2024-06-14 Graham and John speak with MP Russel Broadbent...

Hello, everybody, and welcome back to Club Grubbery, another amazing interview tonight. And, uh, this one. Uh, I've got to make sure I'm recording because last night I did 45 minutes of interview that we didn't press record on, Johnny. Uh, yes, we are recording and, uh, John, great to have you back on. I'm working here like a driver's dog or you're working me like a driver's dog.

I don't know, but welcome back on to you, mate. Thanks, mate. Great to be here. It's good to be here. And, uh, Russell Broadbent, the member for Monash, former member of the Liberal Party, now an Independent, doing great work for people. Uh, Russell, your credibility in the Parliament has, has been established over a quarter of a century, and it's well deserved.

Uh, you're not seen as a radical. You tell the truth. And, um, and you've kept the respect of both sides of the House. And, uh, for that, we thank you. And we thank you for coming on to Club Grubbery. It's great to be here, Graeme. And John, thank you for having me. This is, I've been on a couple of times before, but, uh, we're Truth Seekers, that's all.

We're not asking for anything else but the truth. And if we can, if we, if we stay with that, the truth will always win us out, and the truth will set you free. Absolutely, and that's, that's what the name of the game is all about, because ultimately, It doesn't matter what we all say, at the end of the day, the truth is the truth and it eventually outs and then we can decide whether we're on the right side of history or not.

But it's all irrelevant. It's all background hash. We've just got to keep standing in our integrity and doing what we're doing. Look, some really pressing issues, uh, in, in the last few days, Russell, and we've got you on at short notice and we, you know, like half an hour's notice. We do appreciate you being so available.

Uh, look, the big standout for today, which is rattling a lot of people at the moment, is, uh, the Facebook censorship of Cafe Lockdown. Uh, Michael Gray Griffith and Cafe Lockdown have been doing a lot of human interest work. Um, you know, he's been touring the country. He started touring the country very early, straight after Canberra, has interviewed thousands of people.

Uh, he's, he's given them a platform to tell their story. And, um, you know, the work he's done has been incredible. I don't see anything Michael does as outrageous, to be honest with you. And yet he is, uh, for some reason copped a 10 year ban from Facebook, which has rattled a lot of people today, but I've spent a bit of time thinking about the whole thing and I.

I think it points to a few things we need to be concerned about, but it's also a good warning for us, uh, to be ready to do other things and to seek other platforms and make sure that we keep our lines of communication open. Um, I'd be interested in your thoughts on that Russell Broadbent. Well, um, when I was removed from YouTube after a parliamentary speech, I saw that as a badge of honor, and there must have been something that triggered Facebook.

I don't know what it is. I, I do see Michael's stuff, but I don't follow it closely. I don't have time, but, but, um, you know, he's done such good work over a long period of time and they haven't, to this point, they've never taken him off. So there must have been some trigger. Of some issue that he raised, um, that they've decided that, but a 10, a 10 year ban seems to be excessive.

And I don't know whether, um, they might review their position in 12 months time or something like that when they see the work that he's doing. I don't know. So I can't really comment on that. My, my concern around this

whole issue is yesterday on Radio National, um, there was a professor on, uh, from Melbourne Uni and he said, because of vaccine hesitation in America, 230,000 people have died now.

And the, then the whole thing was predicated on misinformation and disinformation, how terrible it was that people were getting this disinformation and stopping them getting vaccinated. My question is, how does he back up the fear of 230,000 deaths? Is it just modeling? Or have you got death certificates?

You know, you and the three of us, we have to be spot on with everything that we say. We can't say one thing because we'll be torn to shreds if we make a mistake. But someone can go on Radio National and say vaccine hesitation caused this. So I've asked my staff to go back to the professor and say, Where'd you get that from?

He turns out he got it from an article in, uh, um, New York newspaper

now. So I want to go back to then the article and find out what the article says, because the trouble is we're trying. It's the honest of proof has been reversed. Like they can say something in mainstream media, which you won't be allowed to say under this new misinformation, disinformation bill. Yeah.

Because if you made a statement like that, or John made a statement like that, they could close you down, take you off the internet, because that's their, that's the authority that they're giving themselves. Yet the same people, a government, a university, um, an accredited agency can say what they like.

Newspapers can say what they like, mainstream media can, but you can't and I can't. I mean, these are troubled waters for us. So I come back to a Facebook banning. Um, a Facebook banning should be an opportunity to find other ways to communicate broadly with the community. And the community need to be educated to look for those other methods themselves.

