uh, it's, it's very high profile regarding a, uh, a person that, uh, is trying to get back into the police and, uh, Karen Webb is, uh, is, is denying that.

So Tony Abbott is happy to speak about that. So I think that's going to be a great interview. Absolutely will be. And, um, you know, he's not appearing on the ABC, appearing on Club Grubbery. And, um, and John, it was interesting yesterday after, as the rally was starting to peter out, we had an opportunity to go into Parliament House with Russell Broadbent and his staff, Tanya Danock.

And that was amazing. Um, they got us straight in there. Uh, we spent a bit of time in their office and we did some networking in there and we meant to, went to meet a few other people. Uh, very interesting chat with, um, Senator Ralph Babbitt from the UAP, uh, we spoke with Craig Kelly as well. And, uh, we spoke to several staffers and others.

We spoke to, uh, James Morrow from, um, from Sky News. Side us, yeah. Yep. And on the Outsiders program. And, um, we also ran into somebody, John. We did, uh, Woody. We did. Our old mate. Our old mate. Peter Marshall. Yes. Hollifer Marshall. The president or, uh, organizer or secretary of the Firefighters Union in Victoria.

G'day Pete, we know you're watching. G'day Pete. It was very interesting to run into you at, uh, Ralph Babbitt's office. Uh, you looked at us, you said, we look familiar. And then I think you realized that we were the guys who'd been hanging on, hanging in on you for some time for our mates in the AFA and the Victorian firefighters.

Interesting, short conversation, John, it was a bit of a shirt front, I think. Um, and I don't think he was too happy, honey. I don't think he was too happy, but, uh, we pressed him on the matter of when are you going to Do what a union leader should do and get the disenfranchised and disadvantaged in the organisation back to work.

That is the 35 fighters in Victoria. And he mumbled something about, oh, we're working on that at the moment, dah, dah. And I said, are you going to tell us what your plan is? And he said, I won't tell you blokes. Get on you, Peter. And uh, reminded us of a very interesting commercial, John. Yes. Um, it's a, uh, I think this is so, so apt.

Uh, and I, I think Peter will love this. Oh, he's got a real good sense of humor, Peter. I could just tell that in talking to him in, uh, in Ralph's office. Here we go. Yeah, well, neither's for me. It's the light bulb. How much is that going to cost? What do you mean, how much is that going to cost? I don't know.

So, it only costs 10, 000 for, plus the normal cost of the replacement battery. So, almost reminiscing seven days a week.

How much does that charge to replace a husband? Where is he, Hoodie? Where's Marshall? Where is he? Where do you get a Marshall when you need him? Oh dear, oh dear. I tell you what. You wouldn't want to be waiting on the, uh, on the railway line there, would you, Peter? Uh, with a battery that didn't work. Uh, and then have the train hit you.

Uh, that wouldn't be good because You'd likely be waiting some time down in Victoria, Peter, because you wouldn't be able to get the unvaccinated firefighters or paramedics to come and suck you out of the car. Suck you out of the car? Yeah, you'd need a spatula to get you out. He would, he would. Poor buggers, you know.

Yeah. I don't know. What, what is it with these trade union leaders? What is it with them? They're so fired up politically about, you know, ensconcing themselves in the Labor Party, they couldn't give a rat's backside for the people who pay their union dues who need to be represented by them. What on earth are they doing, these people?

Protect the workers, Hoody. I mean, this bloke doesn't want to protect the workers. He doesn't want to protect the public. Uh, Dreadful stuff, dreadful stuff. And, uh, if the firefighters have got any, uh, backbone down there, they should be calling for this bike to be turfed, um, get rid of him. He, he doesn't, he doesn't strike a blow.

Just another one of those union fat cats that runs round Parliament House, greasing the wheel. Well, we're sick of you people. Yep. Absolutely. We are. But, uh, very interesting. He, um, he's obviously down there lobbying to get something done and it's interesting that one or two politicians are saying, well, we may be able to help you, but what are you going to do for those firefighters in Victoria who are unemployed at the moment?

Oh, the worm turns, the worm turns. Mate, I can tell you. Look, um, I thought we had a great day in Canberra. I think it was, it was great to be there amongst the people. It was great to see so many Club Grubbery and 832 outfits being worn. We met some amazing people. Good to catch up with some old friends down there.

