

Club Grubbery - Raw transcript of interview:

2024-10-25 Graham and John speak with Katie Ashby-Koppens about the Mad Bill...

G'day

everyone, welcome to a very quick Club Grubbery update, uh, this Friday afternoon. It's a beautiful day where I am. It looks good where you are, Johnny. Anywhere Katie Ashby Coppins is, it's always a beautiful day. Welcome, Katie.

Ah, hi guys. Thank you. Thank you very much, everyone. How are you?

Yeah, we're going really well.

And you've got the, uh, Lyon Council of Australia banner behind you, which we're really proud to be supportive of. Johnny? A

hundred percent, Hooty. We, uh, we're one of the inaugural members of the Lyon Council and very proud, uh, to have the Club Grubbery, uh, name associated with it. It's a fantastic, uh, uh, group and, uh, well worth supporting.

Thank you.

Aw, there you go.

Absolutely, it is. And, uh, the world's going mad. M A D, Katie.

It so is going mad. Um, it really is. So we've got to court the Miss and Disinformation Bill, which we are staring down the barrel of, literally. Uh, that the Labour government is very keen to pass. Uh, that Miss and Disinformation Bill will mean that we won't be able to talk about any level of government online.

Uh, we won't be able to talk about the banking system. Online, and we won't be able to be critical of any public health measures or prophylactics that are offered for those public health measures. And you know, that's just the start of it. And we'll be policed by big tech, who will now be the new police officers for the government who get the protection of not being able to talk about them.

What could possibly go wrong? I engaged this morning with, um, with a gentleman who, uh, you know, is probably in another camp to us. He's got a different opinion on vaccines than we have, and he's quite vocal on another platform. Um, and I said, um, you know, I hope you're okay. It was funny because the guy said that, uh, people like us obviously don't know anything about vaccines.

And when I looked at his post a bit further down, uh, his Facebook page, he was telling everybody how. He's, uh, in getting, um, getting x rays done to track his deep vein thrombosis, you know, and so I sent him a very nice message in genuinely. And I just said, I saw your comment that a lot of people don't know anything about the vaccine rollout.

I would suggest none of us know anything about it. And is it possible, as many doctors have suggested on Club Grubbery, that your deep vein thrombosis is a result of your vaccine status? In which case, you need to know that those same doctors are working on fixes for that and, you know, don't be discouraged and hope you get well and, and it's genuine.

I genuinely reached out to him. I haven't heard back, but, um, you know, that this sort of stuff is going crazy. And I also said in there that despite being on different sides of the fences, Because the division is so great within

Australia that if you, if you want to see us dragged through the mud and made look like fools, what you're doing is supporting a misinformation and disinformation bill which will end freedom of speech in this country.

Is that what you want to be the end result? Because these are the questions we need to ask. We've asked Roger Cook, the Premier of WA, um, publicly, uh, would you like to know if someone's tampering with your DNA? Yes or no? A basic question. And if he said no, he'd be a twit, because who wouldn't want to know that?

And if he said yes, then we can say, right, well, this is what we're trying to do. We're trying to get everyone to look at what the facts are so we can determine if it's happening or not. What's wrong with that? Where the misinformation disinformation bill is concerned, all that ends, Katie, doesn't it?

It does.

So you won't be able to make that comment on your friend's post about, you know, the Questioning things a little bit further, you'll be censored, uh, you won't be able to talk about the bank. Uh, one of the things I found most interesting about the Labor's, uh, justification and reasoning for, uh, the MAD Bill was because all of those people who voted no on the voice, uh, were misinformed.

That, you know, that they'd been relying on mis and disinformation, that's why they didn't vote yes. You know, if you've got a situation where billions of dollars is being spent on a government driven campaign, and, you know, actually, is the government just calling its constituents stupid by making that suggestion?

No,

we can't let you have any information on this issue because we don't want you to think for yourself. Uh, you know. That's, that's quite incredible. We had to have a referendum and now, you know, they're wanting to meddle in that. This is the biggest threat to Australia at the moment, uh, and to our ability to operate within a democracy.

Yeah, it's interesting to see that. It's obvious that in the last four years, Johnny, Australia, New Zealand and Canada have been used as, used as the petri dish to work out how compliant democratic citizens might be. And we, we in Australia have failed the test, have we not?

