

2024-03-14 Graham and John talk about tomorrow's interview with Dr Sabina Hazan...

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Hi, you great people who watch Club Grubbery. We just really appreciate you and, uh, we have had a massive week, I can tell you. I've been on the road for hours. I don't, I feel like I haven't slept for three days. Johnny Lada, what a week it's been and what an interview we've just conducted. Yeah, hoodie.

That was a cracker. I, I, uh, I wasn't expecting it to be so good actually, but, uh, look that, uh, the doctor we just interviewed, Dr. Sabine, uh, she's, uh, she's amazing and, uh, really and truly an inspiration to, uh, so many. And now I think that'll probably go down as probably one of the best interviews we've done.

Mate, I didn't want it to end. And you know, the, it was the same the other night when we were on with Malcolm Roberts and Craig Kelly. We were all getting on. And really unpacking some stuff. It was brilliant. But, um, in the light of everything that's gone on this week, especially with you and I appearing in the Senate committee hearings, uh, commission, um, there is a possibility that all this profile building around this, these issues is going to blow this whole narrative out of the echo chamber.

And that's what we want. Our whole purpose all the way through this has been to get the message to the people who are currently in a position to make a difference. And so that's all we've ever said we wanted to do. That's all we're continuing to do. And it's incredible to see what's unfolding before our eyes.

There is, um, there is a certain sense of optimism building. Yeah, I can't say that I've felt that up till recently. I have felt in the last few weeks, I think the pendulum's starting to shift, and I just, I've got a good feeling, Hoody. I do, you know, and people, we criticize the government and all that sort of thing, but we got an opportunity yesterday and, uh, mate, I've got to tell you, you were on fire yesterday.

You nailed it in that, in that hearing. And uh, you know, we both did a good job. Tony Nikolic did a great job. The AMN did a great job and there's a whole bunch of other people speaking, uh, in, in these committee hearings that are doing a great job, but we got incredible support from the politicians that were there.

Um, and, uh, look, we just, and hearing what we've just heard from Dr. Sabine Hazan, who gave, uh, evidence with Senator Ron Johnson in the U. S. Senate just recently, mind blowing evidence. Uh, we are going to do our best to tee up an interview with her and Tom Barodi and Professor Robert Clancy. Um, that'll be brilliant.

And she's just told us that she will try and facilitate a meeting between us and Senator Ron Johnson. So, yeah, Yeah, everybody plays this game differently. We're all, we're all out there doing the best we can. So, um, it's really important that we support each other as best we can. So let's keep going onward and upward.

Well, and I've just, I've just heard too, that, uh, Tony Nikolik, and this is, this is amazing, really. Uh, Tony Nikolik has just received, uh, an award, uh, for the boutique law firm of the year 2024 in New South Wales. Well done, Tony. Well done and well deserved. Well deserved. I mean, you know, we've been, we've been working in and around Tony for a while and you've, you've had him working on your team with your trials against Hazard and New South Wales Health.

And what you see in that guy is what you get. I mean, he's a character. He's funny. He's, he is so humble in his abilities. He's got incredible credentials. And to me, he's given, uh, he's given me a new faith in the legal profession because there's a lot of people, uh, anyway, let's not go there, but, uh, well done, Tony Nicolet and, uh, Karen Webb, John, let's highlight what's happened with Karen Webb.

Go for it. Police Commissioner of New South Wales. Yeah, Police Commissioner for New South Wales. Hopefully for not much longer, uh, Hooty, I've got to say. Uh, dreadful, dreadful behavior, uh, from, from a leader in our community. She sacked her, uh, publicity, uh, media. Executive yesterday. I'm led to believe, uh, we, we, we found out this yesterday at the, at the hearing, but, uh, Ben Fordham on 2GBs covered it extensively this morning and it, it, it's a dreadful situation, Hoody, and I'll tell you why.

The thing that really, really, I find, uh, difficult to, um, to believe is that Commissioner Webb, who employed this, uh, lady to, to help her with the media, yeah. As an executive in her team. Uh, Commissioner Webb didn't even have the, um, the front or the backbone to sack this lady herself. She flew down to Melbourne yesterday to have a meeting, uh, likely with the, uh, uh, the Commissioner in Victoria, because she wants to hand over the responsibility of working out some sort of firearms policy to them because there's obviously no one that she can trust within her team to do it according to her, which is absolute nonsense.