Um, all the politicians were there spruiking their stuff. Uh, Matt Canavan, I take my hat off to him because he went back into the Senate and he mentioned the, the people at the rally and what they were there for, and he bounced Penny Wong a couple of times on that and, uh, the, uh, President of the, uh, of the, of the Senate had to call into order the people in the gallery who were many rally goers who got into the gallery, they were quite vocal from up there, so good on them and, um, well done to the organizers, I say again, you guys did a great job and, uh, it's just a pity that, More people just don't get along and get involved.

Uh, but anyhow, it is what it is. Johnny, today we are told that yet again, the Australian Senate has rejected a petition by Ralph Babbitt for the UAP to have the excess deaths, um, investigated and, uh, inquiry. in Australia. They rejected it 35 to 30, John.

Yeah, well, look, uh, Craig, uh, Craig Kelly tweeted this earlier, Hoody, and I, uh, I retweeted it and said that anyone that didn't support this should be, uh, charged as an accessory to murder. I, I, I don't know how else you can Classify this, Woody. This, this is, uh, this is selling out your country. This is selling out the people of this great nation.

Why you would not want to know what the root cause was for excess deaths in Australia in 2024 and 2023 and 2022 is beyond belief. These people should not hold the office that they hold. They should be ousted. Well, let's look at the, who voted no. The no's had it 35 to 30. With Labor, the Greens, the Jackie Lambie Network, and independent, independent Lydia Thorpe all voting to reject the motion.

Jackie Lambie, Lydia Thorpe, why would you reject a motion, I mean, I can understand these other. Uh, yellow backed, backboneless twits in these parties, uh, voting along party lines because they're all in it up to their armpits. But Jackie Lambie, the question has to be asked, and I have asked you by email today to come onto the program.

I have sent a letter to Jackie Lambie and I've, uh, requested her presence on the program to tell us why she voted no. Will she come, Hoddie, do you think? No, I don't think she will. Uh, look, she, I listened to her, uh, I listened to a debate going on in Parliament while I was driving home yesterday. It was about the Defence Acquisition Bill.

And Jackie Lambie stood up and gave a 15 minute speech in favour of this new bill that's coming out and it was spot on. I mean, she really called it for what it is. But on this matter, Jackie, you've got it very, very wrong. Now, I'm going to share screen again and I want to play something that you recorded, uh, back in the heat of all this stuff because I've got a, I've got a theory.

I don't think you want this investigated because you're afraid that you supported something that has cost people their lives, livelihoods, homes, families, jobs. You supported it, Jackie, and you not only supported it, you ridiculed the people who didn't get it. And I think that's why you're not doing it.

Now I'm here to tell you that there are a lot of servicemen, and women, who you claim to represent, who are injured. Some have died, and you also need to remember Jackie, that 85 percent of the people who got vaccinated twice, have refused to get vaccinated again. Jackie, you backed the wrong horse. And you didn't only back it, you put everything on it.

And you put a stigma on everybody who didn't agree with you. You made threats. And I'm going to play some of those threats now as I share screen. You got a lot to answer for Jackie Lambie. I'm really disappointed in you. I've got to tell you. Oh, look, I'm not sure that that will drive people to come forward to be honest with you, the cash incentives.

I say this to everybody out there, whether you. Whether you're hesitant about the vaccine or not, I think with this Delta strain, uh, you're just going to have to resort to the fact you have to be vaccinated. Otherwise I think that, um, you know, further on down the track, you are going to miss out on things.

There are things that are going to come back to bite. I think it's about time that those people that do not want a vaccine put other people first and their country first and their children first and their grandchildren first. And this cash payment stuff, I just. You know, I, I just don't, you're either going to, if you're not going to get vaccinated, I don't think the cash payment is actually going to help mate.

But once again, uh, you know, we've got this Georgia strain running around. It is going to get worse every day from here on in. Uh, the more people that we have vaccinated, the better. It's a shame that, you know, those vaccinations weren't brought in and we didn't have them settled in the country 18 months ago.

And that. 70 or 80 percent of us weren't vaccinated and people have had time to sit there the last 18 months and contemplate on this and let it chill with them while they're at lockdown, whether or not they should be vaccinated, that that's been the worst situation that we could have put ourselves in.

So I'm asking people out there, do the right thing by your children and your grandchildren and your country and go out there as soon as you can. When you can get vaccinated, go and get it. I just want to ask you about this, um, story that's been published in the NT News today. It's the, it's the Central Land Council, Council that's offering 500 to Indigenous Australians, uh, to go and get the jab.

