

2024-09-13 Graham and John talk about various issues and speak to Kate Mason

Hi, John.

It's good to talk to you. Lovely to be here, Alan. Where are you off to this time? I'm off to New Zealand. New Zealand? I'm going over to the land of the long white cloud, the silver fern, and that place where all the rugby players flog the daylight out of the wallabies. Well, you'll love it up there. I'm going over there and guess who else I'm going over there with?

Who are you taking? I'm taking Klaus Schwab. Klaus, yes. I'm taking, I'm taking, um, uh, I'm taking, uh, I might be taking Kerry Chant. And I might be taking my good friend Brad Hazard. Brad, yeah. Well, I've heard Brad might be going. Now, the, the only thing is, in order for them to come, they've all said they'll happily come.

But they'll not appear on stage unless Johnny Lart is there, so, unfortunately, I have to be taking you along too, John. Well, you better get another suitcase. No, mate, we're all excited because you're coming to, you're coming to speak with me. We're going to MC the Auckland event together, which will be live streamed.

We're going to have a lot of fun with some people and a lot of people are really can't wait to meet us and especially you because when I thought it was just me going a lot of people were saying we want Johnny to come to and, and, uh, it's worked out beautifully that you can be there and it'll be good.

Yep. And we can't wait. And, uh, we're going to try and get a couple of quick interviews with Angus Dalgleish and, uh, Paul Merrick. Yep. Uh, to bring to you and we can't wait to meet all you guys who live in the land of the long white cloud. We love you. We're Anzacs. We're Anzacs still. And we can't wait to meet, get photos, have hugs.

We might even pray together. Who knows? I mean, it's just, it's great. So be here or be square. Where's it being streamed to, Woody? Oh, the world, mate. They're even, they're even planning, they're planning a lack of activity on the space station that day so they can stream the whole thing up into space. It's, I mean, it's just amazing.

Can't get home. Yeah, because, yeah, because they sent a Boeing 737 Max up there to bring him back and something went wrong on the way. Boeing, what they call it, the Boeing Starliner. Well that's what, isn't that what Albo's got? Albo's got a 737 Max now, hasn't he? Um, do you think before he, uh, I don't know that he's flown in it yet.

I wonder whether he'll go in it or he'll put Bowen in there. I reckon Bowen should be the first one to go in it. That's what I'm thinking, yeah. Yeah, you've got to work out who can you most afford to lose if you want to win the next election and it'd have to be Bowen, wouldn't it? It'd be right up there.

Yeah. It would have to, it would have to be barred. Yeah. But mate, on, on other matters, look, we, we're, uh, we're going to interview a wonderful lady, uh, from Central Coast, New South Wales, Kate Mason. Everyone's been after us, interviewed this, this lady, her knowledge and research is exemplary on, um, on government strategies around land titles.

And we're going to be showing you an interview that we can tell you is valid. There's no conspiracies in it. It's not rabbit hole stuff. This has been properly researched from, uh, from, from government archives and, and, uh, all the nights are there on the internet, on the internet for people to go and do their own searching.

They don't have to dig deep for it. It's all there. And what you're about to hear is going to be shocking. However. It's not the end of the world because none of this stuff is enacted yet. You still have time to educate

yourself, and you still have time to gather in communities and sort out how you're going to deal with these issues, because forewarned is forearmed, and use this information to wake some people up.

So, we don't want you to be anxious and perplexed, I mean, it affects John and I just as much as it does you, but there's a lot of water to go under the bridge before any of this happens. And wherever there's time, there's hope, Johnny, isn't there? Yeah, that's exactly right, Hoody. It's, uh, look, it is alarming, uh, but this is in, uh, documents from the New South Wales government.

So, I mean, how much more evidence do you need that this stuff's going on, uh, in the background? Uh, if that doesn't wake you up, then I don't know what will. It's all gazetted. And folks, you need to, you need to educate yourself for the sake of your children and grandchildren. Please, you're in action now is going to lead them.

Absolutely tied up in the future. There's going to be no reason or, or even joy in living. Uh, it's, it's that serious and that it will be enacted if we don't stand up as a community and, and, uh, and say no. So we strongly urge you to do that. And we strongly urge you to make sure your political representatives know.

So yeah, voting for them on Saturday. So make sure that you're voting for the right ones because for the next four years, if you vote in the wrong. If you get dapes in there that aren't going to, um, uh, look at this stuff and ignore it, then we're in real trouble. Yep, we need to keep the woke dopes out of there because they're all over it.

They love it. You know, it's just bizarre. A group of bushwalkers sent us a message the other day, the bushwalking club in the Blue Mountains, uh, they went for a walk in the Blue Mountains and all the trails have been blocked off. There's hardly anywhere they can walk now. And there's ugly signs all over the place, prohibiting this, prohibiting that.

I mean, that's not Australia, everyone. Don't let it go down the gurgler. But on another matter, John, more serious and I believe more sinister, it gives me no joy to say what I'm about to say, but we have started archiving the testimonies of pilots in the airline industry in Australia, some of whom are dying.

They have been unable to work, uh, for various reasons and some cases because they were vaccinated and they've had an adverse reaction, serious adverse reactions. As some of them have, uh, uh, prepared now to record the testimony of how the airline companies have treated them in their darkest hours. It's not pretty.

We're not screening it straight away because we've been asked not to for the simple reason that if we screen them now, any chance they have of any kind of compensation or insurance payout that they're entitled to through their loss of license could be forfeited. And they want to leave their families with some money.

Now I'm talking about people who I know. I'm talking about people who I trust and I'm talking about companies, in particular Qantas, who is being led by the HR department, which stands for human remains, the legal department and the medical department, who have behaved criminally. Alan Joyce came out when the mandates were issued and he said, everything we're doing is lawful and reasonable.

That is the greatest lie that's ever come off anybody's mouth. Nothing they're doing is lawful and nothing they're doing is reasonable. Their legal, their legal teams are going in there with the mandate of crush them and keep them suppressed until they die or give up. We've had people in hospital undergoing emergency treatment being hassled by the legal teams of these airlines to come up with documents.

Not just, uh, just sign this and send it in. We're talking about hundreds of pages and the courts will not even allow the appeal. We're going to be talking to their wives as well. And I want all the pilots in, in Qantas and Virgin and the other airlines to know this. You, many of you did in good faith what you needed to do.

I understand a lot of you wanted to keep your jobs. I, I get it. I used to love, I love flying too. Don't forget, I've been there. I realize that some of you did it because you felt it was the right thing to do. Some of you did it to protect yourselves and your families, uh, from losing your homes and your incomes and protect your careers.

But some of you took it so you could go to the pub on Friday night and have Christmas in Bali. I just want you to know, I want you to ask yourselves a question. There are a bunch of people on the, used to be on roster, that you flew with, who aren't there anymore. Have you ever asked where they are? Have you ever wondered?

Are they not there because they refused to take the job and were, were sacked? Or are they not there because they've died from taking it? Or are they not there because they're too ill to hold a license now because they did take it? You need to ask that question because someone may, may one day need to ask that about you.

And how would you feel if nobody was inquiring or caring? You have a responsibility. It's a moral responsibility. It's called being an Australian. And I want you all to know that the things that this company that you work for is reprehensibly doing to your colleagues who are now on their last legs, they've lost everything, they're capable of doing to you and they will do it to you.

Because they are ruthless bastards, they really are. And you know it, you know how you're treated every time you, you're confronted with a new ABA, EBA contract to sign. You know how, how they, how they gild the lily and how they pull the spin. And I know that people in the flight operations departments of these airlines are not happy with the way the legal and the HR departments are treating their pilots and flight attendants.

So Qantas, uh, Vanessa Hudson. And I don't know who's, I think it's still Jane Hart, like a running, uh, running virgin. You guys are on notice. We're storing these interviews. For posterity and they could be released at any time given the approval of the people who recorded those interviews and they are kept in various locations on various hard drives and they will be used, they will be brought into the public domain and as one senior management person in the company said, if this gets out, we will look like a hat full of arseholes.

