

Club Grubbery - Raw transcript of interview:

2025-02-28 Graham and John speak with independent candidates in WA's pending election

Well, good day everyone. It's Wednesday the 26th of February and uh, good to see you again, John. Thanks mate. Great to be here. Great lineup. Good lineup and it's good to be, uh, back on club grubby again, pumping the shows out as we always do. And, uh, very interesting times in our history at the moment because it seems like the uni party are a little bit on the nose, John.

They're not getting, um, they're not getting the support they used to get.

Well, no surprise, uh, when you, when you've got good quality alternatives, uh, that can really make an impact and a difference. So why would you vote for those mainstream parties that. Just deliver the same thing under a different banner.

Absolutely. Right. And today we are in a unique position because, uh, west, west Australian State election coming up a week on Saturday. And this is a unique opportunity because we have five independent candidates who are running on the one ticket. And this is, um, this is something we'd like to see happen in the federal election, John.

Oh, definitely. And I think it's a real opportunity. And, and, and actually, uh, John Ruddick from the Libertarian Party, uh, uh, put this out, uh, a couple of days ago and, and look, it really needs to be followed up on by all the, uh, the minor parties because if we're gonna have success at that, uh, federal level, then we need to, uh, get in the same space.

There's, there's no question about

it. We do indeed. And there's a lot of issues to discuss, so let's get right into it. We're gonna be interviewing these candidates and they'll be, uh, toing and froing between each other and ourselves as well. And we'll be asking them some questions about how they see this unfolding.

Firstly, we have, um, uh, sitting member Sophia Mond. Uh, thank you. Great to have Sophia. Great to have you with us. Yeah.

Thank you for having me here.

And Louise, uh, Kingston, you're also a sitting member in WA as well? That's correct. Yes. And thank you for having me. Great to have you. We have Tony Bell. Welcome Tony.

Good day. I dunno if you remember, we met in, uh, rotunda in on your trip across from over east.

Oh, right. That was the, that was the first meeting we ever did, uh, on our trip. Yeah. In fact, we weren't even, well, the

young lady that was in the rotunda, I ended up marrying her. So it was, thank you for coming to town.

Oh, here you go. See, it was well worth the time. Good to have you on Tony. And we have Ben Dawkins joining us. Ben, you are a sitting member as well.

Yeah, I, I'm a sitting member, but I changed my name to Austin Aussie Trump. Austin Aussie

Trump.

Yeah. Did you not hear about that? Uh, it's been quite all. Well, I

kind of heard about it.

I kind of heard about it. And, uh, so what do you want us to call you tonight? Ozzy. Ozzy. Yes. A-U-S-S-I-E. Okay. Okay. That'll be interesting to unpack that with you and Adrian Perot. Good to see you, Adrian.

Good to meet you. I didn't meet you when came to Bunbury too during Covid.

Right. I remember you all trust me.

I'm a doctor. There's a, there's a, a slip of the tongue. Yeah. Trust me, I'm a doctor. Well, here we are in really interesting times, aren't we? And the last, uh, four or five years have been incredibly interesting. WA was one of the most draconian states, uh, during the pandemic, uh, with the, I think one of the biggest egos in politics.

Mark McGowan, um, running the state his way and, and as a pilot, as a pilot still operating back then. I remember. Incredibly stupid decisions that were being made. I, I'd be on descend into Perth from Brisbane with a load of passengers on, only to be told by Qantas that Mark McGowan had just closed the state.

And, uh, people were confronted with either going into two weeks, quarantine when they arrived, or staying on airplane and going back to Brisbane. And, I mean, we saw that happen so much. The 11:00 AM press conferences in WA were just an absolute joke. And, uh, and so there is a screaming need I. For independence to really come out in the election in WA and also federally as well.

So, uh, let's start with you. Um, Sophia, how do you see the state of play at the moment with you guys running as on the one ticket as five independents? How do you think that will go for you?

Okay, well, uh, obviously I'm hoping it go will go really well. Uh, we've made history here as being, uh, able to have three sitting members from, uh, different political backgrounds come together on the one ticket.