Now, since that's happened, the take up has gone from 4 out of 200 people to 50%, so up to 100 people. So, I mean, in that instance, do you believe that Uh, those indigenous communities run very differently, um, than the rest of the country. Um, you know, you'll find a lot of those indigenous, those smaller communities have not got work within them.

Um, they will take that money. There's no doubt about that. Um, I'm just not sure it's going to, uh, work outside of those, uh, smaller indigenous communities. Uh, good on them for coming forward and then taking that money, if that's the way that they have to get those communities to sign up to it, because they cannot actually communicate and get it through to them, this is what needs to be done.

Um, but for the rest of us on the outside of those communities, I think we just do the right thing, uh, and do what's right by the country, uh, and get those jabs. And what about just a final one on this point, when you get to that later stage, you know, the hope is that we will accelerate towards 60, 70%.

complete vaccination rate and then we may start to hit hurdles as uh You know, you've got the anti vaxxers who make up a certain percentage, then you've got a certain percentage of people who will still be hesitant. Will something be needed in that space towards the back end? I think people are getting quite agitated right out there now outside, Pete.

And those anti vaxxers out there, that 20 30%, are the ones out there protesting on the streets and doing that sort of thing. I think you're going to find the rest of us coming at you lock, stock and barrel. And we're going to be putting the pressure on you fairly hard because the rest of us that are trying to do the right thing.

Um, I think for you, uh, we're going to start to get even more agitated and we're going to start to get more hardcore and I think that's what you're going to see. Massive division out there. Uh, it'll be us on the front foot. That's what I think is going to happen. I think the tide is going to turn on those anti vaxxers out there and you are really going to feel the heat.

Okay, on to um. The point of mandatory vaccines, SPC the company has decided to make all workers or to ensure that all workers are vaccinated by November. What do you make of this? Is this something that you support and should it go beyond that to all businesses? Uh, as long as, um, you know, as long as they are medically approved to have one, there'll be some people out there that, um, can't because of medical reasons, but anybody in that food industry that is around food should be having those vaccines and I, you know what, I, um, I applaud SPC for having the courage and the guts to be the first ones to make the move on this and I hope there's many more to follow.

Good on you this morning. That is the way, lead, lead the way. John, tell Jackie Lambie what the vaccine has not been able to do. Have you got enough time? I think we've got enough time. Well, Jackie, the vaccine's useless. It doesn't, uh, stop transmission. It doesn't stop you getting the virus. It's, uh, causing harm.

And, uh, as Hoodie said, uh, you, you're on the wrong side of history here. Uh, you, you were just inciting people to, uh, essentially wind up in a brawl over this. And, and you haven't got it right. Where were you advocating as a, as a, as a Senator for those poor indigenous people that you, you, you were basically saying wouldn't, wouldn't, wouldn't, wouldn't, understand what they were getting.

Uh, and the 500 was, was basically the carrot, get them over the line. They needed somebody to advocate for them, Jackie. They needed somebody to stand up for them and, uh, and you weren't there, you weren't there. In fact, you were the complete opposite. Johnny, how many times have you had COVID? Zero. What? How many times?

Well, how many times have you been vaccinated? Zero. How many people have you mixed with since all this started? Thousands. Look behind. Millions. How many of those people hugged you? Lots. Shook your hands. How many of those people were wearing masks? Not, not many that I saw, like, I think there might have been one or two.

Jackie, my wife and I have been mixing with hundreds of thousands of people. We got, uh, the Delta variant, uh, once in Sydney and we haven't had it since. And we haven't stopped hugging people for the last two years, Jackie. And I haven't seen much heat. I haven't seen your, uh, the crowd you were stirring up to get those rotten anti vaxxers.

Haven't seen a lot of them around, Jackie. And funnily enough too, Hoody, I mean, I wouldn't know if I've had COVID or not, to be completely honest, because I don't, I've never checked for it. Uh, I've had a cold. Um, but

whether I've had COVID or not, I couldn't categorically say I have or I haven't. But, uh, interestingly enough, I was hugging you.

At the very point you had the Delta strain. That's right. At the Sydney rally. Now I've always said that because of the role that I had as a, as a paramedic, as a frontline paramedic, we were subjected to. Uh, coughs and cold and illnesses all the time and our immune systems, I believe, were built up, um, to be able to rebel that, uh, uh, I mean, that's, that's what we did.