Excuse my French everybody, I don't like using language. But that's how it is. So you are on notice. Well, these guys, I mean, they're, they're not dissimilar to Bernie Banton, are they? Uh, you know, this is a very similar situation. Um, we're dealing with Australians that have just been. Left on the side of the road.

Um, injured. Nobody's picking them up. Ambulances are driving by.

It's horrific. So, um, watch this space everybody. Now we're urging anyone, uh, in the airline industry at this stage, who is in the same situation and you want your testimony recorded for posterity to be used later on, either in the event of your demise, to I hate, I hate this conversation, John, or in the event that there is some, some, uh, victory in the court or a defeat in the court or whatever, the Australian people will know your story and we will record it and we will make sure it's kept there for posterity.

I'm not trying to blackmail the airlines. I'm calling you to step into your responsibility and do what is lawful and what is reasonable because you file a pub test on everything. Vanessa Hudson, you came in, you came in with all this bravado about making a change. You haven't achieved a great deal at all.

You're still all fluff and mirrors. The whole company is still fluff and mirrors. There's so much stuff being hidden and spun into something that looks good. But the people know that Qantas is on the nose. They know your maintenance is shot to pieces. The aircraft reliability is shot to pieces. You can't buy aircraft because there's none to buy.

You purchased aircraft that are having major engine problems, brand new air buses, that you're really struggling to crew as well. I hear one of the subsidiary companies has ordered 60 or so of these A220s and they've only got enough crew to through, to, to operate three of them, John. How are they going to operate 60?

And why would anyone want to fly them in order to put on a Qantas uniform to fly them?

I mean, anyway, it's up to you. So let's, uh, let's bring this to a halt now and, um, and go to this incredible interview. Now we do say to you again, please just take it as an education. This lady is spot on the money. And share this around amongst your friends. It should be a topic of conversation in barbecues and every backyard in the coming season.

So, um, thanks for watching Club Grubbery, John. Any final comments before we go to Kate? No, look, just make sure you know who you're voting for on Saturday in their local government elections. It's so important, uh, that you vote these woke people. Absolutely. Absolutely. So, um, vote wisely, everyone, educate yourselves.

And what if another federal election in March or May next year? Um, who knows? God bless you all. And please enjoy this fantastic guest that we have for you tonight. Let's go to her now. Let's go to Kate Mason, John.

Well, here we are Friday the 13th, John. Great to be back on with our very special guest tonight, Kate Mason. Kate, it's great to have you with us. Thank you. Um, let's. A lot of people have been really contacting us saying, you guys need to look at Kate Mason. You need to get her on the program. And we've been doing a bit of looking at what you're doing.

And the research you've done is incredible. What I love about everything you're doing is you back it up with all the references. They're all, uh, government documents. It's all there. You've researched it on the internet. You're not making anything up and what's really important for everyone as we discuss what we're doing tonight is we know there's a lot of anxiety out there.

We know there's a lot of people perplexed and worried and there's a lot of information, a lot of misinformation, but this stuff is rigid edge. It's straight from government documents. It's been properly and well researched by this uh, incredible lady who must spend hours doing this for very good reasons, which we'll discuss in a moment.

But listen, we're not saying that all this is imminent, but there is the potential for governments to go rogue and enact this stuff. And we're in this position, John, as we've said, a thousand times. Because people have lost faith in the government, especially after the COVID 19 narrative. A large percentage of the population is growing more concerned about the way we're being governed, about the way we're being over governed in particular.

And it's creating a scepticism, which the government and the media are happy to call conspiracy theories and cookers and all that sort of stuff. When in actual fact, it's just people that have lost complete faith and trust in their government. Wouldn't you agree? A hundred percent. And, and here we are, it's Friday, uh, tomorrow there's an election, a local government election in New South Wales.

Uh, a lot of people are probably already voted by a pre poll, but that, that just demonstrates why this is so important to make sure that you elect people who you can trust, who are going to vote for you. Uh, provide, uh, some common sense in all this madness and stop all this woke nonsense from being deployed, uh, at a local level.

Because if they don't get rid of it, we're gone, we're bugged. We are. And what's really good about tonight is we're going to be talking about land titles. Before we do that, Kate's going to explain a bit about herself and how she found herself in this position. But I'm really keen, uh, John, given your position on the Snowy Valley Council as an elected, uh, representative for your ward, I'm really keen to have, uh, you two bounce off each other on what's going on, because I think our viewers will get the most out of that kind of interaction from you two.

So I'll, you know, I'll stay on the sidelines wherever I can, but, um, Kate Mason, tell us about your background. What were you doing prior to COVID and what got you to the position now where you've, you just keep unraveling more and more stuff from government sources? Okay. So I was in welfare for many decades, a couple of decades, and I did a lot of different, um, worked with a lot of different sort of people within welfare.

So in lots of different situations, and I also worked in councils, um, and I worked a lot with families and children and, um, also a lot of community development. So I'm very concerned with community actually having a. Proper say in things that affect them. And I'm very concerned about living actually in a democratic society or a country where the people know what's going on.

So, um, when the COVID mandates came around, I mean, I was feeling like something was very off. Regardless beforehand, but when it became mandated, I just thought that was complete government overreach and something I would not support. So I was fired from the industry that I was working in. And the other thing was that I was because I was in welfare and I was, I was seeing how the most vulnerable people, people in the most vulnerable situations were being affected.

Much more adversely than, um, because of the COVID policies and though the government was saying we've got to do all these lockdowns and mandated and coerced, coerced vaccinations to save the most vulnerable. I saw the exact opposite happening where the most vulnerable were made much more vulnerable.

And this has led to more and more people becoming more vulnerable financially, which is, of course, linked to having worse outcomes or, you know, becoming more vulnerable in society. And. So a bunch of us as welfare workers wrote testimonials about what we were seeing firsthand and sector letters, you know, about domestic violence and children and families and children in foster care, disability, et cetera, and sent them to the relevant ministers and sent them to all politicians, compiled it all and sent it basically to every politician in Australia and said, how have you risked assessed that COVID.

Is more serious than what you've done to people. And of course, didn't get really much of an answer back at all. Um, and so after that, I ran for IMOP because I just wanted to keep speaking. I was so concerned about what was happening. And then after that, I, which was a couple of years ago, I just thought I have to understand what's happening on a bigger level.

You know, nothing's making sense and I need to understand. So I've spent the last two years or more now researching really kind of just focusing. It's like I'm just trying to build. I do. I am quite a solid researcher. I have to understand things really intrinsically before I can move on to something else.

And I, Do not say anything. Most of the time, I try not to that. I haven't actually researched for myself to back it up. Um, so I've really been focusing a lot on food, what the synthetic food, which is huge now, what they're going to do with food. And that links in with the farmers and our farming land. And I've looked at, so even though I was working in welfare and I was seeing how they were treating people after I was fired.

Um, A couple of years ago, I realized that they're turning the welfare sector into a for profit model. So there's now going to be philanthropists under treasurer charms is bringing it in. It's the well being arena. They're well being budget and they're bringing into their privatizing the welfare sector where philanthropists.

Put up the capital and they get a like a 10 percent a year return potential return on these interventions into vulnerable people. And this really concerns me the model that it could be for profit, but the interventions for well being for children really concerns me because well being is being nebulously defined by the government and it means interventions in families.

So, I've looked at that a lot and then I've looked at digital ID and smart cities and lately it's been managed retreat and disaster adaption planning based on the most extreme climate change modelling which is huge and it's going to really roll out next year. Now, Kate, before I throw to John, you, you, um, you don't, you don't spend your life down rabbit holes doing this stuff, do you?

It seems that documents you produce on your, on your videos. A straight out of government websites. They're government plans. They're government or the United, because then most of nearly all our government plans are just United Nations plans repackaged. Um, so they're both of those. And I haven't been able to have much time to go much further than that, but it's, there's a lot in the government plans.

