

Club Grubbery - Raw transcript of interview:

2024-10-15 Graham and John speak with Russell Broadbent and Adrian McRae...

Well, G'day everyone, Tuesday the 15th of October and, uh, I'm in Western Australia and geez, you meet some strange people over here, Russell Broadbent, I can tell you.

Hi Adrian.

Oh, you knew who I was talking about?

Oh yeah, thanks for making that assumption, Russell. He's obviously, obviously talking about me.

Yeah, Adrian, Adrian McRae, Johnny. One of the most controversial figures in the world at the moment. And, uh, for good reason. And for good reason. So good to have you here, mate. Good to be

here. Good to have you

here.

Nevermind. Yeah. Cause you live here.

This is my house, not yours. That's right. That's right.

That's right. But, you know, what's yours is mine and what's mine is everybody else's and all that sort of stuff. But anyway, it's great to be here. Johnny, you're looking really gussied up because you're heading for the court today. Give us a brief rundown.

Yeah, off to the Industrial Relations Court in, uh, Sydney, in Bridge Street, uh, for tomorrow.

So, we're traveling down, uh, today. So, here we are at the Big Sheep at, uh, the Marino, um, doing a club robbery.

There you go, mate. Life's, life's fast in the fast lane. Have you got Caitlin with you?

Yeah, she's with me. Yep.

All right. Well, okay. Well, we wish you guys luck in our prayers and, um, it's great to have us all together.

Um, Russell Broadbent, uh, you presented a letter to the prime minister, which has really gained a bit of traction because you didn't just present a letter. You backed it with a whole bunch of. Yeah. Of, uh, scientific evidence and research and links to people who have done and said all the right things, uh, for the last couple of years now to try and steer this narrative to a place where we can put the light of truth on it to get people well and to improve the situation so we don't continue to keep making these same ridiculous mistakes.

And all that has gone down a pipeline, which has led to a. A council meeting in Port Hedland in the top of Western Australia, which has gained worldwide attention. Uh, take us through, Russell, what, uh, what prompted this and what work went into it to get this to the point where we now have in this, in this town of Port Hedland, the whole focus of the

world.

Well, first thing, um, I have to respond to what is any information that is presented to me after some discussion, of course, with my staff and people around me. Um, and because if, if I don't, I would, would seem to be accepting of our current situation and I'm not. So when I, when I receive information, I can't just sit on it.

It's like walking past. Walking past rubbish and not cleaning it up day after day after day after day until you can't stand it any longer. I don't go to that point. I go to say, here's this information that's been presented to us. These, um, RNMA, uh, could be damaging. In a very specific way, but rather than going by myself again to the prime minister or the health minister, which we've done in the past, and we've received responses that today would just break your heart because they say nothing.

And they say, You know how our processes all worked very well and have what stars we were during COVID and you know, and, and Mr Broadman, you are suggesting that they may be vaccinated people, you know, those sorts of responses. So, I couldn't go to the Prime Minister this time expecting that sort of flick response ignore him response.

So I said, right, we need a whole lot of people that are experts in this field to back up this report. And the information we put in the letter and only asking that the powers that be in Australia look at the issue, the information that's in the letter and in the report that was attached and have a whole bunch of people support me in that process.

So that the prime minister of Australia cannot ignore the, the letter that's gone to him and the importance of that letter, because if they do. As, as has been put to me, cause turbo cancers. Well the world needs to know, our world, our Australian people need to know. And I would then, I'd say to you, Graeme, have an absolute responsibility to take information like that.

forward to the government of the day. If I didn't, I'd be derelict in my duty as a federal parliamentarian.

Yeah. And you've done that. You've done that with great dignity and integrity as you do everything, Russell Broadbent, you're known for that on both sides of the house and, and how this, how this, What's intriguing Johnny Larder is that this has now gone to a local government.

And we've been saying for so long, the grassroots is the local government. If you want to bring about change, that's where the people can affect, uh, some of the greater change. It's very hard to move that monolith in Canberra. And here we've seen, uh, a very, a very powerful city in Port Hedland. It is a powerful city.

It is the engine room of the Australian economy. There's no doubt about that. And I have Um, come together pretty much as one, uh, five to two, Adrian McRae,

five to two,

five to two in favor of this motion, which is gaining traction all around the world. I mean, I've been with Adrian. Uh, he got, he got here late last night.