Well, a hundred percent we have. I mean, it begs belief, really.

I mean, they're, they're, they're so brazen, these grubs. I just don't know why they, why they even bother with referendums. I mean. Yeah. If they're so hell bent on, uh, destroying this country and it's, uh, it's history, it's culture, it's a way of life, we'll just go about introducing this stuff. I mean, hardly anyone would, uh, take any notice except for us that are paying attention.

Uh, like why have a referendum? Why not just introduce laws to change everything to suit their own needs regardless?

It's nuts, Katie. Are you in agreement that governments should not be social engineering? That culture and social conscience should be a matter of the people without government interference?

Absolutely. It's not the government's job. You know, this is complete overreach.

As everything seems to be. Look at the t shirt I'm wearing, right? Um, giving a voice to the VAX injured. Um, I mean, there's so many people speaking out now. Um, and, and all of this stuff gets lost the minute this bill's passed.

And you've got, you've got twits like Zuckerberg who are going to be responsible for the social conscience and fabric of our nation. I can't imagine anyone in Australia, regardless of what you think of everything that's gone on, would be in favor of that. And yet some people are cheering the government on.

Because they're fixated on these nutjobs they're saying that are causing all the trouble, namely people like us, um, without realizing that they're shooting themselves in the foot. And then when their own freedoms of speech are lost, they're going to say, how did that happen? I mean I, I just, I just, I don't understand the fabric of our country anymore.

I really don't get it. You know, I think, um, the fact that a lot of people are making ridiculous claims on both sides of the fence is a symptom of a country that has fallen into deep anxiety and a lack of trust. And that's been driven by a government is too involved in our everyday life.

Mm hmm.

Overreach. So

now they want to tell you what you can't say.

Well, then what hope have we got? There's no, there's no chance of having any, uh, anyone look at this with any, uh, sympathy in a court. I mean, the courts are just politicised, they're captured. They are just doing the government's work. I mean, you, you, you go into these courts and you just get smashed up and smashed up and smashed up.

And then you come out the other side and you go back again and you get smashed up again. It's just completely, uh, beyond belief that, that we're in a country where the justice system just doesn't even. Give us stuff about common sense. I don't want, I

don't want to put words in Katie Ashby Coppins mouth, but, uh, I think you and I can talk about this with some clarity.

Uh, it seems that the legal system in this country is only geared up for the mega wealthy and, uh, and the corporations. And, um, average Joe Blow, like you yourself, has been fighting for three or more years now to get some kind of justice, even to get a recognition that you were hardly done by, would be something.

But you're not even getting that. I mean, this, this is a judiciary that is completely captured. There's no doubt about it. Now, um, we, the Australian people are left to ask the question, can, if we cannot trust our judiciary, we cannot trust our government, We cannot trust our law enforcement agencies. Who can we trust?

Who can we trust? So we're between a rock and a hard place, so we must continue to have these conversations, uh, Katie, uh, into the future as long as we need to, because if we don't, we're not a democracy anymore, we're a fascist dictatorship. And so Katie, what can we do now? How can we support the efforts of the ACA?

Well, first of all, who can we trust? We actually can trust ourselves. Let's put our trust in ourselves because at the end of the day, that's who we've got. We are sovereign beings with the ability to make choices for ourself. So let's make sure that we maintain and retain that ability to do so. And goodness gracious.

I know that you guys. certainly feel it as I do. Um, who you know now and who we have now gives me so much certainty and comfort for the future because I'll tell you what, I know exactly who my friends are and it's a real pleasure to walk beside everybody. And, um, you guys are top of the list. So thank you.

We, we do have people we can trust.

Oh, we certainly do. And we're in a new tribe. There's no doubt about it. And. Johnny, you and I, you and I have formed this relationship that we've had, which will never be broken. I mean, it's as strong as, as can be. And, and that is, is the result of what's happened. And look at all the other people we've met along the way.

Look at the incredible people we've interviewed in several hundred episodes of Club Grubbery, Katie included, and all those people who we bump into, who bump into you every day in Tumut, who we see wherever we speak together and whatever meetings we attend. I mean, there is a new Australia building in all of this.

We're all new Australians.

Absolutely.

Yeah, that's so true.

Yeah, we'll be so lucky. I really do consider myself so lucky.