There's a plan rolling out every time you turn around, a consultation that nobody's aware of. There are so many plans in action that the people aren't aware of. So I just read as many of those as I can. So you can't be called a cooker. No, I don't, I'm not called a cooker so far. No, no. And we're trying to keep Not to my face.

Not to my face. That's, that, well, that's right. And, uh, none of us ever get called cookers to our face, but that's all right. Uh, we're staying in our lane and we just want more and more people to be educated because of what's going on. Johnny, Councillor John Larder, go ahead, mate. Well, I think first of all, Hody, I mean, what we need to highlight here is too that cages come from an area that, that really does not have any fat in the system.

Uh, so mandating, uh, those essential workers and here's another subset of people that, that have been really poorly treated, uh, and it's had a ripple effect, uh, down the line. I mean, Gigi Foster, Professor Gigi Foster, she's highlighted this on numerous occasions on Club Grubbery and elsewhere that. The, the effects of all these, uh, these actions that weren't really health related, but that they had an impact, massive impact, uh, social impact on, on the economy and welfare and other, uh, social, uh, issues that we take for granted, but that they're even fostering.

I mean, you, you, you, you're, You're, uh, you're in that area, Kate, you know, there wasn't really a lot of workers to begin with, with a lot of experience and to throw you out. Uh, I mean, that's had a massive effect on, on that area, hasn't it? It has, and there were really highly ethical workers that were fired.

So you've lost the sort of best, you know, the ones who get in there and really fight for people or, you know, like not let the system take them down and, you know, really try really hard. You lost those workers. So you've. You've kept it. I mean, I don't say this blanket because it's, but you've kept a whole bunch of people who aren't going to question anything.

And this is problematic. So they want to bring in more and more overseas people to take up these positions and then You know, so, so this is problematic in a way. Um, yeah, yeah, you've lost the people that would actually possibly fight back for you. And they weren't just government workers, were they? They were NGOs.

They were, they were huge amounts and disability. Like, I mean, I, I did a two hour submission cause I collected all, I did interviews with welfare workers. I've got a lot of work that's recorded on it and I sent it into the COVID inquiry. Um, a two hour video just of, you know, so we had disability workers that had like 30 year relationships with clients, you know, that were just fired.

And we had, we had, um, parents with children with disability who was so distressed because they were losing their child's worker that, you know, meant so much to their children and their child and. It was, it was really, really devastating. People were just yanked out of their positions and you're, it's completely about relationships.

It's completely about trust and you know, that long term longer term relationship where people can actually start to trust you. It's not about that. Just anyone can go in like a robot and just, you know, say things by, you know, just say what somebody else would say. It doesn't work like that, but there's not that acknowledgement of the sector.

So yeah, no, I was, I was horrified by what was done to the sector. So I suppose in some sense, uh, your, uh, sacking there or, or your unwillingness to participate in, in, in what has been an absolutely, uh, just destructive program, uh, as, as now given you some, uh, valuable insight into what's going on in, in council specifically.

And I, and I think people. Won't really understand out there just how vulnerable they are to this mess going on in our local councils. Uh, there are so many committees, uh, within council, so many little subset groups that really do have a lot of control over, over, uh, things that really aren't anything to do with council business.

And, uh, I'll probably kick it off for you. I mean, most councils would have what they call a local emergency management committee and, and the, the usual, uh, modus operandi of that committee would be to meet

maybe once every three months, and it would usually encompass people like police, ambulance, uh, New South Wales health, medical.

Local radio station, SES, RFS, uh, the council engineers, uh, big players in your region. So it might be in our case, uh, in Snowy Valleys, you might have Snowy Hydra, um, anyone that has major infrastructure that could fail and, and you would meet with those people and you, you basically have a look at, uh, how to protect your environment, how to, uh, manage an emergency and see if it happens.

Uh, you would organize drills, so you might have a drill if the, you know, and say, do a, uh, um, a dummy run on a, uh, on a dam bursting and, and, and a, and a tabletop exercise on an evacuation, for instance. But what, what we're, uh, seeing is, is I think some evolved, uh, involvement here. So. I mean, those risks would be around those sorts of things happening, you know, maybe an earthquake, uh, a major, uh, fire or, or, or thereabouts, but climate change was never part of that equation.

But I mean, here's a perfect example for, for people out there. Climate change is now obviously, uh, such a worry to the, to the government and, uh, and these work institutions, uh, that it has now found its way in, into legislation. That potentially has the, uh, the ramification of you being taken out of your home and your home solved.

Uh, these are the sorts of things that are going on, Kate. Maybe pick up from there. Yep. So I became aware in January, um, this year, I was listening to Reality Check Radio and they were talking about A town, an area in New Zealand called Kapiti and managed retreat and adaptation plans and certificates over houses saying the climate risks or projected climate risks for the place everyone had over their house was, was in process.

And I thought, okay, I better look for Australia because You know, I just got this terrible feeling and I looked in Australian, um, I looked at Australia and saw, you know, there's lots of reports, one in 25 houses, which was on the World Economic Forum website, but it's a Climate Council Australia report.

One in 25 houses uninsurable by 2030. Um, and it's sort of, you know, and I started to look around and managed retreat was being talked about quite a bit. So managed retreat is the removal of homes and infrastructure from properties. And it's preemptive. It's before a disaster, um, hits and it's what they, so I'll, I'll, I'll go in a, I'll go in a linear fashion.

So in February, the New South Wales government released the disaster adaptation plan for New South Wales. And in that they talk about their, so what they're doing. So. Well, about, I think the top 15 or 20 LGAs were ranked for the most at risk of climate change in the future. And Central Coast, where I am is number one out of that area.

They listed 20. Now, people may not be aware, but from above Newcastle, all the way down through Sydney to, um, you know, the South coast and out to the Blue Mountains is It's now become a global mega region under a six city plan, 17 out of the 20. LGAs, they said, are the most at risk of climate change sit within that area.

So that was, that's interesting that, you know, they want to build up this area where they want to make it a global mega city. They want to stack and packs, you know, this huge amount of stacking and packing apartments going up and, and they, and then it's also the most at risk of climate change. In that report, what they do is they compile different, um, so you've got all your hazards, you've got your potential flooding, you've got your potential bushfires, sea ocean rises, they've got earthquakes, they've got, um, They've got a number of different things.

I can't say them all right now. So what they do is they use the model because there's all different models. So they use a model that would be, this is the most extreme model for potential flooding. Then they use the most extreme, the most extreme model they can find. This is the most extreme model we can use for fire.

So, you know, they get all these different models used and say, okay, this is the worst for flooding. This is the worst fire. Then they compile all of those together. So they're not using one model that goes. There's potentially going to be a lot of rain, but that means there won't be any fire. They're using every extreme model and then compiling it to a risk ranking for you.

So that's what they've done. And they're using RCP 8.5, the IPCC 8.5, which is the most highest, um, Like projection into the future. If you ask as to how terrible all this is going to be with no abating of greenhouse gases, basically, and that hasn't that's not even meant to be used. So there's a report. That's the carbon brief and it states that, um, The creators of RCP 8.

5 had not intended it to represent the most likely business as usual outcome, and that its subsequent use as such represents something of a breakdown in communication between energy system modelers and the climate modeling community. So you've got all of that. So they use, and then in that report, and people can read this report, it talks about managed retreat.

They're going to bring out the managed retreat, the removal of property, and they say widespread managed retreat for New South Wales. The policy is going to be out next year. So that's one component of what's coming. The other part that's going to happen is areas are going to need disaster adaptation infrastructure.

So any risk or the hazards and the hazards will be identified, and then there's going to need to be disaster adaptation infrastructure. So now the issue with that is. And I, and I write all this in articles with all the links so people can go to, and I just basically cut out the government, you know, just to take a screenshot of the government plan and aspects of it.

So the issue is that governments are broke, local governments are broke. And this is from the local government, New South Wales, we're broke. We're going to have to stop rate capping. They want to stop rate capping. Councils cannot afford all the extra services that have been foisted on them with no additional money from state and federal.