I mean, just to say I've always used Facebook. Uh, well, You know, it's like saying I've always used AstraZeneca or, you know, at the end of the day, people have got to look for alternatives for themselves. And we can't sort of lead people by the hand to do that. Uh, we, we've been encouraging people ever since we started, John, to go to the website, there it is on the screen, website and get the latest updates there.

There's also references there to all the social media platforms were on other than Facebook. So there's links on the, on the website. So go to, go to those and start educating yourself because this is going to get worse. Now there's some things that really perturbed me about this Facebook ban. Facebook says that Uh, Michael is being banned because of content that contravenes their community standards.

Now, I have nine fake Graham Hood pages set up, which are scamming people out of money. I don't ask people, I don't ask people for money, I don't ask people to pay to get in behind a paywall. I have been relentlessly seeking Facebook. Or asking Facebook to seek these out and cancel them. And their reply at every turn is this does not contravene our community standards.

Well, what are your community standards? You know, you go to, you go to some Facebook pages like Marketplace and they're filled with pornography. Um, you know, it's, it's all over the place. It's just absolutely crazy. Facebook doesn't have a community standard unless it comes to what appears to be likely to be pushing a button of truth.

So, I got a message from Josh Peters today, Dazzle's dad, warning everybody that there are pages being set up where people are being asked to send money to a bank account. So that they can pay to watch Dazzle's funeral as it's live streamed. Now he has come out and said that is not being authorized.

There will be no live stream of Dazzle's funeral. And he's furious that people are doing this sort of thing. Now that would contravene anybody's community standards, but not Facebook because Facebook won't remove those pages. So that's one big thing that really irks me. Uh, Facebook, you know, to be honest, there's a reprehensible organization, Mark Zuckerberg.

is not the kind of guy you'd like to invite home to have dinner with your daughter and your family. Uh, you know, he's, he's a very interesting character. Um, he's, he's obviously into control and all that kind of thing. But Facebook as an organization has a lot to answer for. And the other big thing before I hand over to both you guys is That if these things are going to happen and Australians don't speak up about it, whether you agree with those who have been banned or not, this is a movie that's coming to a theater near you.

And if you don't speak up about loss of freedom like that in a democratic society like Australia used to be, then you can't complain in one or two years time if you're being affected by bans and, uh, and this kind of censorship.

Well, John, your turn. Well, I think it just demonstrates, uh, Facebook's doing us a favour in some respects. So I think we've held them up on a pedestal and we've, we've, Waturally sort of funneled everything through them because it's been an easy, an easy option in difficult times, but there are, there are other ways to get out information.

I mean, uh, before we hit the record button, I think you were mentioning Russell, you know, we, we, we didn't always have Facebook. I mean, so there, there are other ways to communicate, uh, with people. I mean, even just having a conversation with, with people down the street or writing a letter, letter to your local editor.

Yeah. Uh, in your local newspaper. I mean, there are so many different things that we can do. There are so many different platforms. Look at Joel Jamal. I mean, he's about to embark on a, uh, a big scale project that hopefully will have some involvement in, uh, down the track. So look, there are a lot of good things happening.

I don't think this is anything to, to, uh, get our knickers in and not over to be, to be quite frank. It's, it's, it is. Um, an indication of what's on the horizon there. I mean, you can see it. Uh, we we've got, uh, this mass extermination of chickens and we've got the fear coming out again. I mean, we've got, uh, little egg producers that are going, uh, to the wall now because of the, uh, the crazy acts of the Victorian government.

Uh, we've got, even in New South Wales, MRNA vaccines being peddled out to cows. It, it's just not gonna win. Uh, and, and you can see that the misinformation bill will, will have some effect. And I think this is just a shot across the bow and, and a reminder that we need to, uh, collaborate, um, and work together as a team to seek the truth.

Uh, and that's all we're doing. We're not cookers. I. Um, we had an email hoodie, didn't we? I don't know if you've read it yet from our good doctor, uh, giving us a, a, a blast again about having these cooker doctors on and, uh, uh, creating vaccine hesitancy and he's wanting to come on the program. Uh, but once again, uh, the former Deputy Chief Health Officer of Australia, uh, was on two GB in the last 48 hours saying that he wasn't going to have any more boosters because the science didn't support it.

Uh, so Dr. Nino, I mean, I dunno. How much more, uh, we, we need to do. I mean, there is multiple amounts of evidence. There is multiple, uh, peer reviewed reports. There is multiple, uh, esteemed doctors around Australia and around the world that are now saying that these MRNA products are not fit for human use.