So we were all, uh. Possibly, uh, removed against our will from our parties over the last, uh, couple of years. Uh, so, and, and we've come together, which is quite a historic moment now when you're looking at the electoral reform that was put through by, uh, the Liberal party and that's, or the Labor Party, and that's now been followed, uh, in Canberra as well.

Um. I don't think they would've thought that we would've managed to get a ticket together to get a, uh, a box above the line for people to fill in. So when you're looking at traditional voter patterns, uh, 96 to 97% will vote above the line. Only. So by having us in a group ticket and that little box that they can put their one in, uh, above the line, gives us a really good chance.

It's made, it just made it really easy for everyone, uh, to vote for us.

And I can imagine there'll be a lot of people wanting to do that. There's a lot of disenfranchised people in wa. Absolutely. Um, so Louise, Louise, how do you see it playing out from your perspective?

Look, I think it's really exciting times, to be quite honest.

I don't think labor really thought this through very carefully. Uh, I don't think they realized how determined, uh, that we would be, uh, to actually navigate this system. I mean, 250 indirect in, um, individual declarations each, um, you know, there was 11 of us to start with and five of us. Uh, ended up, you know, at the 11th hour across the line.

And like Sophia said, you know, it gives us such a great opportunity as an alternative to vote for. Um, you know, we've got similar views in some things. We've got diverse views in other things. Um, and that means that we appeal to a, you know, a very broad range of people. Um, obviously the campaigns are very short campaign.

It's only gonna be three weeks. Um, and you we're out there doing as much as we can to try and get the message out. So doing something like this is just so, so, uh, valuable.

Oh, the, um, uh, uh, a question to the three sitting members, uh, what, what parties were, were you with and what was the, what was the main reason you, you ended up leaving your, your party?

Okay. Um, uh, I, I wouldn't, um, I think Sophia said, uh, removed. I mean, we, we all, as far as I'm aware, resigned, uh, more or less because of. We would all, you know, separately claim to be unfair, uh, treatment, I suppose, or, um, another way of saying that might be in my case, uh, not being pre-selected, although I was promised.

Um, but yeah, so for different reasons, but yeah. Um, as far as I'm aware, we all resigned, um, from those parties, so, uh, so voluntarily, um, yeah, just to, in relation to the. Electoral reforms that, um, the other guys have spoken about. I mean, that was the reason for changing my name. I mean, it, it's a protest. Um, they've deliberately, uh, relegated us to the far right hand side of the ballot paper.

And, uh, if, if we hadn't actually got 250 unique nominations, which is 1,250, when you, um, include the five of us, uh, and if we hadn't have paid \$2,000 each, that's. 10,000 in total. Uh, we wouldn't have even got a box above the line. So, uh, that and other, other ways that labor have changed the electoral laws to favor them and, and the other.

Other part of the uni uni party, um, have just really disgusted me in my time in Parliament. So I decided to do this protest. I discussed it with a few people and decided to go ahead and change my name, which was, um, quite, quite, um, a simple process in the end. And, um, yeah, so I'm on the ballot paper as, uh, Aussie Trump and, um, yeah, A-U-S-I-E Trump.

Um, so there, there you go.

You okay mate? You look like you're about to be arrested for something.

No, no. I'm, I'm okay. I'm just try, I'm on my way down to my hometown, where I grew up in the Southwest, uh, to speak to some other people who are also fans of yours, uh, down in a town called Nup.

Oh, nup. Yeah. Very good.

Um, Adrian, what, what, um, what, what are some of the common, uh, agendas that you guys all share?

Um, an aversion to, uh, covid mandates for a start forcing people to actually take a, a job to keep your job was the real big kicker for a lot of us. Um, I work in the retail industry and in my, the company that I worked for, I was very possibly the only person who kept his job.

Everyone else lost their job, uh, and didn't get the jobs. So that's a really big one that we all sit with. Um, it should never have been forced upon us. Because that's like, that's a fundamental right to pick what goes in your body for crying earlier. And they basically said you don't have a right to pay your mortgage or eat, you know, you lose everything if you didn't get the job.