We were with sick people all the time. Uh, so I mean, it's all this BS, Jackie, you don't know what you're talking about. Um, I know you, you're obviously very good around your little, uh, niche of defense. And I've been told by many people in that place down at Canberra that, uh, you are a very good advocate for, uh, for the, uh, for the veterans.

Uh, and I, and I applaud you for that, but you got it wrong here. And in fact, you're doing these veterans an absolute disservice because you are now discrediting them. Uh, who are, who are vaccine injured, uh, and you're not allowing them to have a voice and you should be a voice for them. Jackie, let's tell you this, that, uh, in the U.

S. alone, uh, the D. A. N. 's data, uh, for the defense department over there has shown a 1000 percent increase in cardiac arrest amongst military pilots. The military is struggling to put troops on the ground in America. Because of the vaccines. Um, now Jackie, we're happy to educate you by bringing on to a panel, Dr.

Philip Altman, Professor Angus Dalgleish, Professor of Oncology at St. George's Teaching Hospital in London, Dr. Peter McCullough, anyone you like, we can bring them on. How about we bring on the head, former head of obstetrics and, uh, and gynecology at the Mater Hospital, who is now selling sheds. Because as a gynecologist and obstetrician, he spoke up about a 73 percent increase in failed pregnancies amongst his vaccinated cohort, and they fired him.

We could bring him on. We could bring on doctors from the Australian Medical Professional Society. We could bring on any number of tens of thousands of doctors who are now urging people not to get vaccinated because they've seen the result. A result, Jackie, that was brought about by the strong push by you and even your mate Karl Stefanovic.

There's another video clip here I'm going to show that's a bit of an eye opener. I won't show the whole thing, but it's worth sharing. Jackie, we're picking on you, but we're doing it for your own good. Parliament is no

stranger to fierce debate, but yesterday, Jackie Lambie, well, she took things to a whole new level, blasting Pauline Hanson over an attempt to scrap vaccine mandates. Being held accountable for your own actions isn't called discrimination. It's called being, you wouldn't believe it, a goddamn bloody adult.

That's right, it's being an adult. It's putting others before yourself. And that's what this country is supposed to be about. The way out of lockdowns and restrictions is vaccinations because there is nothing else on the table. Let's be honest about that. It is the only weapon we have. And we need to do everything we possibly can.

I'll pause it there, John. Nothing else on the table, either, Mecton. All the other treatments that were put forward that the government ignored and lied about. She says there was nothing on the table. It shows you how uneducated she is. To keep ourselves safe, our kids safe, our grandchildren safe. And the straight shooting Tasmanian Senator, Jackie Lambie, joins us now from Harlem and the House.

Good, Jackie. Good, Jackie. Good. Jackie, I mean, as Carl said this morning, it was classic Jackie, but, I mean, there was emotion, and I get very emotional even listening to that. Just talk us through it. Um, I think for me, you know, I've been on the ground a lot in Tasmania, obviously coming into a campaign. Um, I didn't come up to the last sitting, um, so I could go out there, speak to those Tasmanians.

And you can see that, that taste of freedom where most of them have gone up and said, I'm making a choice. I'm going to be vaccinated. I want my freedoms back. And really let's be realistic, Jackie, is there anything else on the table? I'm going, there is nothing else on the table. This is the only weapon of defense we've got to fight it.

So, you know, you can see that momentum going there. And usually the majority just goes, okay, we'll deal with it. We'll just be quiet. They're not going to be quiet. They want their freedoms back, they really do, and they really are concerned about, we've been very lucky in Tasmania, we haven't had much of a bite of it, I think we've been into lockdown once and Hobart had a bite, the southern end, um, only probably about five or six weeks ago for three days, and I can tell you.

They don't like it. And they're, they're, they're frightened. You know, they they're worried about, we have a population per capita of the most elderly down there in Tasmania. We have a lot of vulnerable, um, families down there. We have a lot of homeless people down there, let alone kids and families living in their cars.

So people down there are going, I've really got to look after my grandparents. I've got to make sure my kids are staying safe. They are really putting, putting themselves. putting everybody before themselves. And you can really see that momentum driving down there. And I think that's great. I mean, that's a Tasmanian way that we're very cliquey down there and, you know, you will usually stand together as one.