We were up until a wee small hours of the morning. And the messages he's getting from, uh, dignitaries all around the world in this space is unbelievable. Um, we are, we are now at a crossroads brought about by two elected officials in Russell Broadbent and Adrian McRae doing what elected officials are meant to do.

And Johnny, you attended a council meeting yesterday in the Snowy Valley.

Yeah, well, look, Hoddy, don't, uh, don't get your hopes up. I mean, I mean, this Albanese will dismiss this, there's no doubt about it. Uh, I mean, he's already dismissed a letter from our council, uh, Snobby Valley's council that was written to both himself and the, and the governor general demanding a, uh, royal commission into the handling of COVID 19, uh, and that was eight votes to one.

Uh, and, and they, uh, they wrote back and basically said, oh, thanks, thanks for your correspondence. So, I mean, we, we, we, we can't let up and, uh, what, uh, Adrian's managed to pull off over there is, uh, is, is really significant, uh, and it's another piece of the jigsaw puzzle, uh, but it, it's only, it's only going to work is if, if all these other council get on board and actually, uh, follow.

Uh, suit, uh, and, and the same thing.

Don, let me interrupt you if I can, because I think you've probably missed something that's really important here in the process of what Adrian's done. He has bypassed all the other councils. They can read it and they can do what they like with it. He's bypassed the health minister.

He's bypassed the prime minister of Australia, even though the, the, the article's gone and he's gone around the world with this. So other governments are now looking at how the prime minister of Australia is going to respond. So where the pressure won't just come from grassroots organizations where there must be councillors across.

The whole of Australia that I have brought into the net who have backs injured friends who have had people that have died suddenly, who have people who have got turbo cancers, who have got people who have got myocarditis, etc, etc. So the world is looking at what's happening in Australia. And I think eventually the pressure then coming from internationally back to the Australian government to say, how are you going to answer that letter?

Well, I

hope you, I hope you're right, Russell. Uh, I mean, but the, the disregard that, uh, Albanese and the Labour government have for elected officials, uh, you know, namely people like yourself. Uh, that are, that are, uh, advocating on, on behalf of thousands and thousands of, if hundreds of thousands of Australians, and, and he still ignores it.

So, uh, you, you're a hundred percent right. Well, I think

this is well, Graham, I've got to say to you that prior to the last election, when Mr. Albanese was the opposition leader, he promised The Australian people, and this is a matter of trust in your prime minister and elected officials, he promised the Australian people that if he was elected, he would have a royal commission into our COVID response.

Now, there's a lot of people that saw that and said, wow, he's on my side. Oh, back him. And they did. And he won. And he's now completely let them down. What information did he get? What information did he get that turned him away from a full blown promise that he made? He let us down badly.

There's a lot of questions that need to be asked, and they need to be asked in the proper forum.

And Adrian, um, I've watched, uh, uh, being over here, I'm seeing all the flack that you're copying, uh, through the mainstream media about what you've done. Before we go into that and how you're going to respond to that, tell us about the process, in summary, the process that you implemented for those people who may not have seen what happened on Friday night.

So, We,

uh, we took, um, Russell's letters, um, and obviously the, the important scientists that co signed 52 signatories, scientists, lawyers, um, humanitarians from, from the world over, and we, As, as Johnny sort of referenced, we, we, we wrote, wrote letters to the Prime Minister, the Secretary of Health, the Commonwealth, uh, the Commonwealth Minister for Health and Aged Care.

We wrote to the, uh, minister of Health in wa. We wrote to the premier's office wa and we also wrote to every council, every mayor, CEO, and counselor in the country. Now, this is obviously a process, it's in process as we speak, and we just said, we want, you know, we want answers. We want, uh, we want an explanation, but 24 or maybe 36 hours before the meeting, I.

I looked at it and read over what we'd written and as, as Johnny referenced it, we, it was very open ended and we kind of gave, gave, um, both the TGA and the, uh, and the Prime Minister and all health departments across the country. We gave them the ability to just say, look, it's healthy and safe and effective.

Our experts said, it's said it's fine. And it just, it, it, it gave them an easy out. So I went back to my team and said, listen, they have an easy out here. We, we can't just get the same generic response that they've been getting from that they've been giving to, uh, you know, the senators that have been asking these questions in, in a Senate estimates hearings and, and in, uh, you know, in, in question time in, in the lower house for the last three years, we don't want generic answers.