And I had people coming up to me blokes in tears that they had to get the job just to keep their job or they would've lost their homes. And to, you know, to do that is just inhumane. Yep. That was one of the big ones.

What else do you, uh, agree on Tony?

I think the fact that, um, there should be more, uh, responsibility to the people and less government control.

So it should be about they, they're supposed to be government servants or public servants, and they always seem to be telling us what to do and controlling us. And as I was out in 40, 45 degrees knocking on doors. Um, everyone's sick to death at not only the, the control that seems to be put on them, that they're losing their freedom from actually choosing their own halves in life.

And then, then all the, basically the political bribery going on at the moment. I'm mean, kgo, and there's the, the, between the big parties, there's nearly a billion dollars in election promises being as long as we get in. People wanna see the money being spent. They, they're, they're in there to do a job. It shouldn't matter which color it is.

There, there's a job to do.

Johnny,

of, of the, uh, the guys that are, that were sitting members, uh, um, I, I think Ozzy might have been with the Labor Party, but, uh, is anyone else, can, can you give us some insight into, into what went on behind the scenes in the caucus meetings with, with, uh, McGowan in relation to Covid?

No, we weren't, we weren't involved in that 'cause we're in opposition, of course. Um, I entered after, um, so I, I came in in September, 2023. Um, but I'd been very vocal and very outspoken in my community about exactly what, um, Tony and Adrian were just talking about, uh, guiding people on how to find their way, uh, around that to keep their jobs.

Um, you know, speaking to not-for-profit boards and, you know, warning them not to, uh, to enforce it, you know, the, the personal responsibility that could be, um, they could be impacted by, and I, you know, I had such a great, um, outcome here in my, my hometown. Um, and yeah, so, so. Just, I was just horrified, you know, watching what was going on.

Um, it, it justifies logic that, uh, a government could do what they did to people and frighten them like they did. Uh, you know, we haven't got enough workers now, you know, stopping them from working just didn't make any sense. So, you know, I was, I was very, very vocal about it.

So, uh, in my case, uh, I was personally affected by the, uh, mandates.

So Western, the West Australian state government was the only government to change the standing orders to, uh, legislate that mps were also mandated to, uh, show vaccination certificate or an exemption certificate. So I didn't have. Either of those. I did try to get an exemption certificate and I had several doctors say that with my medical history, that would make sense, but they were too frightened to write that because of apa.

Um, I had two referrals to, uh, local immunologists here at Sue Charles Gardner Hospital that didn't go anywhere, so I've got a very recognizable name. So. I do wonder what happened to those referrals and somehow lost in the system there. Um, anyway, I ended up being suspended. I wasn't allowed to, uh, enter Parliament House for about six months.

And, um, you know, my background is as an, I ran a naturopath and a Chinese medicine practitioner, and I had some serious doubts about mRNA vaccinations. What I'd read about that, learned about it. I thought they would cause harm, and we've now shown to be right about that. Uh, anyway, I got back in by catching Covid on purpose from one of my double Vaxxed staffers, uh, because it was so safe and effective.

Uh, and that's how I got my, uh, exemption certificate. So yeah, they were very serious here about making sure that they would enforce as much as possible for everyone. To get vaccinated. It was crazy. Really?

It was the worst of the worst over there, wasn't it? I mean, McGowan was just outta control. I mean, we, we, we talk about, uh, you know, the Dan Andrews of the world, but when you look at it, I mean, McGowan was as bad as anyone.

Well, you couldn't even buy a beer at a drive through bottle shop,

I think with a mask

on. With a mask on

about three years ago. When he literally got out on the news and stopped a young couple from gonna see their, um, parents that were dying. Yeah, that was a big turning point for me. It was like, I, I couldn't understand why we weren't going on a big health kit, so to speak, good nutrition, especially to vulnerable people.

Um, exercise, community, all those things that strengthen your immune system. Where we're going on this kick to do all the opposite. And then when he stopped people from being able to visit dying parents and stuff, that was um, that's when I got really mad.