Now, in order to back that up, Katie, um, uh, before we go to what we can do, I know there's some petitions you wanted to get us involved in. Uh, I've just got all the paperwork for the, um, the Restoring Science and Freedom Conference to be held in Melbourne by the ASF.

I've been asked to speak on the Sunday, the 17th of November, uh, on the topic of Hoodies Heroes. So we're talking about community through Hoodies Heroes. Uh, that's in that. Now I want to read through the speakers of this two day event, because this is really, this is what we were just talking about, the quality of people.

Uh, we have, um, Jason Strecker, Stephen Shavura, Kevin Donnelly, Tim Berryman, Andy Mullins. Amon Matheson, Julian Gillespie, Paul Santa Maria. Excuse me. Steven Maloney, Augusto Zimmerman, Julie Slaton, Katie Ashby, Coppins Ian. Bright Hopee. Robin Cosford, Russell Broadband mp. Rebecca Barnett. Damian Curry, Andrew Al, Maryanne Demas, that brave, uh, medical doctor, journalist, uh, David Southwell.

Who else have we got? Gigi Foster, myself, Graham Hood, Matt Wong. And then a whole series of, uh, workshops after that. And as I said, I'll be talking with, uh, with on Stage with Gigi Foster, talking about hoodie's, heroes, and answering questions there. So this is, this is an organization of incredible Australians, uh, and that's just the fringe and we're all talking about.

We're talking about resolution and we're talking about restoration and solution and I think this is great because some of these people I'm just, I'm just humbled to be on the same list as these people and, um, you know, the only name that's not there is Johnny Lada. And, uh, and it's a great, it's a great, uh, opportunity and that I encourage everybody in the Melbourne area to get along to that.

Or even if you've got to travel, uh, it's going to be held at the RMIT in Melbourne and, uh, Institute of Technology there, Royal Melbourne. And, uh, I can't wait to go there and, and, uh, catch up with Ian Brighthap as well. I think I'm going to speak with his group after that. So. Oh, I'm breathless.

It's going to be great.

Come down to Tumut and have a coffee at the coffee shop with you, John.

That's right. You'll be able to, uh, you'll be able to, uh, get a, uh, an adrenaline pump.

A Himalayan yak, yak milk, uh, decaf. Yeah. With camels, and I have to tell you that ladders balls are back on sale at the minority pantry in, uh, in, in, uh, they are, uh, don't be offended.

They, they make these beautiful nutritious. Um, like, like balls, a little like a snack thing. And, uh, and John would buy them every time we were on our way to Korokai to help the people out in Korokai, we'd call him for coffee.

And, uh, he'd buy a couple of these things and they named them after him in honor of John and they come and go on the market every now and then, well, they'd just gone up.

Lattice balls are available, 3.50 each. I would imagine New South Wales ambulance would like to get a hold of those. John,

I, I just imagine they'll be putting in an order

very shortly. You couldn't make this stuff up, but Katie's blushing. Katie's blushing,

I think LA's blushing. Look, he's gone bright Rick.

He's gone brightly.

I think the, I think the ambulance will be calling for them for the, uh, Christmas catering, won't they?

Yes. I'm sure Dr. Dominic Morgan will be ordering them as we speak. Ready for the Christmas re They'll be. There'll be a massive big, uh, shindig on, there's no doubt about that. Probably, probably when the court case comes back from the appeal and they've got rid of me, then they'll be having an even bigger one.

Now, the thing that makes my eyes water, Johnny Lata, excuse me for being a bit rude, is if he did order them, they'd probably have toothpicks in them.

Let's not go there. Let's not go there. All right, Katie, what's happening with these petitions?

Rightio. We have got the opportunity to make magic happen. Uh, we have two petitions going, one for the House of Representatives, one for the Senate to say no to the MAD Bill, because it's mad. It must go. That's it.

So there's two petitions because we're petitioning both of their houses. Great news is Russell Broadbent has offered to table the petition in the House of Representatives in that house and Malcolm Roberts has offered to table the, uh, petition for the Senate in, in that house. So we've already got them being tabled.

Now it's our job to actually show how much we are against the Mad Bill and we're encouraging everybody. To jump on at board, you can either sign, uh, handwritten ones, but it's much easier for people to sign the electronic versions, which are available on the Aligned Council of Australia website. That is Wdubdubalignedcouncilofaustralia.com.au.