But Jackie, I think I think it's broader than Tassie. And, you know, and it is this debate over, you know, these freedoms of people to do what they want with their bodies. But you the moment for me where I went here, here was when you talked about where we're putting others first and thinking about others like our elderly, like those we've got who've got family members who, for medical reasons, can't be vaccinated.

It, from, from that moment, like, was that difficult to stand up and deliver that? And did the level of emotion that you showed, did it surprise you in that moment? No, I don't think so. Because for me, I've always been brought up to put others first. I mean, I'm ex military. You put others first. That's what you do.

You put your lives on the line. That's normality for me. That's how I understand it. So, yeah. Hang on, I'll pause there. She, she's putting her life on the line by getting vaccinated. Is that what she's saying? Let's, let's continue. When I can see, um, that people are making decisions and that's probably going to cause others harm, I actually get quite upset about that and say, please just reconsider your decisions.

Go back, um, have a think about it because really it is for the better of the country and everybody else living here. I'm just asking them to go back and have a good look at it. Because bottom line is, Ali, they are going to lose their freedoms. That's not my choice. That's not your choice. That's, that's, that's really not Premier's and Prime Minister's choices.

You've got businesses out there that are on their knees saying I can't afford to do a deep clean. I cannot afford to shut down. I cannot afford for my staff to get sick. You know, the best way, the best defence we've got to fight this is what on the table and that is getting vaccinated. And that's the only thing we've got.

Well, look, I mean, this, this push to scrap vaccine mandates, it was ultimately defeated, but he had five coalition senators cross the floor to support one nation. That's a real problem for Scott Morrison, isn't it? Because he's downplayed it, but he's got big differences within his party that are going to be.

impossible to overcome. I think, um, I think it's not helping if you don't have a solid leader that is leading the country that wants to try and please everybody. This is a really serious situation that we're in and he needs to stick by his guns and he needs to get on with this, but he can't be playing both sides of a battlefield.

Based on the debate here, we can see what vaccinations are doing. We're all getting a taste of our freedoms coming back and he needs to be really, really solid here. Uh, it is a broad church, apparently, the Liberal Party, as they like to call it. Um, but my, uh, my point will be, well, you haven't got your bill through.

Uh, is it over yet? Are you going to say, that's it, I'm not voting for any legislation? How big? Are you going to stand up with the threats that you've actually made? So this is what we're all looking forward to today. Well, and we know that Senator Pauline Hanson, she says she's going to fight to the death against vaccine mandates.

Are you up for that battle? And also for the backlash that's going to come your way, particularly on social media from the anti vaxxers. Um, yeah, I think, um, over my eight years in and out of politics, um, I've, we've sort of become quite resilient to that, which is great. I certainly have, um, it does worry me, um, with my staff, they do get abused on the phone.

There is really no need for that. If you want to put your point across, that's fine, please do so. But don't, don't, don't be using the C word at my staff. Don't be swearing at them. Don't be abusing them. Uh, this is something that, you know, we all contributed to. We all, I got up, I delivered that speech. That is the way my staff feel, but please, please don't abuse them and don't abuse other people that don't agree with the choices that you are making.

Everybody, this is why we have freedoms in this country to be able to make the choices that we make. And we wear the consequences, good or bad for that. Look, you stood up yet. Hang on. Don't abuse other people for making the choices that they make.

Rewind. Jackie, you're a buffoon. The ring of steel. Remember, Jackie, we're coming for you. We're going to lock you all up in a ring of steel and seeing you next to that blonde bimbo, um, Ellie Langdon. I mean, anyhow, a lot of people remember. I want to want to keep playing because Carl Stefanovic's reaction.

It's very interesting. Jackie and plenty applauded you for it. We, you know, you're a straight shooter. We always know what you're thinking and most Australians appreciate that. Good luck for the rest of the two weeks of sittings, huh? It's going to be fun. I know yesterday was only day one. And I'll tell you what, Carl, I want to see you in one of those Christmas suits, mate.

Honestly, go off. What about the Clive Palmer outfit? Both of you, just stop. Oh, what was the Clive Palmer outfit? Oh, that outfit. Oh, no, no, no, don't, don't. You're just jealous because you don't have a body like mine, sweetie. Now, come on. You know that, you know that. What about Clive Palmer? You're right, mate.

Wow, fat shaming. Oh, no. I don't like it at all. I just don't like it. Alright, that was interesting. Oh, there you go now. Jackie, you might also be interested to know that not long after that, Karl Stefanovic changed his tunes considerably. Uh, on interviews with Dr. Nick Coatsworth, he said, I've had two and I ain't getting any more.