We need to be specific and tell us. tell us, give us answers on the science, tell us if, tell us, prove to us that our science is wrong, but you cannot use your own outdated, dodgy science to do so. So we actually went a little bit further and, and looked at, um, through, through Rebecca Barnett, investigative journalist, Rebecca Barnett's work, we were able to, um, get access to the science.

The testing methodology that the government has been using to gaslight all these people asking questions for the last three, four years. And it turns out they're using what's called a qPCR method to test these, uh, MRNA, MRNA solutions. But Moderna, who holds a world patent for cleaning out foreign plasma DNA out of MRNA solutions in their own patent, it says you cannot use the qPCR to quantify and measure foreign DNA contamination.

So, I changed a lot at the last minute, 24 hours, not even 24 hours before the meeting, I sent amendments to the motion that we would debate, we, that we would debate at the council meeting on Friday just passed to say, we want answers, but we don't want the same generic answer. We want you to tell us a real answer that doesn't use these dodgy fake science, not fake science.

It's science that's outdated for this type of technology. You have to give us answers that gives us real science and can prove that the most up to date science like the mass spectrometry and the fluorometry that these scientists in the USA, Canada, and Germany are using to prove this mass contamination.

So the fact that we've now pointed that out and taken, taken away their ability to give us generic answers of safe and effective, I think is going to, uh, it's really, it's really got them on the ropes. And look, to be honest, it's not about, um, I hope they use, you know, I hope they use, you know, these, these methodologies that have been used elsewhere in the world and find that we're wrong, because if we're right.

All

right, boys. We're back. Right. Now I just want to say before we go any further, and you remember where you were, to all our friends at the Australian Signals Directorate, who we know monitor our program, uh, welcome aboard guys and girls. We know this must be boring the daylights out of you because you're used to monitoring traffic in and out of China and Indonesia and whatever.

Uh, but we'll try and make it as entertaining as we can for you. Um, so Adrian, you were at?

Yeah, but basically we've just, um, we've just added to our motions and we, and I, we amended them substantially with a couple of paragraphs saying that we want the science that proves this more advanced and more accurate science out of Canada, USA and Germany, um, We want some science that proves them wrong.

Tell us that these things are safe. You can't use the same old outdated science to, to give us the generic answer of, uh, safe and effective. But not only that, we're sending all of that information, both your letters, Russell, the scientific summaries, um, as well as, as well as our motions. To every council, every councillor and every CEO and every mayor across the country.

And as you referred to earlier, when as elected representatives, be it a lowly city councilor or town or a council like like myself in the town of Port Hedland to people in the highest representative of the land in Canberra. You have a duty of care to your people and when this information comes across your desk, if you sit on this and choose to do nothing with it, I think, uh, you know, I mean, obviously people need to have a good hard look at themselves, but I just can't see that situation because in every council, be they, you know, nine councillors or 10 or 11 or five across the country, at least one of them is on board with this.

And every single electorate, be it district, region, um, shire council or, or city council, every single, uh, council across the country has got constituents that are injured and are standing up and we'll be putting pressure on those councils to acknowledge our letters and to, uh, and to, and to act on them.

And so this, this, uh, um, sending a letter, as Johnny said, to the prime minister, if we just sent a letter to the prime minister, we, we would expect the same response that you've been getting Russell, which is next to. Right. Next to nothing. But the fact that we've involved every council in the country. This is, um, this, they can't walk away and ignore this one.

This is much, this is much, much bigger now. And for them to even, you know, of course, of course, their response, the fact that already the, uh, the premier has come out, you know, yesterday, he was, he must've spent half his day on this. And then today, again, he's already on six PR again this morning. taking down, um, you know, taking down Port Hedland, taking down obviously myself, um, you know, just doing the smear job because as, as they do when they are, uh, in these situations, they, they attack the, the messenger rather than the message.

And this people are becoming, people are becoming awake to this, you know, that old, that old, um, the old, the old techniques of ad hominem, as they say, is the last refuge of a failed argument. And, and certainly, certainly they, uh, you know, people are, people are waking up to this and, and there's no, no one in Australia that doesn't know someone that wasn't, uh, you know, affected by this, um, by this injection.