Uh, we have to take their advice. We have to pause, you know, that that's, that's it. It's not a case of creating vaccine hesitancy anywhere else. Those products need to be examined as well. Uh, the whole regime needs to be looked at. We need to have a pause and a, and a, a thorough safety review of what's, what's going on here.

Uh, it's not a matter of having an opinion or somebody else having an opinion. There is a number of alarm bells, red flags, whatever you want to call them, that have said to us, you need to, you need to stop and have a look at what's going on for the safety of, uh, of people moving forward. Thank you. In my family, in my business originally, and certainly in the political office, we have a saying, if in doubt, don't until you know.

Um, when it comes to Facebook, you're right, because I don't know what quite know what shadow banning means, but sometimes we put out a broadcast, Facebook, and then we want to boost it. And if they didn't like it, all of a sudden it wasn't boosted. They wouldn't, they wouldn't accept the payment to boost it.

Cause they didn't like the content or they didn't say they didn't like the content, but normally to get, you know, three or 4, hits and it was getting 12 and 15, you know, it was just weird. So one thing we know is we don't have any control over another person's business. So we're using, and, and it's, you don't own Facebook.

We don't own Facebook. I have no investment in Facebook. So therefore the only way you can do it is find other ways to communicate. I mean, a lot of the, um, information that I get comes through rumble. And I think that, that those will be our future. We can't go with the mainstream every time as you and, um, Graham have not gone the mainstream, you've found another way.

And if people want to listen to you, they can go straight to you. And I mean, Hoodie's even, uh, you know, gone on a tour around Australia. I mean, that is a perfect way to communicate with the public. It's the best way. I think, um, Tucker Carlson's going on a tour around the US and he's coming to Australia. I think he's even coming to the Parliament for a, um, get together.

There's some really good things happening. And look, I do have to say this. I do have to say this, that, um, I, I look at a lot of other, uh, truth seeking podcasters, uh, especially in Australia. And I am perturbed by some of them. I think some of them are click baiting. Uh, they're trying to get a, they're trying to get following for various reasons that are not healthy.

They're pushing a narrative which is fear driven, it's having, creating anxiety in people, which is what most, most of us have been fighting the government for, this fear narrative that they've been pushing for the last four years to coerce. This is going on amongst some podcasters on the other side of the fence, and they're not doing us any favours, they're not being credible, they're not promoting anything that's credible or solution based.

Well, it's desperate for the whole country to realize what's going on. And we don't further that cause by running down incessant rabbit holes all the time and mouthing off with four letter words and carrying on and threatening, um, they're not doing anybody any favors. If you want to reach people, you've got to play the game with some discipline.

And that's all we're trying to do. We're staying in our lane and we're remaining disciplined. So I want to say this to some of these podcasters, you are leading a lot of people down a rabbit hole, which is going to end up going the same way as we're seeing now. You are creating a desire for governments to bring in misinformation bills.

Uh, they're just as guilty as well. We know the government has been pushing misinformation, safe and effective being one of them, you know, get vaccinated and you, and you won't trans, you won't catch the disease and you won't transmit it. And it'll keep you out of hospital. Well, that's all been blown out of the water.

That's why Dr. Nick Coatsworth said he hadn't had a vaccine, uh, hadn't had a COVID jab for two years. He's had three and he's not having any more because he said the science doesn't support it. So, you know, if, if this information, this narrative that we're trying to expand out of the echo chamber is going to succeed, some people need to apply some discipline and pull their head in.

And I think some people need to get off the whole platform altogether because they're not doing anyone any favours. I've said that, I'm not naming names, but I think we know who they are. Well that's why I have never, I don't criticise doctors or specialists. Um, I can forgive, um, anybody who in the first instance of this whole exercise went down the track that they went down, I forgive them, but I would have expected as the further information came to them that they would have changed their position or at least given decent consideration to a position and they haven't done that.

So, um, you know, I'm not here to bag anybody or to get onto other issues. But rather stick with the issues that I'm charged with as a responsibility, not only to my electorate, but certainly to the people of Australia. Absolutely. And that's why we have you on as often as we do. We're staying in our lane.

Our lane is, we're on a five lane highway. Johnny and I've said this all along. Never close the borders again. No more mandates. Um, get everyone their jobs back with compensation because a lot of people like the nurse we interviewed last night have been treated in a reprehensible manner. We want parents to be able to side on the vaccine status of their children without having to pay a penalty if they decide not to have them vaccinated.