I'm not falling for that. They've got all they're getting out of me. Jackie?

Well, did you know there was two there, Hooty? Uh, which was interesting. She said that, uh, Uh, uh, well, I got the impression that the reason that she changed her tune was because of the election. Uh, I'd say she probably received advice, like so many of these tyrants, that they were better off holding the, uh, the line that, uh, you know, get vaccinated because people were so fearful and they, they would have.

You know, the tough woman who walks down, makes the black fist on her, on her opening day in the Senate chamber. What on earth are you doing? You're, you're fighting, you're fighting for the lives of your people, who are our people.

Let's be honest. We're all Australians. And when they're dying because of, uh, of something that may be sinister, that needs to be investigated so people can be helped instead of everyone, everyone pretending it hasn't happened. What are you doing? You put your black fist down all of a sudden, haven't you?

It's not there anymore, is it? So, look, both you ladies are welcome to come on and tell us where we're wrong, because we're really angry. Because we've had a gut full of this being called anti vaxxers and being threatened all the time. We're over it. And, uh, we're, we're not gonna, we're not gonna walk quietly into the night, Jackie Lambie.

So, um, you know, come on, please come on. Now, to add to the madness we're hearing today, John, that whooping cough's on the rise, especially in Queensland. You know why it's, why it's on the rise, John? According to the experts, our immune systems are depleted because we've spent too much time in lockdown. It's YouTube's fault.

That's why, that's why we've got increases in shingles and pericarditis and myocarditis is because we weren't mixing. We weren't feeding our immune system with the stuff it needs to build itself up. I remind everybody of what Angus Dalgleish, Professor of Oncology at St. George's Teaching Hospital told us only a month ago, John.

What this vaccine has done, let's not call it a vaccine, what this GMO has done to the immune systems of people all around the world is totally distorted them to the point where if they were soldiers they've been ordered to the western wall of the fort to defend the fort while the enemy is attacking from the east.

They were his words to simplify it. He said point blank, these vaccines are causing an increase in cancers and mortalities that are absolutely going through the roof. All the oncologists in the UK are starting to see it. He's got a pathology background as well. He's can, he's confirmed that that's what's going on.

The British inquiry is starting to reveal that more and more of that is the truth. And he would come on our program in a heartbeat, Jackie, to debate you. But beware, this man's got medical experience. John and I aren't doctors. John's got more claim to that than I have as a paramedic of 25 years. All I know is I smelled a rat in the cheese factory and we haven't stopped interviewing credible people who've been censored, lambasted, and called fools by people like Ali Langdon on channel nine.

I mean, enough's enough. Well, and I think, uh, uh, Professor Douglash did, did make the comment or he said, uh, these MRNA vaccines will make the Lidomide look like a pimple. And what do you do then, Jackie? If you're still around in parliament in 20 years time, what are you going to do to defend the people who died?

That's aiding and abetting a criminal act in my book.

Uh, she won't come. She won't. But the offer's there. I've sent the email. And we'll see what happens. We'll put together a panel who will happily discuss it with you. Maybe you might like to talk to Elizabeth Hart about informed consent or the lack thereof. Jackie, that might even open your eyes. Do you want your eyes opened?

Good grief. You know, Tassie's the home, the home of some wonderful people. Wonderful people. And, um. Actually, we, we'll even let you bring Kate Manderson on with you. There's a thought. Bring on Kate Manderson.

What can you say, Jim? Dr. Kate Manderson. Dr. Kate Manderson. Yeah.

What can you say? You still ask? Helpfully. Tell us about that. You've had a fun afternoon with New South Wales Health haven't you? I have had a fun afternoon. Yeah. I, uh, I came across some documents that were, uh, given to me. Now, the story is a person was contacted that worked in the oral health area and was asked whether they wanted to come back to, uh, Uh, work and provide assistance to patients through News of Wales Health.

And they said, well, I can't, I'm not vaccinated. Oh no, that's all changing. That's all changing. Now this person received a letter and the letter says, and I'll, uh, I'll read a bit of it out here. I did tweet it out this afternoon. I've gone to News of Wales Health for an explanation, but, uh, it says, I'm writing, this is from the Ministry of Health.