Yeah, and I actually spoke in the chamber several times about natural therapies that we could offer people and uh, I'm sure you all know the formula, vitamin D, vitamin C, and zinc are your three main immune nutrients.

Right. And they're actually all really quite cheap. You could supplement everyone on vitamin D for about 10 cents a day, but, um, and yeah, look. I was, I was entirely ignored and dismissed.

There was actually a product they put out, um, it's called immunity. It's not available anymore. Uh, but I took it right from start.

Like Sophia, I did the research. I've also got an inherited condition, and I, um, was advised by my specialist not to get the vaccination or jab, I'm not gonna call it that, and couldn't get the exemption and had exactly the same experience. Uh, and I took this and I, um, yeah, I haven't even had covid, so. Mm.

Very interesting. Yeah.

Well without, uh, you know, if there's no alternative, then the emergency use authorization keeps going, doesn't it?

Yeah.

Uh, which is why they didn't, they weren't even looking at the simple off patent drugs that were gonna save lives.

Yeah, that's right.

Um, Aussie um, you, you're obviously a big fan of what Trump's doing over there.

How would you like to see, what policies of Trumps would you like to see implemented in wa

Uh, can you still hear me? Audi?

Yep.

Yeah. Um, so I've, I've, uh, put this on my social media. So I, I was, I'm a big fan of what, uh, Donald Trump did about, uh, reinstating all the military personnel who declined to take the vaccine, uh, with full back pay.

Um, you know, I can't actually make that happen here, or even, um, you know, even for, I would like to, would like that to happen for. Particularly, let's say nurses, uh, police officers and so on. And I have spoken about that and said that that's one of the things that I would like to, um, you know, introduce from, from Trump.

I mean, Trump, uh, he, he has other things that I'm, you know, not, not so keen on. But, uh, in an overall sense, he, he's really good at calling out, uh, some of these injustices. And, uh, that's, that's one of them. I have spoken to the police commissioner. In the estimates in Parliament and basically said that it was vindictive, uh, retribution on his behalf to sack police officers who refused to take the vaccine.

They were actually stood down for four years, uh, and they were sacked, uh, two years after the mandates were lifted. Uh, just in, um, uh, September of just gone. I mean, that's one of them. Uh, I also like, um, uh, Donald Trump's uh, two gender policy. There are only two genders. Or sexes. I think the document says sexes and, um, myself and Sophia have spoken about that in Parliament.

Obviously, labor have pushed through this ridiculous, um, self ID gender legislation where hoodie can go to the GP and 20 minutes later he can get a, a doctor's note, like a sick note and, and take it to the registry and become a female. Um, it's just got, uh, absurd some of the things that have come in under labor and, and now that Donald Trump is in, uh, we can all talk about it now.

Um, because he sort of empowered people to speak up again,

Adrian. Um, just interested, what, what do you think about the level of government in our, uh, in our, in our country at the moment? Um, there, there are, to me a lot of governments are gloating that they got, you know, so many thousand pieces of legislation through, uh, during their, their term in office as, as that's a proud thing for them to do.

How do you feel about that?

Um, can you say to anyone in particular or can I ask No to

Adrian?

Um, okay. For wa, they, they rammed a whole lot through and with it, they had a massive majority and that was, uh, that did not play out well because the upper house, you know, it's meant to be checks and balances and nothing was being done.

It was just all ramped through. Prime example would be the Cultural Heritage Act. That was, uh, they, they put it through four months later, they had to withdraw it again because it was so bad that they had to withdraw their own policy, you know, stop you digging holes in your own backyard if you owned a quarter acre block.

Um, and a lot of the politicians, the policies they're pushing 'cause they focus so much on themselves and their big donors and where the money is, the little guy down the bottom, which is, you know, retail workers me get squashed and forgotten about. And that's one of the reasons I decided to run and, and back these guys to get a group of ticket of five because the little guys down the bottom of the food chain, you know, the retail workers, the factory workers.