And I'll just quickly bring up the screen, show you where you can find them, and they're also available for you to share. Uh, to anyone, uh, that you wish, if you could share, aim to share with five people that you know to let them know that they won't be able to talk about these things online, uh, in the future, then, you know, absolutely bring it.

Uh, we are so excited and this is so important. It is the most important thing that we have to do before Christmas. So just go to the, uh, Aligned Council of Australia web page. Jump onto the Reject the Mad Bill under Take Action, and we've got the ability for you to jump on board and sign the Mad Must Go, which is to save the truth.

You've got the ability to sign two of the petitions here on our online page, which you can get through the Online Council of Australia. Alternatively, you can go straight to that page by going to madmustgo.com.au. That's madmustgo.com.au. So

very, very one, one would think, Katie, that this probably won't just extend to online stuff either, will it?

I mean, you can just imagine if somebody, uh, holds a, uh, a, a rally or, uh, or something similar in a, in a town.

Yeah. And if you post the video, absolutely. That's gonna be captured. This is, this is just the start of it. Yeah. You know, this goes and it's gonna extend to other things. Uh, you know, I think that was just a kangaroo that jumped past you there.

Hoodie?

Uh, yes. The kangaroo just jumped along the veranda.

Oh dear. Um, look, make sure you get that kangaroo to sign up as well. Uh, because every citizen of Australia deserves to be able to sign up to this. And look, I really am insisting people, uh, get informed about these issues. The submissions have gone up on the, um, uh, committee website on parliamentary mid website for mad.

Uh, I haven't seen any, uh, petition, sorry, any set of submissions yet that, uh, is for it. There is everybody. This is going to affect every single person from every single walk of life. It's not just, uh, you know, our, our concerns about the public health measures over the last four years. It's everything. Why does the banking system need protection about getting Flack or being whinged about online.

You've really got to wonder what this is all about. And it's far too broad. It's far too cavalier in the concept. And having big tech police us? Goodness gracious. No way.

No way. Look, it is, it is madness that we're even contemplating this in a country like Australia. I'm at a loss. I really am. But you know, I, I, left wing, right wing, who cares?

But for me. I'm at the stage where every time we seem to have labor in government, it's, it's life under hard labor. It's just, it's just, I don't know what, look, the Shearers who started that party and under the Tree of Knowledge in Barkawlin during the Great Shearer Strike, many of them died. They were killed.

They were shot by police. Um, they would be rolling in their graves to see the Labor Party that they started in the current state that it's in. It's got nothing to do with the rights of individuals or it's just a complete ideological basket case. And, uh, yeah, why are we surprised? We've seen the Greens go down that road as well.

They did, you know, they were formed to, to do, uh, to do great works for the, um, for for our ecology and and for uh for our natural resources all those sorts of things to protect those things and have gone way beyond their remit in that. I mean getting involved in social engineering and I mean it's just madness.

But anyway it is what it is so we will get this out. Some of you are thinking, Oh, not another petition. Hey, look at what's going on in Port Hedland. Look at what grassroots movements can do. What's going on in Port Hedland. We won't discuss that much further now, but what's going on in Port Hedland is an indication of how the ripples in the pond can go a long way when grassroots people get down and get busy.

It's it's incredible how this is pulling everyone together. And we'll talk about that on a later episode. But in the meantime, we thoroughly recommend you get behind this initiative. If this mad bill comes in, you won't see Cody's face on this program or ours. Which is a blessing for you, but not for Katie.

Um, so get behind it, get with it or, or, um, get busy living or get busy dying, Johnny, that's about it. That's about where we're at. All right, Katie. Well, thanks for coming on. Um, stay on after we, uh, stopped recording and, uh, well, let's give this a bit of a prayer, shall we? Lord father in heaven, we pray that this initiative will continue to remove the vial of darkness and shed the light on truth because father, if this goes through There will be no more light.

There will be no more light in the current sense that we know it. And as such, we are all hamstrung. So Lord, we just pray that you will guide and lead the people behind this bill and get Australia active and restored once again. It is your great Southland of the Holy Spirit and we pray for it in Jesus name.

Amen. Johnny, you've often been heard to say, you just couldn't make this stuff up. You couldn't make this stuff up. Stay out of the trees, everybody.