One Reserve Road at St. Leonard's, New South Wales Ministry of Health, 29th of January, 2024. Dear Provider, I'm writing regarding the New South Wales Health Oral Fee for Service Scheme. I won't read it all, but it says, The key changes to the policy directive are as follows. The roles and responsibilities of New South Wales Health, businesses and practitioners have been clarified, Hoodie.

The following mandatory requirements to join the scheme have been removed. Vaccination.

Vaccination. You're not making this stuff up, are you, John? I'm not. This is signed by Graham Liston. Graham Liston, the executive director of Centre for Oral Health Strategy. And Larry, sorry, Lanny Chor, CHOR, Chief Dentist, Centre for Oral Health Strategy. New South Wales Health. So I, uh, I contacted New South Wales Health this afternoon, told them it was John Larder from Club Grubbery.

You can imagine hoodie. Uh, it was like tennis, uh, around the building, around the building. We've got him on the phone. It's on the phone. First time it was 25 minutes on hold. It's hung up. Then I ended up in Albury. Then from Albury, I ended up at Health Direct. Health Direct. If you need an ambulance, call 000.

I went back to the ministry again. Said, listen, you people are, uh, running me around the place. I want to speak to Kerry Chance Office. This is very important. Ended up in some other area. Cut a long story short, they then put me through to the media office, and the media officer said, uh, send me an email, I don't know what you're talking about, I'll have a look at the emails, and I'll try and get back to you by this afternoon.

And we haven't had a response to, to the, uh, to the email.

You're not making this up, are you? I'm not. No. And I had a witness! I had a witness on the phone to all this, a, I won't say who it is, but a very reputable witness, as Hoodie knows. Very reputable witness, uh, to what was going on. So yeah, let's just wait and see what comes of it. But it, it, it beggars belief, Kerry chant, Kerry, that you'll allow somebody to play around with somebody's mouth that's unvaccinated, but you won't let the paramedics, the doctors, the nurses.

The physios, the cleaners, or anyone else back to work. How do

you work that out? Come on, Kezza. Hi! Come on, Kez. Come on to the show and tell us where we're wrong. That's all we ask. Anybody, if we're, if we seem overly harsh or critical of organisations or individuals thereof, you have our promise that we will put you to work and you can tear us to shreds, if you wish.

But please tell us where we're wrong. That's all we ask. We don't know. You're the ones being paid the megabucks to administer health in this country. Come on and tell us where we're wrong. I'll tell you what, we'll even give you an opportunity to make some money. We'll bring on Steve Kirsch, a multimillionaire from America who has offered 1 million to anyone who will debate with him for four hours on the COVID vaccines.

There you go, Kerry. There's a quick million for you. Oh dear. What can you say, mate? What can you say? What can you say?

And, uh, wow. You're not going to believe this one. I don't think I've told you about this. You got another one? I got another one. Fire away mate. Where is me mate? Where's me mate? Can

we see him? Nah, it drops out but I saw a quick glimpse of Hazard behind bars. There he is. There he is. He popped up.

Hoodie, we thought he was eating snails in the south of France. We did. We did. We honestly did. We thought he'd sojourned over there and he was living a, uh, a life of Riley over there on his 300, 000 a year plus pension. But no, Brad surfaced somewhere else. Can you believe this hoodie? This is unbelievable.

How many people out there have bought a Caref flight Bear? Uh, uh, uh, has anyone out there, uh, you know, been, you know, uh, supportive of Caref flight? Uh, bought a bear to help raise money for them? Yeah, sure. Lots of you have. Sure. Lots of you have supported caref flight, uh, running different charitable programs.

Uh. Been a very good organization, a very solid with a, with an excellent reputation. Oh, no, don't tell me he's the head of CareFlight. Bradley Hazard has been appointed as the chairman of CareFlight. This was done in, uh, in, uh, in the. Dark of night, just before Christmas, it's a paid position, on the board, chairman of the board.

Now, I want to read you something, Woody. Now, this was an article by Samantha Hutchison, a national reporter for, uh, for I don't know where, but anyway. Uh, This was in relation to the John Barilaro mess. You remember that? Yeah, I do. New South Wales ministers will be banned from taking a role in a public sector agency relevant to their former role for 18 months after leaving government following a review into John Barilaro's appointment to a US trade post.

Now, I did look up Uh, what the public sector is and it says, the public sector is a part of the economy that consists of government entities. It is responsible for providing services and managing resources to citizens, businesses and other organizations. These activities are funded by taxes, grants, borrowing money and other government controlled sources.