Warehouse workers. We don't make 150, 200 grand a year like some of these other people are doing. And when they, you know, food goes up by 10%, that hurts when rent doubles. That really hurts. You know, in four years there are pe rents. Now some houses, six, \$700 a week when it was only 304 years ago. And it's, it's totally insane.

And, and who's getting hurt? The people down the bottom. So I'm not very impressed with how they've ramped things through. Just 'cause they passed something doesn't mean it's a good thing, especially when it's hurting the people that need it the most.

And that's the traditional labor base. That's what doesn't make any sense.

You know? It, it just, yeah. That's who they should have been sticking up for right the way through instead of cosing up with the greens and all the, you know, ridiculous, uh, environmental laws we've got that are hampering people. I went to see some guy this morning and a decision by one of the, and I call them the gray layer Graham.

Um, so this is the middle, um, bureaucratic nightmare that's been created by subsequent governments that, uh, the practical person at the bottom can't navigate. The minister at the top has no idea what people like Adrian at the bottom are, are going through and they cloud everything in the middle. And this guy through one public servant's decision, shut his business down for three weeks, cost him three.

Million dollars and there's no accountability. Uh, and the, and the public servant was wrong. They made a mistake. So he's now having to go to court to try and get a, a resolution and, and, you know, some form of compensation from government. It's just disgraceful.

Too much red tape. It's too hard for businesses to work and that's, it's too hard for everyone.

It needs to be simple. Yeah. You know, for basic businesses, there should not be pages and pages and pages of, of red tape.

Yeah. You

know, I understand. Red tape for the big stuff maybe, but the local businesses, the coffee shops. It's just so hard. It's, they're just struggling to pay the bills, let alone try and jump through all the hoops.

You can't even buy watermelons on the side of the road anymore. There's too many legislations. It's, it's ridiculous.

And that, that gray layer should be, um, should be streamlining things and making things easier, you know, when I meet with them, um, and I can usually navigate it pretty well because I say to them, whilst I'm standing here, I'm not getting paid.

Whilst you are standing there, you are getting paid. I pay you wages. And it's amazing how many of them go, oh, I've never thought of it like that. You know, just a simple statement. Um, so I say to 'em, you know, it's in your best interest to make this as quick and easy and as simple as you can and as cheap as you can for me.

Uh, because if you don't, eventually you are not gonna have a job. It's as simple as that.

Then just to throw in another US reference there, I saw an, uh, interview with Elon Musk a while ago, and um, what he said is that, you know, more and more legislation gets pushed through and I. What we should be doing is then removing yes.

Old legislation instead of trying to adjust, adjust things and add more rules. Get rid of the old and make it all new. That's the, that

was the Kerry Packer model all those years ago when he said he wasn't, he was minimizing tax because you don't spend it well enough for me to give it to you. Very good statement.

Is that something you all agree on of, of minimizing the amount of red tape and laws that we're all confronted with these days? Absolutely.

I mean, how many businesses went outta business during Covid? Yeah, that's right. That's

where Ben was going. Empowering the people again, is the government should be there to do what the people want and, and keep things in check.

But all this legislation, registrations, insurances, all the bits and pieces. I mean, I used to be a carpenter and I changed over to being a, um, a group fitness instructor around the world because there was less red tape. The insurances was better and um, but you look at it, it's a globalist run system now.

Yeah. It's not even Australians running the system. They're taking all their advice from people that don't live in our country. They want control over everything we want and take the responsibility back from the people. I wanna see people thrive. That's why I got involved. I don't have to do this. I'm on an incapacity pension.

I'm, I wanna see my grandkids be able to thrive in the future.

Yep.

And it's gotta be that bottom up approach, not the top down approach. That's just it. It just, yeah. It just builds bigger government, it builds more bureaucracy. It makes it miserable for the people trying to engage with it. You know, we've, we've got to change that culture.

As a result. Oh, sorry. As a result of that, we have an unelected bureaucracy in charge of Yeah,

that's right.