And we want a All these things are really important because you have to have A thorough debrief post incident and the Royal Commission is the only way we can do that at the moment, even though it will be watered down. We know that by Albany. Um, but that's the five lane highway we have remained on and we will not stray down any other pathways.

We know, we know, we all know that we're being over governed. Even those people who don't agree with us will say that the government's too big and they've got, they're meddling in our lives too much. We've got to focus on the things that we can apply the most pressure to. And that requires us to stay real.

You know, the first stanza of the serenity prayer really holds well, Russell. God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference. If we followed that, we would apply the maximum pressure at the weakest point on the damn wall and the narrative would collapse, but all our resources and all our energies are being diverted down different rabbit holes.

And it's not having the effect that it needs to have for the benefit of a democracy like Australia. And it means the broader public that we need to have on side, and I call them the MCG cricket crowd. They're the people that need to understand the position that people like myself have taken over a period of time.

Um, they have no vested interest in, um, there's no money in it for them, nothing else in it for them. So, if I go off on some tangent, they say, well, why would I listen to him? Well, listen, why would I bother listening to him? I mean, you got to be reasonable and, and to be reasonable is to bring people with you at all times.

And I can remember I've met, I said this to you many times, but when I've stood against the prevailing thoughts in the parliament or in my party or, and did for good reason, I knew I had a very strong number within the Australian people supporting my position. You know, I don't just go off by myself. I go off with the, with the people that I represent.

Now, they may have said, well, you know, this time you've really stuffed it up. You got it wrong. Well, um, I don't think, I still don't think I have. I'd love to be wrong. I'd love to be wrong. On the effect of the vaccines and the overall effect of the lockdowns and the overall effect of the mandates. But I saw good people, good people who did not want to take the vaccine, taking the vaccine to keep a job and then getting very ill.

And even the ones that didn't get very ill were very upset that they had to take an injection that they didn't want to take just to continue selling tractors for heaven's sake. Or mandating farmers. That we won't take your milk unless you're vaccinated. How crazy is that? And by the way, I don't want NRMA, um, pumped into my cattle that I eat, eat the meat, beef either.

You know, we're getting, we're getting to a stage, we're getting to a stage now where people are going to start demanding, uh, are these cattle free of this, this, this, this, this before I'll buy you meat. Well, Malcolm Roberts was, was asking very similar questions last night, uh, uh, Russell the night before, maybe in the Senate estimates, he was questioning the minister about a spike protein in, in blood products.

Yeah. And whether it's safe to have a blood transfusion. And they couldn't, they couldn't answer that. They took virtually every question he, he, he had for them on notice. I mean, it's, it's just beggars belief that, you know,

they wouldn't know these answers. Well we've asked the department and the library and another of other sources, uh, about the, the cull of chickens.

In Victoria and who made the decision so far, we haven't had an answer. What, what, what was the decision all about? You know, was it two chickens of a crook? I want to know. It should be out there of, of what happened and where did the virus come from? Don't tell me it came from the Antarctic because there's not many chickens in the Antarctic, you know, so there's questions to be answered.

So we've asked all those questions of the library and of the minister and of the department and of the Victorian department as well because we want answers to that because there's something fishy there. There's something not right in the kingdom because it's not adding up. Where's the R-S-P-C-A and all this Russell?

I mean, if I was to knock a chicken on the head with a hammer in the front yard here, they, they'd be round here, WW with a dozen cars, uh, that have you locked up that, that, but what these people can just exterminate millions of chickens and not offer an answer. And remember, um, chicken meats now become one of the major proteins of consumed in a, in a, in Australia.

I mean, you're actually, you're actually affecting our food chain. So the Courier Mail, Russell Broadbent, the Courier Mail, uh, last week published a leading article on, uh, excess deaths related to vaccines. It was a big turnaround for the Courier Mail. They're not renowned. Uh, in fact, Queenslanders call the Courier Mail a spurious mail.

And this morning, one of the headlines was that backyard, uh, backyard chook, chook runs are going to be a major threat to, uh, to major egg producers in Queensland. So your backyard, your backyard chooks are a major threat. Now we can see where this is going. More registration, more licensing. More testing, more government, more cost and and the people who think that we're running down rabbit holes by suggesting these things are going on will be changing their tune when they're paying thirty five or forty dollars for a dozen eggs.

If they can get them, they're already one of the things I've said about I'm thinking this week. I always think the week before we go back in the parliament, what I might I like to say in the parliament and I'd like to say Uh, that middle class Australia, let alone the hard working, poorer Australians, cannot afford the Greens.