Why you wouldn't be getting one of these, uh, New South Wales police, uh, people to, uh, do a review of your firearms policies. Ridiculous. Uh, But no, she was down there. While she was down there, Hoodie, she got the assistant commissioner Dean Smith to tap on this lady's, uh, shoulder and say, you're no longer required, uh, here any longer, pack your bags.

That's leadership.

Well, we're going to do everything in our power because we're going to say to you, Karen, we're not on our watch. These people deserve to be offered their jobs back.

And we're going to keep leaning as much as we can. And let me tell you a little story, Karen Webb, because maybe your new PR advisor will show you this video, although you probably may not watch it. It was on the second last trip I did to Canberra. I was driving down through Northern New South Wales. I was pulled over by a group of police officers that were set up in the emergency stopping line for a random breath test.

Uh, there were about half a dozen police officers there. And as I rolled my window down, a young constable came up to me and handed me the device and told me to count into it, which I did. And, uh, when I passed it, because I haven't had a drink for, uh, many years, uh, he said, Oh, thank God for that. I said, what do you mean?

He said, I'm really glad you passed. I'd really hate to book you, hoodie. Stay out of the trees. Have a good day. Now. Um, and we, we have seen John, we've seen police officers who are really uncomfortable in all the states. That have spoken to us, especially in Victoria. There are a lot of coppers down there who are really uncomfortable with the, with the, with the new role of, um, government thug that they've been handed.

Some of them are relishing it and you can see it when you watch the battleground, um, Melbourne, uh, documentary that Taffer did. Um, and Karen Webb, there's a lot of officers in your force who think you're a goose. And there's a reason for that. You are. And, um, you're not fitted for the job. And you should reconsider your position or change your attitude because, um, it's, what you're creating is just immoral and it's unjust and it doesn't pass the pub test.

If we still have pub tests. Morally bankrupt Woody. She's got a crime spree going on in regional New South Wales. 11 year old kids are walking into police stations, getting the keys to the patrol cars and driving off. Uh, there's not enough police, they don't give them the powers, uh, to, to do their jobs properly.

The courts are letting people off. It, the system's mad, but, but essentially, uh, you know, the, the buck stops with you Karen Webb. You're, you're the commissioner, uh, you, you need to, um, you need to demonstrate some integrity. Some. honesty, some compassion and some empathy here. And you need to reinstate these officers like Justin Poore and Natalie Visalo and Deb Crystal.

It's such, such a disgrace that you've sacked them on this 181D, which, which amounts to gross misconduct. And in the words of the, uh, former police minister in 1996, Paul Whelan, um, That introduced this legislation. I would believe on the back of the Wood Royal Commission, trying to get rid of corrupt police officers from that era, that legislation was never meant to do what you're doing with it.

You are abusing it. And he made it very clear in that second reading that this was not something to be abused. And you have abused it, and I think that's why there may be a complaint coming to the LEC in regards to this, because this is reprehensible. That's a good word for it, and maybe you should have sacked your PR advisor or your public relations lady or media person, because your image is surely on the nose, and, uh, Although I guess she's been given a very hard task that lady to try and build you up because um, anyway, uh, enough said on that.

Um, but it's time to do the right thing, Karen Webb, and either change the policy and do something and reinstate these officers or leave. It's that because you are, uh, you are part of the game. You are part of the game. It's obvious about that. And, uh, anyway, you're either, uh, no, won't go there. Um, the interview we've just done, John will be screened.

Um, I commend it to all of you to watch, uh, it'll bring a tear to your eye. Tony and I were there, uh, it was very moving and I think every Australian should watch it and it's representative of what everyone's feeling out there, across the board, about what's going on in Australia. No, it's just him and I, basically with our wives doing all the groundwork in the background, you know, keeping the, the homestead lights burning and uh, and people like Stuart Robertson and, and a few others.

But this is all done on the smell of an oily rag. We, um, we, we just gotta keep it going. We deliberately don't take on, uh, any major sponsors at all because we want to be independent. So, um, if you like what we're doing, we