And where this is leading to is that infrastructure is going to go into private corporation hands. So BlackRock, Larry Fink, has just bought a global infrastructure company, I think it's called Global Infrastructure Partners. And he states very clearly, governments are broke and private companies are going to fund infrastructure.

And we're not just talking about this disaster infrastructure, we're talking about roads. We're talking, so there's other reports saying Australia's basic infrastructure is at the end of its life. And governments cannot afford to put the money in supposedly, so this is we're going to have privatized disaster infrastructure and privatized normal infrastructure.

So we're going to be in a position at some point. So with all of these plans, and the other aspect to it is that new New South Wales so that there was a reconstruction act passed in 2022 in New South Wales, which allows the minister. So, um, To declare an emergency in an area for primary reasons or secondary reasons.

Once that's declared, they can take your land, they can compulsory acquire your land, do what they want with your land and sell your land. So it's all in place that act is all in place right there. This is preemptive. Um, this is preemptive as well. So you've got this scenario and situation where a lot of Infrastructure needs to go in to keep people already where they're living.

You've also, so what I can see, I guess, rolling out is that these big corporations are going to say the climate check, sorry, I'm jumping around a little bit, but there's also, cause there's so many reports, but they also talk about in their reports and documents, putting a climate change overlay over your house.

This is the projected. You know, thing of your house. This is the projected, you know, for what's going to happen to your area. So how I see this playing out over time is that a big infrastructure companies like BlackRock going to say, yeah, yeah, I'm happy. We're happy to put this infrastructure into this small town.

And who's going to pay for it and how are the citizens, the residents, they're going to pay for these overlays of much more, you know, much more costly infrastructure plus rates going up because councils are broke. And I see this as a movement into certain areas you're going to have to live and they do explicitly state in the state government plan.

It says private corporations could be used to move people and they can get the land in return. So there's a bunch in there that they're talking about, which is really nefarious in my view. Well, Kate, I think, uh, just to give some everyone some background out there, uh, people wouldn't understand that local government really doesn't have any funding.

Um, the, the only funding that you, you get is from rates. Now, in the case of the council that I'm in, the rates income doesn't even cover the outgoings of the, of the staff. So, so you say for instance, that the staff wages at 20 million, I think you'd probably get about 12 million in rates. So I mean, before you strike a blow, you're in, you're in, you're in the red.

Um, so what they're doing is, is essentially jumping a few steps, but they're, they're essentially, uh, there's no way for Pat to pay for roads or bridges or, uh, all those other services that you expect. You can't just keep increasing the rates. Because, you know, it's not sustainable, but you, you've essentially got the state and federal governments that are wasting our money and perfect examples of that are, you know, they've just, they've just signed over hundreds of millions of dollars to, uh, the PNG football team.

which is absolutely ridiculous. And, and in the Ukraine, they're getting a whole heap of money from us to fight a war that we've got nothing to do with. Now that money should be spent locally. That should be used to, to upgrade bridges, roads, and all the local infrastructure that needs going. You wouldn't need this reliance on these third parties if they were doing their job effectively.

And I'd suspect. That this is all part of a plot. I mean, why write that? Uh, into the future when, when you don't need to, when you can fix the problem. Now, all you need to do is essentially have your local governments put together a, an operational plan and a budget to deliver on the services and infrastructure and resources they need at a local level.

And that should be funded by the state or federal government. Uh, if there's any variation in that, then they cop it. Um, you know, that's, that's just how it should work. But, you know, you see all this nonsense being written in, uh, about your house being, uh, you know, basically taken back off you, uh, and, and sold to who?

I, I mean, It just beggars belief, doesn't it? Yeah, it's really concerning. So it comes down from the United Nations. Um, so they, the Sendai agreement or Sendai framework was signed in 2015, which is all about a disaster adaption and planning. Um, so that would have been under Malcolm Turnbull. But basically, and there would have been, there would have been, um, other, you know, things signed before that this has been in motion for a very, very long time.

So yes, we, um, it's, it's not organic to Australia. That's for sure. It's happening all around the world. There's some quotes, like 3 billion people will be moved due to climate change, um, projections in the future, borderless world, you know, we all just. Can no longer have countries, you know, because of this disaster climate change agenda.

Um, so yes, this is, it is really concerning what they're talking about. And the United Nations has said every single person in the world needs to be protected by warning systems. You know, that's their, their promise to the whole, every single person in the world. So it's not an Australian, it's not an Australian agenda.

It's a global agenda. And we're seeing it with, um, cows, uh, they want to reduce the number of cows per hectare. Uh, we're seeing it with mandatory, uh, requirements to tag electronically, uh, with, with livestock. Uh,

we're, we're, we're going to see it with regards to things like chickens, uh, that you'll have to register them with your local council, uh, bees.

I mean, hoodie, there's no way in the world that your, your local person voting on, on Saturday. would have any idea that this nonsense is going on. And once again, we've got a failure of the media to hold these people to account, uh, because this is the sort of stuff that should be in newspapers, that should be being spoken about, uh, to, to alert people to what's going on.

In the meantime, we're seen as cooks. Well, yeah, look, John, I, you know, it's interesting to see that people starting to rise up in different arenas now, like the farmers in Canberra, uh, these are fair dinkum Aussies that have been really pushing hard because they've had enough, you know, I wish they were there a couple of years ago, it would have been great if they were there then, you know, Uh, you know, they were still just getting on with life and thinking that everything was rosy.

Um, if they had been there with the everyday mums and dads, people who had never rallied before, like we saw, 90 percent of the crowd were people who'd never rallied. They were, you know, frontline workers who'd lost their jobs, their families, they were, you know, Grandparents pushing their grandkids around.

These were everyday Australians who never ever look for trouble, who always do the right thing. The country is starting to become very unsettled. And I sat down this afternoon and I wrote a list of the things that people are rightfully concerned about. And I'll just go through them. Water management, renewable energy, roads, agriculture, health mismanagement, education, social engineering, The government is involved in social engineering.

It has no right, you know, to do that. It's there to provide services like local government, uh, social engineering. We're over governed. We're over legislated, useless spending, you know, best, best part of half a billion dollars on a referendum that only divided the country. There was no need to waste that money.

We're wasting money like drunken sailors. Um, the uniparty system we have now, Greens, Uh, Teals, Nationals, Liberals, Labor. It's one party, everybody. Everybody knows that. They've had a gutful. Nothing ever changes regardless of the election. Uh, we've got a corrupted legal system. And I don't mean corrupted as in people are on bribes.

I'm not saying that. Well, they probably are. But it's corrupted and it's become unworkable. Uh, you've got to be Clive Palmer to be able to see anything through in a legal action to get protection. We've got corporate greed and interference, which, you Katie's been talking about with Blackrock and Vanguard, that's, that's happening.

You know, this is, this is Klaus Schwab's great reset. That's what we're talking about. Um, you've got resource management, re centralization as opposed to decentralization. You remember, The last few decades, our governments were trying to get us to move to the bush, you know, take your industry to the bush.

Let's have government departments located in Albury or, or, uh, you know, in, in, uh, in Wagga and things like that. So we've gone through that and now we're coming back. They want everybody back in the cities. Freedom of speech has been stripped away. Media propaganda is another big issue. Immigration. And an overpowered bureaucracy.

Now there's about 25 things that average everyday Australians are pissed off about. Now, if they were all, if we were all pissed off about all these things together. It would be amazing. And as we've said in the past, people who slept through the COVID debacle will probably wake up when they're forced into a 15 minute city, when we lose cash, when we're not eating meat anymore, when you can't have chickens without a license, and then you're not given a license.

All these things are going to wake people up in gradual stages, but we all need to be awake now because these things are coming. So we are in a real state in this country. We, we have got to do something differently. We

have to do something differently politically. Um, we've, we've got to do something to get real people into Parliament because it's obvious.