They can't afford the regulations. They can't afford the regulations on rental properties, which are sending the price of the properties up. They can't afford the taxes put on by the state and federal governments on to, on to renters. It is just outrageous, the attack on our own people. On our own people, you know, I believe you're about to have been climber on very shortly.

Um, I highly regard the man. He talks common sense the whole time and he does it in a very succinct, very succinct way. Yep. Um, and you know, I've had, um, interviews with people in the last couple of weeks where we've actually had people that were, were professionals, health professionals, professors, push the vaccines in the first instance.

Yep. Until their mates were dying around them and realised there was something wrong and reversed their position completely and now are, um, you know, very, very, they're campaigners to stop the use of these injections. You know, they're people that have turned around, you know, I hope Dr Nick Coatsworth has done a turn around.

I don't know. Yeah, I, look, he. Look, he's open to communicate. We have communicated with him by text message. He's returned. He, um, he strikes me as someone who's really wanting to bust out because I think he's, you know, he, he's explained a lot of things that he's very concerned about. Uh, he, uh, there was a post put out today with various statements being made by him in the media over the last four years.

And you can see his tune changing. To the point where he's saying, no, the science doesn't support it anymore. Um, you know, people like that, we need to encourage them. We need to encourage them to come out and say

what they need to say, because it's got to, it's got to crunch time, Russ. I want to ask you a question, Graham, and the question is this, when you were flying, Um, and you were flying planes was, was there ever a time that you had a feeling that something was wrong, a hunch that something was wrong, uh, something in your stomach that something was wrong and you needed to address it and you did address it and there was something wrong.

Yes, indeed. I did. Came out of nowhere. Came out of nowhere. That's exactly what I want to say is, um, when I was faced with taking the vaccine or not, I had. An uncomfortable feeling. So I tested the uncomfortable feeling with some experts and they confirmed my uncomfortable feeling. I can't explain that to you.

Um, but if I hadn't had that uncomfortable feeling, um, I would have gone down that track and not gone down this track, but where I would have been now, I don't know. Oh, look, one for example, I remember just thinking and to answer that question, I was doing a walk around inspection of a 737 in Melbourne, I was about to take to Perth, um, and I looked in the baggage hold at the rear that was open, waiting to receive more baggage, and I noticed the box, it was upside down with a dangerous goods label on it, and there was leakage coming out of the box.

I, uh, I managed to get the freight manager over to have a look at it and he said, Oh, no, I've checked the manifest. That's not, that's not an issue. Um, that'll be right to go. And this stuff had leaked down underneath the floor of the, of the cargo hole. And it got to the stage where my concerns were so nagging as I was waiting for the passengers to board, I called the company up and I said, I'm not taking that airplane to Perth.

And they swapped airplanes as they used to do in those days. And, uh, when they did a full inspection of that aircraft, the uh, material was toxic. And it would have been a very, very, um, a very unpleasant flight to Perth. We would have had to divert. Um, so, you know, it's just, that happens all the time. It's instincts.

That's what we're trained to do. And, and the medical profession is trying to do that. The nurses, uh, are excellent at doing that sort of stuff. Absolutely. They're brilliant at that sort of stuff. You know, when something's not right, Johnny, you would have had that happen a hundred times. Well, we had it happen in the plane, didn't we, Hootie?

All the circuit breakers started popping. Basket pit. Yeah, definitely. Look, it's, it's one of those things that you, uh. Can I interrupt? Can you buy a better plane? It's a beauty. Oh, it sounds like it. Ex Australian military. That's the problem. Oh, dear. But, uh, you, you have these things happen all the time, um, in the medical industry and there's no doubt about it.

You just have a gut feeling about whether somebody's got something wrong with 'em or, or they don't. And, and you go on a h and, and you. You do, uh, you, you, you know, I, I think it's a bit like the Harvard Russell. I mean, they didn't just build it with two lines, you know, you, you look, you look into the future and you, and your future proof, uh, the decisions you're making today to ensure that, uh, you know, the, the, the, the problems that might exist in the future, uh, are nullified and that, and that's, that's That's what, what you, what you do on a daily basis.

Well, strike a blow for freedom, which we do. Um, we've got a problem with the East Safety Commissioner. I just want to go, just want to say on the East Safety Commissioner, when Malcolm Turnbull, uh, created the East Safety Commission and the authority or whatever it is, it was for the safety of children on the net.