So it's going to be very hard now for the prime minister to sweep this one under the rug. I really can't see this not becoming a much bigger thing. I mean, we've had something like 20 million impressions. Um, in the last two days on Twitter alone around the U. S. and, and, and Canada and Europe and, uh, and, of course, Australia.

So, um, this is not, uh, you know, they did a, they did a very good job, the mainstream media, as well as the, um, the, the government in Canberra, done a very good job of keeping your letter, uh, to, you know, to as fewer, as fewer eyes as possible. But this is now blown up and they, uh, they can no longer just, um, keep their head in the sand and pretend this is going to go away.

And this is going to get bigger and bigger until. Uh, they start talking about this and, um, trying to work out how they're going to get around, um, the, the, the methodologies and the protocols that we've set out in our letters to say, we want answers, but you can't give us the fake answers you've given us before, because we now know through the Freedom of Information request that I mentioned from Rebecca Barnett, that your testing methodologies are outdated.

And they're not up to spec. Moderna's own patents, who has the patent for this, for, for cleaning this, this DNA out of mRNA solutions globally, says you can't use the methods that the Australian government and the TGA is using. So this is, um, you know, we've caught them out and, uh, you know, hopefully, hopefully the, uh, they're going to come up with, you know, they can find and prove us wrong here.

And I, the fact that they're being so aggressively, um, particularly the premier of WA, the fact that they've been so aggressive in attacking the messenger. Rather than the message shows me they have something to hide, which is frightening to me because like I said to you before, I ideally hope that that you are wrong, Russell, that I am wrong and that the 52 scientists that scientists and academics and and and legal experts around the world are also wrong.

But, uh, the way the way they are reacting to all of this, if they had the science and they were confident in their science, you think they would just be able to say, no problem, guys, here's the science and here's why you're incorrect, but they're not doing that. And that's that's disturbing in and of itself.

Johnny Larder did, uh, were there any murmurings in, uh, in council meeting in Snowy Valley yesterday about what happened in Port Hedland at all?

No, not yesterday. It's a newly elected council. So, uh, it'll take them a little while to sort of, uh, get their head around, uh, what's going on, but, uh, certainly they're, they're very aware of, uh, Of what's transpired.

Uh, so I think there's a real opportunity here to, to, to pick up up on, uh, Port Headlands, fantastic work. I mean, even in parliament house there last week where we had professor Angus Dalglish and, uh, Dr. Paul Merrick, uh, I mean, it, it, it was so alarming, you know, when somebody asked a question in parliament and said, uh, about.

The testing of the deceased in relation to the spike protein. Uh, we don't even have the technology here or they don't use the technology to differentiate the difference between somebody who's died, uh, from the spike protein from the vaccine or from the COVID, uh, virus itself. I mean, they can easily apply that test, but they don't in, in autopsies.

Um, so, I mean, that's just one example of. Uh, a complete lack of, uh, governance and a betrayal, an absolute betrayal of the Australian people in, in regards to, uh, finding out what, what the cause is of, of, of this excess mortality. I mean, we know what it is. Uh, they could easily, uh, do these, uh, autopsies, uh, and find out, but they won't.

Yeah. Look, it's just happening everywhere. Russell Broadbent. Uh, we were going to visit with friends on Sunday who couldn't, uh, make the meeting with us here in the West because their, their son in law, uh, who's about to become a father for the first time, ended up in the, uh, in the, in the cardiac care unit at one of the hospitals over here.

Having suffered what looks like a heart attack, uh, you know, a guy in his mid thirties, I mean, and everybody's talking about, they know somebody who's doing, somebody who's gone down this road, the turbo cancers, uh, are going nuts. I've been approached by an oncologist since, uh, Friday night, uh, who I believe is in, in, I won't mention the state.

I don't want to put this person into it just yet. But they're approaching me to talk about, uh, their own fears and what they're saying and the reticence of their colleagues to even acknowledge this. So we're in a really, we're, we're poised to see truth come out. But the one thing I want to say to everyone watching is from conversations.

With everybody on this, on this program now, we all desperately want to be wrong.