Look, the farmers were saying in Canberra, uh, every drongo in that house is just in a bubble. They haven't got a clue what's going on. If these farmers were taken off the land, these drongos would go to a restaurant and they wouldn't know what to order because there'd be nothing there. I mean, people have had enough.

Every day Australians who just do the right thing all of their lives are ready to boil over and these governments have a responsibility to make sure that never happens. We've got to get ourselves out of the United Nations. We've got to distance ourselves from the World Economic Forum. And we've got to start standing for ourselves.

We have to rebuild industry. Look at the drama that, that, you know, people like Luke Sutton are going through with Drifter. You know, they're, they're, they're in a dreadful state because of government overreach and, and, uh, union interference and all that sort of stuff. And we've got no manufacturing industry for goodness sake.

We can't even make saline in this country, John. We cannot even manufacture salt water for basic medicinal purposes. We have no car manufacturing. Our last steel mill's just about to close down. We are a basket case. And if they think that the people are going to sit back and watch this happen, over the next 20 or 30 years, they're going to ramp up the dumbing down.

They're going to ramp up the, the mismanagement and, and, uh, and stifle freedom of speech and censorship. And the people are going to boil over and on their heads, be it John. And they can't say that they weren't warned. We have been warning them, John. We warned them in the Senate. We have been warning them from the microphones on the stages.

We have been warning them on this program. We have been warning, warning, warning, not driving people down rabbit holes. We want to get these mongrels out of that bubble and out into the real world so they can see what's going on. And the sooner they do that, the better, because they're, if they think they have a political career, career, and that's what they're in there for, I can tell you, it's not going to last very long because the people are going to throw you out.

And I'm not trying to get people to do that unless it's by proper legal means. But we've got to really hold this government to account every single one of them. And you imagine what, what, I mean, Kate's done a magnificent, um, you know, job uncovering this. Imagine what you haven't uncovered. Oh, there's a lot, like there's so much in the government plans, but, um, yes, I'm sure there's a lot that's not publicly available as well.

Um, but there's more than enough to keep me busy with what's in the government plans. But there's, the problem is, so like, you know, with what's happening with the farmers, Just two days ago that our food body for Zanz, Australia and New Zealand food body, they, they finished their submissions to public submissions.

They're going, what they are, they're hell bent on no longer labeling GMO food. So genetically edited food, lab meat, et cetera, will not be labeled as such. So how, what I see is all the bio, uh, So, you know, biosecurity threats that are rolling out, you know, the killing all the, of the bees in the New South Wales, poisoning the natural environment, their fire bombing chemicals down on Queensland to try and kill a fire ant at the moment in, in New South Wales, it was Varroa.

Um, you know, the chickens, whatever else, because of all this one health model and they blame it all, they're going to blame it all on climate change. You know, so climate change, they already are climate change is going to make it so much worse with viruses and diseases and animals, you know, issues with animals and so they have to track and trace all the food systems under the United Nations, they are huge proponents under sustainable development goal number two, which is zero hunger, huge proponents of synthetic food.

So it's going to be replaced. The natural food is going to be replaced by this synthetic food, which we are expected to eat. And progressively if Fizan's gets this through, and again, it's a global agenda. It's not just happening in Australia. If they get this through, we are going to lose our right to eat natural or organic foods.

Um, yeah, well, yeah, it'll just be this sort of goop that they're making and playing around with all the DNA. So. So yeah, everything's purposeful, you know, it can look like out in the outside, why would the government do this, but it's all purposeful. There's a lot of plans that have been in action for a very long time and they're just COVID opened the door.

So I, I was, you know, like concerned about COVID. But it wasn't too long and I thought there's so much more going on and COVID's just opened the door to a lot of plans that have been worked on for a long time and now can be, you know, brought out into the open and just enacted and passed through legislation.

And that's exactly what's happening. And so I've, I started this as well because I noticed in America, a lot of people focus a bit more on America and even in Australia, we focus on America. So a lot of sharing of American videos, but I'm like so much is happening in Australia and there's just not enough people talking about what the government's doing in Australia.

So that, so I'm always wanting more people to engage. With what is the actual government doing this so much with the environment, they're making it into a market, um, for wealthy investors to be able to invest in. So once people are moved off land, they will rewild that land and wealthy corporate entities will be able to, um, you know, trade in that.

So this ecosystem gives fresh air to this much extent or this much, you know, pollination services or this much relaxation to the public. So they'll, they're putting prices and markets on everything. So these, this is what I really can't stand. Like Chalmers, Treasurer Chalmers talks about it's This is, this is after capitalism.

It's meant to be a values based after capitalism model, but it's not. It's a complete making a market on things you could not make markets on before. Nature, children, children's learning, welfare. Everything's been commodified and, and there's basically gonna be two, two different segments of society. The impacters who, who are funneling their money, you know, the billionaire kids funneling their money through into impact.

It's all called impact markets and the people that are impacted on for the common good. And I know that sounds a little bit, it's quite complex, but that's what they're doing. They're creating impact markets and funneling money and funds through that way to fund certain agendas. Yeah, we're seeing, uh, just recently I've been looking at posts from a couple of groups that are setting up on social media who are bushwalkers.

Now they've gone bushwalking in the Blue Mountains and found that 80 percent of the tracks they used to walk on have been closed off to public. And they've filled the area with signs warning people, so they've totally destroyed the environment with signs. We've got the Victorian Natural Resources Management Scheme that's going on down there.

If you're caught walking off a path in a national park into the bush, you can be fined 1, 500. You're not allowed to swim in certain locations. I mean, we, we, we're losing the plot and Australians are like frogs in the, in the boiling water. They're just being brought to the simmer and they don't even know that they're being cooked.

Uh, and, and, and people are busy in the background sniping, Oh, these guys are cooks and these guys are, you know, anti vaxxers and these guys are rat bag, whatever. But there's going to come a time when we're all going to wake in fright. We're going to wake up one morning and realize that we've lost our country.

Well, it all happens. It's so, uh, under your nose, Woody. I mean, it starts really with things like councils putting in, uh, alcohol free zones. I mean, this is all just conditioning. It's all just more and more, uh, layers of, uh, bureaucracy and madness. And then it just escalates, uh, into more and more madness.

Uh, you know, in, in, in the main street in Tumut now that the Rangers are out there. Finding anyone that's parked there for more than an hour. I mean, it's completely mad. Uh, you know, they need to get rid of all this stuff. Uh, get out of people's lives. I went to the tip the other day to empty a wheelie bin.

A 200 litre wheelie bin cost me 22. 50 for one wheelie bin. I mean, so what do people do? People on farms are burning their rubbish because they can't afford to go to the tip and pay that every week. And there's no garbage collection, so they're burning their rubbish. And what effect does that have on the environment?

I mean, the ripple effects go on and on and on. They dump it in the national park as well. I mean, there's no end to what, what goes on when people are desperate. Uh, what could possibly go wrong? Um, so what do we have to do? Okay. Can I just say one more thing that I would like to put on people's radar, which I'm only just have a look at.

But, um, so mid next year, a consultation, a submission consultation with the public that no one knows about happened ended at the, you know, a couple of weeks ago. I didn't know about at the time. So, by mid next year, the government's talking about putting energy ratings on existing homes. So, so far that's been done on new builds and so you're going to have an energy rating.

They want a five star energy rating on every home in Australia. And, um, yeah, so I'll read out the list of things that need to be done. So they're saying in some documents I saw, it says that most Australian homes are about 1. 6 energy rating and the need to get up to five. So they're looking at thermal upgrades, electrification.

So everything has to be electrified within the house, ceiling insulation, um, curtains, so all ceiling in the house, ceilings, ceiling in the house, curtains, and curtains, external roller shutters, reverse cycle, heating, cooling, heat pump, hot water, induction cooktop, solar, PV, I don't know what PV is, wall and floor insulation.

Um, double glazing of your windows, heat recovery, ventilation, investing in all. So that's all these upgrades that we're going to need to do on our houses. And this is all corresponding with the time when the, the policy will come out about widespread managed retreat, the climate change overlays over your house, which will lead to your insurance is skyrocketing.