That was the whole remit, not to be censoring every Australian. Or Elon Musk or, um, you know, every international body. There was no authority for that. And that's why we're getting runaway governments now. Why didn't someone say to the E Safety Commissioner, Sorry, that's not your remit. Your remit is the safety of children on the internet.

Yep. Everybody supports that. Everybody. So why isn't she banning phones for under 16 year olds?

I've seen much younger than 16 year olds with phones with all the access would I would have been the end I would have. So, um, you know, free freedoms, one thing, but, um, You know, the, the care of children is very important and nobody's going to say no to an e safety commission looking after children, but she took on Elon Musk with millions of our dollars and anybody who's criticizing her is apparently going on a list and, um, there'll be retribution, I dare say, if you go on a list, I don't know what happens if you, I wonder if I'm on the list, I've got to check.

She can put Johnny and I on the list. That's all right, Karen. Well, it'd be, it'd be good company on the list. That's another badge of honor we could tick off. Yeah, I mean, once again, over government, over management, it's all just everything is overcooked. The goose is And overpaid. Overpaid, exactly.

Absolutely overpaid. Now, I've been pushing this myself the last few programs, uh, Russell Broadbent, and that is that, um, the reason rational people are starting to question everything that comes out of the government's mouth is because the government has overcooked the goose. The government has, um, has pushed too hard and they bribed and coerced.

And most people realized a long time ago, when you're being bribed, coerced or bullied into doing something, you can automatically assume that's not in your best interest. Yeah. So we're now about to be censored into oblivion by a government who put us in this position in the first place. I used to take vaccines.

If the government health department recommended that I should take a vaccine, I used to take them. And now I wouldn't go near a syringe if, if you paid me half a million dollars, there's no way in the world I'd do it. Um, and that, that's been created by this narrative that's been overdone by the mainstream media, the corporations and the government.

I do understand that, but I've taken vaccines to go into particular countries overseas. Yep. Which you would have done. Um, um, and if they said there's a particular vaccine you have to take to go into, I don't know, the Middle East or whatever, I'd still have to take it today. I wouldn't want to, but it's a requirement of me to travel into that country so I can make the other decision, which I've taken recently.

Don't go. Yeah. Yeah, exactly. You can make that decision. Don't go. Yeah. Yeah. Um, but, uh, so, but, but that, that vaccine is given to protect me. Right. Not to protect somebody else from me. And that's where the whole common sense in this thing has been lost and in government where government's putting us in a position that we need to prove our point.

And government says, and they've said it through their police force recently, only listen to what we say because we are the only ones that have the truth. Now that's been proved not to be the case in COVID safe and effective. And the effective part was the dangerous part because it proves that they didn't stop transmission, which they said it did stop transmission and it didn't stop you getting, um, the disease and being hospitalized.

And I think, I think I'm going to stop. stretch it out here, but we're still trying to get the figures. I think there's been a lot of fudging of the information that governments have at the moment, including the, um, ABS, the Australian Bureau of Statistics, changing the way they calculate excess deaths. Why would you change now the way you calculate something?

Why would you do that? I mean, there's a way we calculate unemployment. We've done it the same way. For about 15 years. So, you know, over 15 years, you can do it the same way. You're getting some constant result. You know, I dare say if you are flying your plane and the engineer on the ground said, um, Oh, John, we're, we're changing the way we're doing the air pressure on the tires.

Um, we're going to do it this way. You'd have to ask them why are you changing it's worked on this plane for five years. Why are you changing now? It just doesn't seem right to me. Um, and when things don't seem right to me, I get a bit of a sick feeling in my tummy, and I say, alright o, I start asking questions.

Because, you know, you know why I don't mind flying in an aeroplane? Because I know that pilot up the front wants to say, doesn't want to die.

And I reckon if he or she doesn't want to die, I reckon I'll be pretty safe. Getting back to the point you raised earlier about the, uh, professor who quoted the 2,260 odd thousand Yeah. Death due to, uh, vaccine hesitancy. 2 32 30,000. Um, also the other, the other thing that, uh, was doing the rounds when AstraZeneca pulled its, uh, product off the market, were all the health ministers around the world praising AstraZeneca.

For saving an estimated 65 million lives. Mark Butler said, use that figure. They all trumped out the same figure, AstraZeneca. We should be thanking them. We should be kissing their feet because I saved 65, 000 lives. Where did that figure come from? There's no evidence anywhere. That any vaccine, that's why we jumped on this figure of 230, 000 deaths in America because of vaccine hesitancy.

When somebody said, there's a English politician, don't know his name, came on and said, AstraZeneca saved 35 million lives. across the world.