We back on? Yes, we are. And look, I'd like to say what Adrian and the Council have done is they've sent those letters that were sent to the Prime Minister around the world. Because even Dr John Campbell in his, um, presentation, he showed the letters up now he's got 2 million followers. I mean, and he's asking the question, he's not, he's not expecting an answer, but he said, why wouldn't the Prime Minister of the UK pick this up?

Why wouldn't the President of the United States pick this up and run with it in exactly the same way? Because the letters are out there for the world to see. And if we think, um, Adrian, Two million hits is a lot. Just let's see what happens from here on in with the number of people it starts to spread to and say, yes, well, here's the

letters they're sent in a, in a, in a, uh, in a duty of care and official capacity to a prime minister, um, can the prime minister of Australia keep his international relations and his international, um, um, authority.

Um, international reputation if he fails to answer the basic question around health on behalf of the people of Australia.

I just, I just want to go on John.

I was just going to say, what do you, this, this prime minister needs to explain why, uh, people of, uh, like Bill Gates are having private meetings with him at Kirribilli house.

Uh, it, it just beggars belief. Uh, these people are out of control.

Well, I'm not going there with it. He's out of control or not. I just want him to take seriously his role. Premier person, this country, who is by the government of the nation and therefore guiding the people of this nation. And if there is a threat to their health and wellbeing, he is charged with the responsibility of responding to any threat that comes against the nation.

Now I'm putting to him through those letters, supported by people with far greater ability than I to say, here it is. Now, what about a scientific, departmental response in the manner that Adrian has just outlined in the program? It's not a big ask.

Absolutely. And that's what we're hoping is going to come from this, right?

Look, of course, that's, that's the, uh, the ultimate goal. I mean, the ultimate goal is I hope they, they're, they're able to do the relevant science and relevant being, uh, the operative word that they can do the relevant science and prove us wrong. Because Yeah. God forbid, uh, we are right on this, but, uh, the science that's coming out, um, even from over, overnight, um, you know, the eminent geneticist, Kevin McKernan has, uh, released a, released a new study, which shows, um, they've done, they've done some biopsy testing on, on some of these cancers and they're all testing positive to this, this SV40, uh, promoter sequence.

from the Pfizer jab, which is completely overwhelmed the cancer tumor. So if these things are now, if these things are now self replicating, which it appears from his, uh, latest, latest findings, then, uh, the mind boggles about the, uh, the, the, the, the psychological liability and the, and the, and the financial stuff.

financial liability that would rest upon the shoulders of, I'm not sure if it's the Australian government or if it's, uh, if it's Pfizer, Pfizer, or if it's the, if it's the pharmaceutical companies themselves, but the, the, the liability, the financial exposure here is, is bigger than, uh, than the Australian economy times to a, to a fact, to a factor of, I don't even know, there's the Australian economy's annual budget could not even touch the financial liability of In 10 or 20 years, this is just, it's mind blowing.

I can't see, I can't see, I, I, I understand the, I understand the prime minister and, and, and those people in the TGA. I understand what, uh, the situation they've been now placed in. And, uh, I, I see nothing short of, I see nothing short of, um, there's nothing they won't do to, uh, to, to, to make sure this information doesn't get out because if it, if it is to get out, um, I don't see way out of this except for, you know, except for a really, a catastrophic, um, a catastrophic crisis that, uh, I don't even want to, you know, the mind bends even trying to, to, to, uh, contemplate.

Look, we are facing it and that's obvious in the mainstream media's response. I want to share screen and show something that popped up on the ABC news feed this morning. Uh, if I can, you see that Russell?

I can see that very well. Yes.

Okay. So this is the ABC news and the WA premier, uh, Roger Cook is responding and I'll go down here and you'll see Uh, there's, there's the protagonist, uh, the man they're doing the smear campaign on, and, uh, there's a whole bunch of stuff there on Port Hedland, but in the middle of that is How to spot when you're thinking like a conspiracy theorist.

Can you see that? So when you're being sceptical, and when are you being sceptical here's how to recognize the traits of a conspiratorial thinking. That that would appear in the middle of an article, uh, relating to what happened in Port Hedland. Is a clear indication of the gaslighting that's going on in the mainstream media.

And, um, and so that's going to continue. I agree. We know that that will continue. And you, what I love about your approach to these things is okay. I'm happy to, I'm happy to discuss it. You're happy to be proven wrong. You're happy to come out and talk to Roger Cook. You're happy to debate with him. But they seem to be avoiding that.