Many of the departments here. And they, they don't necessarily change when the party changes or our government changes. Uh, and those people will still have those same attitudes and ideas that they bring forward, which may well be outdated.

And they're on huge money. Like the, the people at the practical end of it, you know, our nurses, our policemen, our, um, our teachers, they're the ones that should be being paid more. So, you know, this, this middle gray layer should be the ones that are paid less, which attracts more people to go into the practical delivery of it.

And then, you know, you've got a ground swell down here feeding back up into this one, not the other way around. Yeah.

I to argue with that, Johnny, I. It's

very hard to argue with a hoodie, but, uh, what can you say, um, look, I'll start with you, Sophia. Uh, do, do you think that, uh, the handling of Covid, um, is still an election issue, uh, from a state government point of view?

And, and, and if you think it is, do you think that correlates with more, more people waking up?

Um, yeah. So our, uh, current, um. Uh, premier, um, uh, premier Cooks. Uh. Quite surprised that people are still talking about Covid. So, uh, you know, he calls us all sorts of names as well that we're still dwelling up on that, but I think either they're not talking about it or, um, and, and they realize that it is still an issue and because it's still an issue with so many voters.

Maybe that's why they're not talking about it. I'm not quite sure on that, but I have certainly noticed that. Us as a, a group of, uh, independents and that one of the things that we are talking about is the mandates and the lockdowns.

Mm-hmm.

And in the people that we speak to, that has a lot of traction still, you know, and the thing is, is that I.

Um, I believe this was some sort of experiment here in Western Australia, possibly the whole of Australia, and that we will have another pandemic and, um, we have to be our own type of pandemic ready to make sure that we are much stronger in the pushback next time around. And

I think it, that people

have woken up.

It's broadened out from that too because, you know, I, I've got my five Fs, which are my Freedom Fs, um, and the fails of government, um, which is, uh, firearms. So the dreadful legislation they've brought in, um, around that, that I've fought, you know, 20 over 20 amendments in the upper house, which, uh, the labor government just totally and utterly ignored and it's totally unworkable.

Um, and it's caused so much distress out there in the community. So firearms, phishing. Farming forestry and four-wheel driving, and they're all ones post covid. So all the fun activities too. So it starts with an f as well, um, that, you know, that they've, they've, they've meddled in and made people's lives in those, in those areas.

Um, you know, miserable, you know, guys I talked to out there, they're like, you know, well they, the, they're the fun police, you know, nobody's allowed to have any fun or do anything anymore. It's that it's that overreach of control, um, that people are just. Absolutely sick to death of.

Yeah. Especially in wa because there's so much outdoor activity going on over there.

Yeah,

yeah. Uh,

the fact that they're, you know, I'm hearing horrible rumors that they're gonna legislate recreational fishing to make it almost impossible to even do it. Yeah.

Yeah. Yes. And for

what reason? For what reason?

Because they can, but, well, the other thing on the firearm thing is when people bring it up, we may, well, they're knocking on doors.

Um, to reframe it to 'em. I go, you know, the cost of living is really dreadful. I dunno whether they get this four to 10% that inflation's gone up because some of our food has gone up two, three times. Yeah. The price of years. It's not back to farmer.

That's right. And I've

got a lot of people from aboriginals to, to, um, people living out in Leona.

Up in Lester and everything, they go out and shoot a goat or a, or a kangaroo so they can feed their family. Mm-hmm. So when I'm, when I ask people, when they're, oh, the criminals, I go, so you think it's wrong for people to put food on their table? I go, what do you mean? I go, this is the only way they can do it, a 10 cent bullet to feed their family instead of \$170 a kilo for steak.

Yeah.

Mm-hmm. But we have seen, haven't we, that, uh, things can be reversed in wa I mean, it's, it's probably one of the worst states. When you think that there's legislation there that supports, uh, mandatory, uh, vaccinations, I

mean, holding people down in their homes. I mean, people don't realize this Yes, stuff actually exists, but I mean, Tony Seabrook, uh, essentially, uh, fought back on all that indigenous nonsense about the farm land.