You know, for many people, um, the disaster adaption planning starting to be rolled out in council, which we're going to have to pay for. There's a perfect storm coming for home ownership. And then they talk about, so they've got like, they're going to do green loans. So if you, if you're willing, so if you don't do these upgrades, what they're talking about in the moment hasn't been finalized, but they're talking about, you will not, it'll, it'll be on when you try to sell your house.

It'll be on that. And it'll be impossible to rent your house. So you can get these green loans and I looked at it quickly today. I think it's Westpac. It's 4. 5 percent for you to upgrade, but you can only get a 50, 000 loan. And there's another one which was a 3. 5 percent and you can get a 50, 000 loan. Now, I think for most people to be able to upgrade to that level, it would cost more than 50, 000.

I'm looking at retirees. You know, who, who can't get another, can't remortgage or get another loan or, you know, and people are already struggling so much financially. And we're looking at all these additional costs. So the government is, is doing something terribly wrong to the people of Australia. And it's heartbreaking.

It's really heartbreaking that they're doing this. Um, it's so unfair. I mean, I understand that you shouldn't, you know, for renters, it's really important that they don't live in substandard housing. I understand that, but this is so much bigger than this. And, um, it's just they're making it. So how many people you bring out a managed retreat thing, or you say, you know, you get a climate overlay of your house, which means your house drops in price.

You can't afford the insurance anymore, then it comes up, well, we've got to do these costly upgrades, but it might cost you 200, 000, your house may be at so much, you may not even be able to get a loan because it's no

point in, you know, doing this, your house is too substandard, you know, etc. There's so many scenarios that are going to roll out with this.

And I'd say that most people, if they have a climate change overlay of the house, plus, um, you know, it's on the cards for managed retreat, plus, and they've got to potentially upgrade, they're probably going to get out. You know, at that point, so they've created it where four conditions are coming through at the same time.

Perfect storm, isn't it? I mean, you know, we we've seen this in years gone by, you know, state governments wouldn't allow people to lease a car that was a V8. Uh, you, you've got to put, you know, uh, fences around backyard swimming pools. Uh, but you don't have to do, do the dam. Uh, you, you know, there's crazy stuff out there.

We've just gone completely nuts. Um, and, and here's more, more and more examples of it, but at a higher level. Uh, so all this bushfire rating stuff, you can just imagine and they'll be wanting to say, righto, unless you do this, you can't build your house and it's going to cost you 50 percent more to have this fly screen that's, you know, allegedly impenetrable.

Uh, Absolutely. They talk about disaster as well, like your house has to, and, and this is the thing also with this arena that we're in, even within this housing, they talk about in a document, it's, it's, as the tech increases, you'll have to keep upgrading your house. As the climate change projections worsen, you'll have to keep getting more and more disaster infrastructure.

So we're not just talking about. Okay, you've done it once and that's it and you're left alone. It's, it, it, climate change is the gift that keeps giving for nefarious actors within this world. And I just also wanted to say that, you know, we've got Resilient Sydney in, um, which is all about disaster adaption and as well in Sydney, we, that's, that's a Rockefeller funded initiative.

You know, started in 2015 with Rockefeller money, we've got Rockefeller center stage with all this disaster risk and they've changed the wording and the definitions around, around all of this as well. So it used to be like, okay, so you've got a hazard. So resilience or used to be like, there's a hazard and how resilient are you to that hazard?

It's now changed where it can be a compiling of potential issues that may or may not happen, but you have to adapt to it basically. So they've got an open. It's open slather, so you've really got to trust where it's coming down from and do your research and how this has all been defined. And then you have to really trust that and how this is going to lead to a massive asset shift.

Do you think that's okay? Regardless of what you think about climate change, if even if we were in a potential enroaching emergency, couldn't we do it better than this? And fairer to the people of Australia or all around the world? Rather than just, we are going to own nothing. John, when we were in Korokai during the floods.

The people did the work. You know what, when the fat hits the fan in Australia, it's the people that do the work. Now, when the people turned up at Corakai to do the work, the SES wouldn't let them fill sandbags because they didn't have a green tick for their, for their vaccine status. Now, the, the, these bureaucracies and these quasi government organizations are going to have to get out of the way.

Now, look, we are in a situation where we have We have in Parliament, we have in our, in Canberra, a massive building filled with drongos. They have to go. The whole lot of them have to be replaced. We have to start afresh with something new. Now, you know, there's a whole bunch of people who are getting politically active now.

There's a whole bunch of people ready to do something, but because they're all divided and split everywhere and the uniparty system and the electoral system is such, there's no cohesive action to bring it all together. There has to be a plan to bring the independents, who all agree that this stuff has to change, and the minor parties into one cooperative that makes a massive difference and puts the uni party on notice.

This is a global thing. It's not just happening in Australia. We're seeing it in America. The union party thing's happening in America. There are people I'm sure who were working on this behind the scenes and they need to be listened to. We have got to do something because those elected representatives and the overpaid unelected bureaucrats are selling our country.

They are allowing the unallowable to happen to this nation. And you know what, everyone we're letting them, we are letting them. It's up to us to get really, really active. I mean, you know, I'm 71. I haven't got that much time left for me, but there's a whole bunch of people out there. We're all doing our bit, but let's all do our bit together.

You know, running down rabbit holes about all these other nefarious things that are going on, that's all well and good. You can prattle on about all these different agendas, but at the end of the day, this country is being sucked away from you without you knowing. And people who are worried about a whole bunch of stuff they can't change and will never change are being distracted from the real issues which Kate Mason is uncovering just by doing normal research through proper channels.

Well, I can, I can tell you firsthand, Woody. I mean, I can give you examples. I mean, where people would have built houses 50 years ago, and there wouldn't have been an issue. People are now buying properties. Uh, they're overinflated because they've got a building right. And not every property has what you call a building right.

So the, the, the ability to apply. To put a structure on there to live on, uh, through, through your council, a development application and they're, they're sought after, especially in regional areas where you, you, you can't, uh, not every piece of land has a building, right? So, you apply to the council to build your, your dream home and it gets knocked back and they say, oh, you can't build that there because you're in a flood zone.

You're in a one in 100 year flood zone. We can't have that there. Uh, and even if they do let you build it there, they make you go and get, uh, you know, hydrologist reports and, you know, reports from, uh, the people you've never even heard of, uh, hundreds of thousands of dollars sometimes, all this stuff. And then, uh, you know, when they say no, it ends up in the land environment court and then they say no.

And all these people are just, you know, virtually sent bankrupt because they're just trying to build a home. A great Australian dream. It's about to become the Great Australian Nightmare, Kate Mason. It is, and they also say in plans that because it's so important for communities to stay together, to support each other, they want to move communities en masse with this managed retreat.

So that's in the state, New South Wales state plan, which implies that you're going to move a whole bunch of people into a certain complex. So this is where I see it really moving in, because if you look at the, the plans, government plans, but also, you know, what the World Economic Forum, the UN say, they, they, they talk about an era of rolling crisis, crises.

So it's all the cyber security, the pandemics, the climate change, emergency, um, terrorism, everything's going to be an emergency and they need all this surveillance systems put in, this smart surveillance systems put in. So I really do see. Where this is, they are, they are trying to take this, is that this is the only area you're safe.

Basically, the natural environment is too much of a hazard to live in anymore. It's too risky. And because, so it's a hazard anyway, because I mean, there's always a potential for something to happen in nature. You can never a hundred percent say there won't be, but they, this is their argument, but the risks because of climate change are getting too much.

So we have to move people away from these hazards and these risks, which means that we have to move away from nature. And we have to be in this sort of cyber, you know, cyber surveillance state of a, of a life stacked and packed around one common park, you know, where way too many people are stuck together and can't stand it.

So, so this is their vision. I've, I've looked at it for thousands of hours and I can say with assurance, this is their vision and what, what they're trying to do. So we need more people. In Australia to really get, I would really implore Australians to start to pay attention to this level of stuff that's happening.