And there's a good reason for that.

You got the floor.

Sorry, sorry, Russell. No, I was just saying in addition to the, uh, to the article about, uh, identifying yourself as a conspiracy theorist was the, um, the premier's comments around telling Port Hedland councillors, we should stick to knitting. I mean, the fact that he's gone, uh, you know, name calling and so petty.

in his, uh, his argument just shows, shows he has nothing. He is, uh, you know, he's, he's, he's, he's disgraced himself. There's a reason, there's a reason that they, you know, they're responding to Port Hedland. I mean, this could be any town in the country. It could be, it could be, uh, you know, the city of Sydney or, or even Perth, but the fact that it's Port Hedland, as the prime minister himself calls it, the engine room of Australia, they called a national cabinet meeting in Port Hedland, uh, you know, last year.

Um, just to, you know, just to highlight the importance of the town's, uh, the town's contribution to the, uh, national economy and to the, um, you know, to the, I guess the geostrategic interest base around port headland. Port headland, um, is, you know, as far it, it is, it is probably the most important town geo strategically on the, on the, uh, on the nations as far as finances go and the, you know, it is the biggest bulk commodity export port on the planet.

And so, you know, to, to insult, to insult the councillors by saying, you know, we should stick to, we should stick to knitting is, um, you know, it just, it just shows how pathetic and how, how weak his argument is. And, and, uh, he clearly has, um, you know, he's lost control of the narrative and he doesn't know how to, How to, how to hang on to it.

So, you know, I know, you know, their first, their first, um, technique, I'm, I'm quite confident will be they will try to dissolve the council. They just want us gone. That will be their, um, that would be the ultimate goal for them right now is just to kick us out and then just then, and then in hindsight, tell us that we're all crazy conspiracy theorists.

He said that we're all off the rails, um, that we, we, we have no place even asking such questions, but, um, you know, their, their, uh, people of Australia aren't, um, aren't going to put up with that shit. So it's, it's really, uh, you know, it's, it's going to be an interesting, um, next couple of weeks as this, uh, gains traction, you know, as, as, as we mentioned earlier, it's already had several millions of views around, uh, you know, in very high circles around the world.

And, um, the prime minister and the premier and all the health ministers Um, I'm sure they're drafting their responses as we speak, but, uh, I think the quickest way out for these people is to try and dissolve the council, get us, um, just get us gone. But they're going to struggle because, you know, we have a, you know, we, we, we

still are a democracy and, um, they're gonna, they're gonna, you know, meet their match if they want to, uh, challenge, challenge the Port Hedland Council.

What was interesting to me was one of the, uh, one of the councillors, uh, when in, in the rebuttal said that, uh, the council should stick to collecting, uh, garbage and making sure the roads are okay and, and all, and the footpaths and all that sort of stuff. Uh, she completely forgot that council inspectors are frequently inspecting, uh, food and, and, uh, various other health outlets to make sure that health regulations are maintained.

There was one councillor who spoke in favour of the motion who I thought was going to come out against it. Uh, and he said, if we're going to be involved in the everyday bits and pieces around health in our community, why isn't this the case as well? We're talking about, we're talking about, uh, you know, uh, substances being put into our body that are going to cause, uh, great harm to us in the future.

Why shouldn't we be investigating that? So it's interesting to see on one hand, you've got local government imposing themselves in everything. They want everything registered. They want everything licensed. They want everything governed to minutiae. And then all of a sudden, when the fat hits the fan, they say, Oh no, we're only here to do, um, we're only here to do footpaths, roads, and rubbish collect.

So I mean, the whole narrative gets shot down all the time, which I find really fascinating. So I'll

help this year. The health issue is really important because councils around Australia have been lobbying the federal government because they're all, every one of them are losing their GPs. Now that's a federal health issue and this is a federal health issue.

So you can't on one hand have the councils lobbying to get GPs for their communities to get them replaced and on the other hand have nothing to say about the health and well being of their community when people have come to them directly and say, Hey, Look, I'm backs injured and they're prepared to come to a council meeting and stand there and stand up and say, here's my story.