Well, let me tell you this. CareFlight is in a contract with New South Wales Health.

Nothing to see here. Nothing to see here, Brad. And guess what? When you go onto the New South Wales Ambulance website, it's all redacted. Hundred million dollars. Hundred million dollars in their finances, uh, uh, as expenditure. Hundred million. So how much of that, Bradley, is coming from New South Wales Health?

How much? To you. Unbelievable.

Every cloud has a silver lining, Johnny. You hold a commercial helicopter license and Brad may well offer you a job as a CareFlight pilot. He could do. He could do. I reckon he will. I reckon that's why he's gone back. I reckon

he's, he's come back. You think he's keen to give me a job down there, do you? I think he's put the escargot and, and the frog's legs into the microwave for now.

I think so. Come over, he's taken on the boss of CareFlight to give Johnny Larder his dream job, a CareFlight chopper pilot. That's it. That's what it is. That's what it is, Brad. You've really gone up in our estimations. Brad. Brad.

Oh dear. Oh dear. Hey, we had lunch at the Parliamentary Cafeteria yesterday. We did. And guess what? They don't take cash. No. They don't take cash. No. Now they upset Bob Cadder. They did. Now from Queensland. And he stood there and he said, holding his 20 bill up, and he said, I can't use Australian legal tender in Parliament House.

Well, you're breaking the law because you cannot refuse to serve somebody who's going to pay you in Australian legal tender. And he stood there and he said, I'm not paying with anything else other than this 20 bill. And I went away and about 15 minutes later, they came back and I said, you're right. It is against the law not to accept Australian cash.

But that happened a couple of days ago, Johnny, and we were there yesterday and I still wouldn't accept cash. I actually, I think that happened on the same day. Oh, did it? I think so, because Ben Fordham picked up on it. He picked up on Catter not being able to use the cash. And that, that was, uh, it happened on the same day.

So I think it was something that they'd obviously only just introduced. I mean, we were very lucky to be, uh, taken down there by, uh, by Russell Broadbent's Chief of Staff, Tanya. And, uh, you know, as a result of them not accepting the cash, she, uh, she had to pay for us. Yeah. So, uh, it was lovely of her. It was lovely.

And the food was really good. Lots of very interesting faces down there. But anyway, John, we better bring this one to a close, I suppose. It's been an interesting little chat. We've been at our screen and, uh, I just returned to being absolutely flabbergasted at Jackie Lambie. You expect it from the Greens.

of your truth, which calms us down in many ways, because we know that you are in control and we know what the outcome will ultimately be.

And even though we may not see justice here in our own space, we definitely know that justice will be served. And the battle is yours. So father God, we thank you for guiding us and leading us. We pray that you will fill us with the Holy spirit and restore this great South land of the Holy spirit to something that resembles what it once was.

We ask in Jesus name. Amen. Amen. You often mean it to say, you just couldn't make this stuff up. And we're not, believe me. We're not. And I've got to say too Woody, no wonder these politicians aren't, uh, aren't in the, in the space of, uh, cost of living when you can get orange ruffie for 9. Yep. A serve of orange ruffie for nine bucks in the parliamentary cafeteria.

And I, I, do they pay in the dining room? I don't know whether they pay up there in the, in the, uh, in the parliamentary dining room. Silver service. I don't know. Not sure. I don't know, Johnny. Look, to be honest, honest mate, I just, you know, all jokes aside. We're going to hell in a hand basket in this country.

We really are. For those of you, I know, look, ABC is really on the nose, but I'll tell you what, there's a series on the ABC. There's two of them. One of them is called, um, Nemesis, which is about, uh, the battle that went on in the liberal party between Abbott and, um, Turnbull and Morrison. Compelling viewing.

I think it's some of the best television I've seen in a long time. There's another one about the Rudd Gillard Rudd leadership challenge, and I can't quite remember the name of it, but. It was put up about three months ago about what the machinations that went on in the Labour Party. And in the meantime, stay out of the trees. And for those of you who love somebody and you haven't told them, please call them and tell them.

And, um, if you're ringing Jackie Lambie's office or anybody like that, be respectful. The staff are just doing their job too. Um, we don't get anywhere by carrying on like that. Um, you know, we've got to act with compassion towards people on both sides of the fence. So God bless you all. Thanks for watching Club Grubbery.