And I have, I mean, I've got a sub stack and it's Cape Mason sub stack. I've got everything I've written. I've talked about here documented on there. So you can go to the plans and I've, I pull out the different exerts from it, but I don't actually say my opinion. I mean, I say my opinion a bit, maybe 1%, 99 percent of what I say is what they're saying.

Well, you're like Dr. John Campbell, the way that's the way he manages the pandemic crisis. He just reports on what he finds and leaves it to everybody else. And you know, that's probably the best way. Um, yeah, Australia will have to mobilize. Now, the other thing that concerns me is in enforcing all of this guys.

Um, they're going to turn our police force into a, uh, a paramilitary organization. And we're seeing that roll out in Victoria already. We're seeing it in the last few days. We saw it a couple of years ago in Melbourne. And we've seen it in other areas where in Queensland in particular, where the police were, uh, that's why there's so many people, so many police resigned and there's so many guys who aren't enrolling into the police force because they know what's coming.

They don't want to be used like that to hurt people, they're there to protect people. I mean, and what happens to our military? Not that we've got one. Our military is 60,000 people strong, the Chinese military have 28,000 men in special forces, just in their special forces unit. I mean, where does all this end?

I mean, the potential is horrendous. And it's not, this is not designed to frighten anybody. It's designed to wake you up, because collectively we have strength and power and we can change this. But not if half of us are just gonna sit in the, in the lounge room and watch 60 Minutes and Sunrise and the Today Show.

Because you're just being dumbed down and it's all going to happen around you and you're going to have nowhere to go.

Well, it's a worry, uh, you know, and it opens up another bigger problem, doesn't it? You know, what's going on with the generals in this country, uh, from the military. I mean, all these woke people, they haven't got two neurons to rub together. Because they're allowing all this stuff to go on. We've got people that are just so, uh, I don't know if corrupt is the word, but they're just so they're just in a bubble and they just, they just carry out whatever Canberra says.

Uh, and, and nobody will question anything. Nobody can talk back. Nobody can have a, an opinion of their own. Uh, that's why we're seeing all this misinformation bill and, uh, and all that stuff coming in because they don't want free, free. Thinkers out there, they want people just to do as they're told. Uh, and that's why we're being labelled what we're being labelled as nutbags because we're the problem and that's why they want to get rid of us.

Well, Australia, you must listen. Australia, we are in a crisis, a bigger crisis than we've ever faced in our history. There's no doubt about that. You can, you can pretend it's not happening. You know, we could go on all night about this. It's up to you. If you don't wake up, then you can't, you've got to accept the consequences, but you're going to drag a lot of people down with you collectively.

We can do so much. We can just say no. I mean, people, people will die when they're going to be forcibly removed from their homes. People will not stand for that. There will, there will be, there will be violence. It's inevitable. And that violence has been programmed already and underscored by secretive governments who can't tell the truth to save themselves and who have no idea what's really going on, relying on computer modeling and corporations to tell them what to do.

Uh, my father would roll in his grave. Well, a perfect example of the madness would be Corakai. Those poor buggers there will be allowed to rebuild, and there won't be anything said, but if you had a vacant block of land next to one of those houses that got flooded, and you put in a development application to build a house, They will likely knock it back.

So they're also going to do things like have, and this hasn't been worked out yet, but they're going to have trigger warnings. So at a point where this area is no longer, you can't live in it. And it can be, I think it will be things like so much percentage of the homes can no longer afford insurance. So maybe it'll be like.

30, 40 percent of people can no longer forward assurance. If there was a disaster in that area, it would cost the government too much. So therefore, we've got to pull, you know, pull this area people out of this area. Um, so yes, so this is all unrolling. It's all unrolling. So it's not too late. It's like, it's not in our councils.

This, I mean, this disaster adaption planning will probably be in next year, I imagine, but. Yeah. Like if people start to pay attention, if they get a sense, I mean, I've got six or seven articles, I've got hours of videos, just start watching them. I'm just reading what the government's saying, and then you can be set and ready when it starts to come out in your local council and they do need to do some community consultation.

So that's the time you can go along actually well resourced and researched and put some things on the agenda that probably. Even the people who are, who are rolling out these plans have no idea about. Well, I don't know how people are insuring properties to be honest with you. I mean, they can't afford a cup of coffee.

They can't afford to clothe themselves. They can't afford, uh, basic, uh, necessities. Uh, let alone, you know, 5, 000 to insure their house. Crazy. Well, some people are getting like 20, 000 a year of quotes now. So they just aren't, they just can't, you can't, nobody, I mean, nobody, some people can afford 20, 000 a year.

And I think this is going to lead to, I mean, you know, what is it going to be? Like, it's not that the wealth, the super, super wealthy, they are still going to be able to find a way to live in the lovely beachside suburbs and have a beautiful life there. So I don't know exactly how that's going to play out there, but I imagine potentially they'll have to pay for the infrastructure.

You know, whoever's left there might, you know, so you just get the supremely wealthy being able to live in the coveted spots because it's basically all along the east coastline that they say is, is, you know, cause of the, the projections for sea ocean rise. So they want everyone in land.

And you've got, um, you've got climate scientists and, uh, astrophysicists like Willie soon in America that are saying. This is just normal. This is a cyclical temperature change. It's not being caused by man and he's linked it to sunspot activity and he's got all the documentation to prove it. We're doing all of this for nothing.

Yeah, it's a big, um, like I was listening to Extinction Rebellion the other day. I just, I don't know, it came up, so I just listened to them and they're, they're blaming climate change for the loss of insects. And I'm just like, well, the reason we have a loss of insects in Australia is because the government's poisoning, keeps poisoning everything, but that will be blamed on climate change.

Everything can be blamed on climate change. So it's a very, yeah, regardless of what, I don't know, I keep saying the same thing. If you look at the, what they want to implement under climate change strategies, it's synthetic food. It's, you know, blocking the sun and spraying things in the air to block the sun.

It's, it's just synthetic. They want to create a synthetic environment and that we're all digitalized. We're all under this surveillance tech. It's, it's horrific what they're actually saying. So we, You might agree with climate change. Do you actually agree with what they're saying is going to be the answers to climate change?

That's another, it's another question altogether. It's all centralizing. So even with this synthetic food, it means it's all patented and our food sources are completely controlled. Centrally, it takes it out of average people's hands

that they can actually produce their own food. Who's going to want to live in a world like that anyway, I'd rather not be around than live in that.

Well, it's the children, isn't it? It's the children that are going to grow up in this world that that's really what I'm concerned about. It's that they're going to live in this manufactured world where they intervened upon and for their wellbeing and, you know, eating this terrible food and being injected every time they turn around and, you know, not able to actually speak properly and yeah, it's, it's not a good.

Scenario. I know I sound very, very bleak, um, but I don't feel like that. I feel like this is what is happening and we need to, we are up to the task and we need to find that. So yeah, I think I spent quite a bit of time, maybe about a year where I was really freaked out by this sort of bigger arena, but I don't feel like that anymore.

They are doing this. Our only option is to sort of get up to speed. It certainly stinks of, you know, uh, you'll, you'll be, you'll be fed and you'll be housed and you'll be, uh, kept, kept well if you do as you're told. And you'll be happy. Yeah. You'll be happy. It will tell you when you can be happy and when you can't.

You can eat chocolate. You can eat chocolate. You'll be happy. Synthetic chocolate. Synthetic chocolate. Yeah. But I don't know if people will be healthy. No, they won't. They won't be. They won't be Kate. And um, anyway, I mean, you just, you know, that, that, that to me is why faith is so important. That's why I'm really doubling down on my faith relationship.

I, you know, because to me, the only way out of this is going to be divine intervention eventually. But people have got to wake up. People have to wake up. Um, but on our heads be it. We've been dumbed down, systematically dumbed down for so long by corporate mainstream media. Okay. Um, it's, it's all part of the process.