You know, here's my story. Sad but true. So, I mean, you can't, you just can't have it both ways. I, later, I've just been to a family funeral. An old friend from the fire brigade years ago, uh, was there and she said, oh, you lost me, Russell, when you wouldn't have the vaccine. And I said to her, well, I've had no unvaccinated, unvaccinated people come to me complaining about myocarditis or pericarditis or terminal cancer or, um, you know, turbo cancer and on and on and on it goes, you know, neuro neurological problems, but I've said to her, but I've had thousands across Australia come to me who are vaccinated with those same issues.

She said, Oh, have you? She said, I'm fine. Well, she is today.

Well, I think too, this is a lot. This is like the judge in the Pfizer case saying that, uh, they're not an interested party. I mean, the, these councils in the majority, they're not only councils, they're not only, uh, government only, you know, supposed to be community leaders.

They were employers and the majority of them were employers. That demanded that people get jabbed to work in a, in a, in a, uh, a caterpillar truck,

tractor dealership. The dairy farmer on the dairy farm was told we're not going to take your milk unless you're vaccinated. Come on a doctor who was only doing telehealth doesn't go near anybody on her own in a house all day long doing telehealth.

They said, Oh no, you can't do telehealth anymore because you've got to be like us. You've got to be vaccinated. In other words, We don't know why we're saying this, the mob, we are all vaccinated. So to stay with us, you've got to be vaccinated too. That's just crazy thinking. So she resigned and so, or here's another doctor not giving her wonderful telehealth service to the community in Victoria, gone out the door.

And then the local GPs were saying, Oh, we're run, you know, we're, you can't get an appointment two weeks, three weeks away. We're flat out. Well, why are you so flat out all of a sudden?

And let's not forget that the state and federal governments didn't mandate that their politicians have to be vaccinated, but the majority of these councils did.

That's right. And I wasn't allowed on council property because I was unvaccinated and it suited me fine .

Yeah.

Great. Look, it is, it is crazy. But I, I guess we need to think about, all right, the, the, uh, the, the cans been opened up in Port Hedland and in Canberra through you, Russell Broadband, and, and praise the Lord for you, mate.

Um, what can we expect to happen from now? Are, are any of you expecting, uh, the unexpected?

There'll be somebody in the community or the council that will say, no, we know you've been sent that correspondence. We know that's gone to you and therefore you must lay it before the council one.

So that has its own momentum within community. And I say that word within community. And the other momentum it's in, it's now international momentum around something everybody can get their head around to say that there could be dangerous. I'd love to be wrong. And that's what I said, the lady at St.

James Church of Pakenham a few minutes ago, I said, Madam, I would love to be wrong. I'd love to be wrong because that means people won't be dying, they won't be injured. They won't be suffering. That's what's happening. So like all of you, I'd love to be wrong. So prove me wrong. Don't just say to me, these vaccines save the lives of millions of people around the world.

Without any evidence

and by

the way,

you don't have to be wrong,

but, but any, any, anybody criticizing it. I didn't mind if the premier came out and had a go at Adrian, I thought, well, he's talking about Adrian. There it is. You know, the, we'll ask now, what's the premier talking about? What's the premier talking about? What's the premier talking about?

Telling them to stick to their knitting. What were they doing that they were told to stick to their knitting by the premier of the state? Bang, got him. Secondly, he could have said, I have a report that gazumps their report. The problem is. He hasn't. And he was a former health minister. And he still wasn't able to say, Oh no, I have a report in my hand that says that Adrian's wrong.

No, what'd he do? He said, We know what we're doing. Tell them to stick the knitting. I say to the Premier of Western Australia, Perhaps you don't know what you're doing.

Well, if he thinks that councils are knitting, he doesn't know what councils do for a start. Do you know how to knit?

I'll go

right on the knit, yeah.

Do

you? Add one, take away seven or whatever it is, yeah.

Far out. You're a man of many talents, Adrian. You really are a man of many talents. Most of them unsavoury, I must admit. But, um, you know, the pushback is going to be fast and furious because let's face it, they're trying like crazy to bail out a ship that's taking in more water than they can get rid of.

And that's, that's going to be the undoing of all of this. And all we want, all we want is the light of truth to be shed on what's going on. So we can make appropriate, take appropriate actions. To get well, to heal people, to restore our country, to restore the spirit of this country, which has been decimated, uh, by governments from both persuasions and get on with living our lives.