It's 1984 and it's happening on our watch, everybody, and it's up to us to make a difference. So we need to call on all strategists out there who have a heart for freedom. Those clever political strategists, they need to get their heads together really quick. They need a big think tank happening. And all these minor parties, One Nation, Pauline Hanson, Clyde Palmer, UAP, um, you know, um, uh, Rod Culleton, all these people need to put their egos aside.

Every single one of them. It's not about you anymore. You can't be the one who says, well, we're going to rule in our own right. Those days are gone. The people need representation that stands for their rights, their human rights, their basic way of living. And you guys need to put all that garbage aside. Stop trying to be the party of choice and create something where independents and new minor parties can work together for the betterment of what's going on in this country.

It has to happen yesterday and the sooner it happens the better. I don't know what more we can say. This has to change political. I mean, the, the alternatives of it not changing politically are too, too dire to even contemplate. I mean, you're talking about revolution and you don't want to go down that road when diplomatic, um, uh, you know, posturing can make a whole lot of difference if we get the right people in there and get rid of the wrong people who are, can, I've had so many guys who've gone into parliament, elected for the right reasons, gone into the Senate.

And the minute they get there, they're briefed by the bureaucrats and told to toe the line. And if it's not the bureaucrats telling them what they can and can't do, it's their party telling them. You know, for goodness sake, if you're elected in there, have the guts like, you know, like Russell Broadbent and Jared Renick, Malcolm Roberts, all these other guys, have the guts to stand up and say it, but we need more of them.

So it's better to actually know what's happening. I always feel, and then to, to be able to work together. So I, I agree with you. I'm, I'm sort of like, where are the strategists? Where are the. You know, I know there's a few lawyers, but we need more lawyers looking at all the different legislation that's coming through and all the acts and finding that one or two lines within a whole act that is, has these serious repercussions because there's a huge amount being pumped out all the time.

So I just think there needs to be more people coming forward who can help. Who can help more and more people reading government plans and, you know, and taking over different chunks of what the government's doing and putting it out. Okay. So this is what they're doing with the environment. This is what they're doing, you know, so different people take on chunks of where we're up to.

Yeah. Well, there's a lot of people out there that aren't lawyers. They've got a brain for the law. You know, there's a lot of very, very clever. Not amateurs, but people like yourself who do their research and study the law and understand it a whole lot better than some of the lawyers do. I'm not talking about, you know, common law stuff.

I'm talking about people who, you know, know that there are certain ways to fight a legal battle and get a win. We interviewed one the other day, uh, Raffaella Tasta. You know, he's been having wins against New South Wales Health when everyone else is failing because he's taking it through the right court.

He's dealing with it from a workers compensation point of view rather than through work cover and all this other stuff. And he's getting victory after victory after victory. Now he's a lay person who's doing that. You know, and, uh, and a lot of our lawyers are stuck in that entrenched model of, you know, this is how it's done.

This is case law and all that sort of stuff. Look, I don't understand the political structure. I don't. I'm completely naive about a lot of it. I'm completely naive about the law. But there are a lot of people who aren't. And those people who've got that talent need to be brought together and to do something for everybody because they're ready to go.

You know, the judicial system is completely stuffed, you know, the, the lawyers have trained for years in university go there and it's never about justice. It's just about arguing the, the letter of the law. Yeah. My own wife did a law degree and she pulled out, uh, doing her articles to go before she went to the bar because she couldn't bear what was going on, what she saw.

I don't want to be a part of that system, she said. So I mean, we're just, um, anyhow,

well, should we close it with a prayer? Good idea. I agree. I think we need it. Need something. Lord, Father in heaven, we just, we just, uh, we need truth and we need more people to see it. And Father God, if they do, then, then equip us and empower us with, with grace, mercy and wisdom to make proper choices and decisions, Father God.

We need the right people to be there doing the right thing. So Lord, we just, we don't know how all this works out, but we know you do and we trust you and we know that you're still in control. So help us Lord to be compassionate with one another, to wake each other gently, but to at least get us all to stand.

We pray in Jesus name. Amen.

Johnny, you've often been heard to say. You just couldn't make this stuff up. Kate, it's been a real pleasure. Will you come back on? Yeah, absolutely. There's a lot unrolling all the time. So yes. And thank you so much for your tireless work. I don't know how you do it. Do you have a family there where you're living at the moment?

Yes, I have. Um, I have grown up children. I think it would have been much harder for me in the last few years if I didn't, if I had children still, you know, younger children. And I have a two year old grandson. Wow. You don't look old enough. So here's my, well, I don't think, I think it's for all the children.

It's my complete motivation because this is going to take a while for this all to, you know, to play itself out. But I do want the children not to at least to have done as much as I can to. Whatever I can have done to have, I don't know, slowed it down or stop it in some form or another. I mean, that's a big, that's a big thing to want, but you know, it's collective that takes collective action.

Well, you know, you said something there that was, was hopeful and we've got to grab onto the hope. We still have time, but we can't afford to dilly dally. We can't. We can't. It's, it's incremental. It's going to be incremental. You can't just suddenly go in and move. You know, hundreds of thousands of people when there's no way to move them to, like it's incremental, but it's happening.

And I think I do feel like people sort of, you know, the COVID thing happened and then people just sort of took their, they just sort of relaxed or something. And I was like, this is the time right now. So, so that's, I guess, been hard because COVID only opened the door. That was, I knew that was just the tip of the iceberg, you know, just the start really.

Yep. Well, Australia, it's, it's up to us. We can do it. We've done it before. Let's not, let's not fall into anxiety and perplexities and all that. Let's just drag our spirit out of it, out of the rubbish bin and get cracking everyone. And we can, we can, it's not enjoy it because it's not enjoyable, but we can have spirit with it.

It's like, where is that part of you that wants to come forward and, you know, like, I don't know, just, you know, just do something and not be frightened by what's happening. Like there's no point in being frightened by it. It's just, it is happening. So how are we going to counter it? Were you at Epic at all, Kate?

Did you go? No, I didn't go to Epic. I did go to the protests. Um, but no, I didn't, I didn't stay. Well, the spirit there was unbelievable. People still pull us up in the street and tell us it was just amazing. It was. It was. There was some crazy stuff going on there too, but the whole 95 percent of it was just beautiful.

You know, I've still got a neighbor who cries every now and then because he never thought people could be so beautiful. Uh, he went there and he, he, he came home for two weeks. His wife said, what are you teary about? He said, I just never thought we were, we had the capacity to be such beautiful people. And we, we have, you know, and we've still got that and I, I rejoice in that.

I really do. Uh, yeah. We just, uh, Yeah, I, I, I really hope or I wish for that we, we are always going to have the human ingenuity or something to find our way around this. I really do hold a hope and that there's much more, you know, innovative people in a night, you know, I hate the word innovative because it's been so co opted, but actually people out there trying to work out systems and ways around what's coming, um, as well.

So there's no saying that there's not a lot of people out there trying to do that as well. Are you getting enough support? Um, yes, I do, actually, I've individually, you know, found all these different people that helped me, you know, that are really good at different aspects of what I do. Because I, I've got about four or five topics I'm looking at.

So I revolve around them. And I just go back to them all the time and dredge up another layer. But I would like to, I would really like to get involved in understanding the United Nations, um, in portraying Australia and the

United Nations. Historically, and to understand where this all really started, where, where, what, what sort of, you know, decade this started to really happen in.

So yeah, there's a whole bunch more. I, I would like to have the time and of course, to start to understand the climate change, um, arena and the way the narrative's been crafted and the parameters that were set around it. I really want to understand that arena a lot more because I think that's going to be climate change is crucial in what's going to be happening.

The climate change narrative. Well, that 22 minute movie we posted the other day, John, um, the truth about COVID 19, uh, beautifully narrated and very well put together. And not too many people are going to be able to look at that and argue with it. You know, we, we are in dire straits when our own vaccine injured and they're writing, they're in the hundreds of thousands, uh, when our own vaccine, uh, uh, injured who did the right thing because they, they were told to do it, who are now left out on a limb with nowhere to go.