We've just got to, we've got to identify the elephant in the room, work out how to fix it. That's good risk benefit analysis. That's good human factors. And we're not doing any of that. As we said, John, in the Senate, in the committee hearings, when we said, You can't ignore a wound by saying it's not there.

The wound is bleeding, it's becoming infected, and it's beholden on governments of every persuasion, local, state and federal, to do what Port Hedland Council has done. And hopefully some integrity will permeate through that council as well. And some more people will start to see what's going on. I don't want to denigrate anybody up there, but I mean, we've got to have people in the, in the role who are acting in their integrity.

And now I'm at

Let me say this, you know, I, I saw you Abigail, Adrian for his, uh, unusual way. I can tell you, I had dinner with him in Canberra and he was a perfect gentleman with me and my staff. Uh, he didn't mind going part of the road and just taking tour. A restaurant with, with some, um, notoriety, he's just as happy in the pub as anybody else.

And, and the public and the, and the governments and the governments of state, federal and local have a problem with the four of us, John, Lada, Graham, Adrian, and myself. We're not nuts.

We're

just people.

Well, and that's so true. Uh, Russell, I'm, I'm And, and really look, Adrian McRae needs, needs some backing from like, Christie McBain is the federal, uh, minister for local government.

Now she's also my local member. I mean, she was asking questions of me while I was serving a coffee in the drive thru wondering why I wasn't in an ambulance, uh, now he knows, uh, Christie, you need to intervene here. Uh, I mean, Adrian needs some support. You need to, uh, Russell has just said that this is a matter of Of life and death potentially for, for Australians and on the basis of what Adrian's raised and what Russell has raised in these letters to the Prime Minister, you must, you must on balance, uh, pause and investigate this, stop these MRNA jabs and just have a pause and let's have a look at all

this.

Yeah. So true. So

true. 95 million on, uh, bird flu something. I mean, really?

Come on. Well, I can tell you that while we were sitting having a cup of tea this morning, uh, here at Adrian's place, his phone rang and he took the call. He didn't know who it was. And it was Glen the truckie, a flying fly out, uh, worker who works out of Port Hedland. And he was amazed that Adrian took his call and he had a great chat with him for 20 or 30 minutes.

It was unbelievable. And this, these, this is how we restore the spirit of this country. You know, we're all in this fight together. Glenn Natraki is just as important as Adrian McRae is just as important as John Larder is just as important as Russell Broadbent and me. Absolutely. And we've got to make sure these people know that there are, there are people out there with a square head and a practical logic.

Who are going to stand with them and help them to restore their spirit. Because that's what's going to bring this country back to its feet again. It's our spirit that will do that. And what we saw demonstrated in Port Hedland on Friday night is a shining example. What we see with you, Russell Broadbent, continually and those Uh, who are, who are, uh, representing the people in the Senate of Australia who are standing up and doing this fight, uh, often to empty chambers and often to a great ridicule.

Um, it will win out. It will win out one day. And what does a win look like for me? A win for me looks like we've examined the science. What about you Russell? What is, what is victory in this instance? I was

I just want the facts to come out about where, where we're at with, with these are in injections and what they do to the body and what it suggested. And I then victory for me is when I look at the interview between myself and professor ang angst, they'll glitch and take it on board because this And was initially full blown on the, on the vaccinations and encouraging people to get them.

Till he saw what was happening to people around him, his own close network and what was happening to them. Now I put to you, I don't want victory to be that people are dropping dead around the prime minister and then him saying, Oh, we must have a problem Houston. It's too late then.

Is that we will do something as a nation first, before we say it's too late now.

Uh, we, we are at the behest of, I don't know, people that are, uh, are, are out to, um, cause harm to, to Australians and, and those around the world. And until we reign those people in, uh, and, and we can truly have a debate about the pros and cons of things like these vaccines, uh, with, with, uh, without any.

interference, uh, from authorities or bureaucrats, uh, with a big stick. I think we're in real trouble. I think Russell's right, but I almost think it's almost a bridge too far at the moment, the way we're heading.

Well, I, I hate to say it, but it's not only Australia, it's the entire world at the moment that's in the grip of, um, unparalleled evil.

There's no doubt about it. We, we can go down a lot of different roads here, but we won't at this stage. But, um, we have to wake up to the fact that we are in a struggle of our lives.