I mean, and they reversed that. So I mean, it, it's indicative of. Of when people actually stand up and say, no, you can stick that up your backside. Uh, they do take notice.

Yeah, absolutely. I'm hoping,

I'm hoping that this time, 'cause they changed the rules to try to get rid of independence. I mean, there was 49 independents at the last election.

There's 10 this time.

Yeah. And now

we've got this group of five. How about a protest and get five in? That'd drive them nuts.

That would, and that's a real alternative. That's a real alternative for people in wa. Tell me, um, Ozzy, uh, relating to the announcement last week by Clive Palmer, uh, regarding trumpet of Patriots, um, how do you see that going?

Um, yeah, Clive's copied me. I, I changed my name to Ozzy Trump and then Clive comes and does this, and I know that he's, uh, he's emphasizing the Trump. Part of Trumpet, um, and obviously replicating policies. Look, I think it'll go well. I mean, it's, it's not, um, it's not ev it's not for everybody. Um, but I keep bringing it back to the fact that, um, Trump has been cutting through woke.

Bullshit or crap I might say. Um, and he continues to do that with, well, his executive orders that he brought through and he's pushing back against a lot of the, the woke stuff that we've experienced. Um, just quickly though, hoodie, just in relation to the, um, to this, to whether or not Covid is still an issue, it is a elect, it is an election issue because Roger Cook was the, he's now running for Premier.

He, he, he's not fit to run for Premier because. He was the health minister who presided over the vaccine era. Uh, and he, I've actually, um, brought to his attention, uh, a lot of things that have been established who he, in regard to the harms done to West Australians from, uh. Wa Labor's management of Covid.

So that, I mean, these are not even controversial. These, these are, are things like, uh, the pericarditis and the myocarditis, which is, um, there, there's actually been federal government funds paid out through the compensation scheme, um, for, for these vaccine injuries. So it, it's not even something that's controversial, but I put it to him, him in Parliament, and it's on my social media, and I asked him to acknowledge some of those harms.

Um, during the time he was. He was health minister and he simply said no. Um, and that, that actually got retweeted by. Uh, Andrew Bridge and the MP in the uk. So, I mean, he, his, um, lack of accountability and his arrogance is astonishing and he, and he's not fit to be running for Premier. And the idea you can run for Premier after doing what he did to the, the people during, uh, the Covid at he health minister, he is just outrageous.

I mean, he, he, he should, he should really pull out. I mean, he won't, but he, he, he should pull out, he's the other part of. Fit to be part, let alone no,

hopefully

be moved at the election. And then you could say the other thing, why, why, uh, covid inverted commas is still an issue, um, is because of the emerging, uh, science A around the mRNA vaccines, which Sophia and Louise and I have spoken about.

And we're the only. Ones that have spoken about it, um, and, and put it, put it into the Parliament. Um, and as I keep on saying, what are we paying the other 71 members of the West Australian Parliament, upper and lower house for if, when there's only three of us who, who are the only ones out of, out of 74 mbs?

It's about 28 and a half million. We pay in MP salaries per annum. Uh, and there's 71 of them out of 74 who've. Who, who've sat on their hands and done nothing and can't even, uh, put forward the concerns of the people in relation, uh, to the mRNA vaccine. So a hundred percent it's an issue. It, it's, it's an issue, which by all rights, um, you know, in an ideal world would, would result in all five of us being elected because we, 'cause we have the courage of our convictions.

We, we have the courage to speak up. Uh, the other 70, the other 71. Are all hamstrung by their parties and told that they can't talk about these things. So, in a nutshell, there, you've, there's your reason for voting independent, uh, group M in the upper house at this election,

and that's not even taken into account.

Things like the, the, um, expected death rate is up 18%, you know, the VS. Reports. There's more vs. Reports over. The Covid vaccines and all the others in history combined, that those two things alone should scare the pants off a lot of people. We need to look into it further so that the, the mistakes made aren't repeated.

Mm.

Because I mean, that's the reason I didn't take it. I'm a single dad. I couldn't risk damaging my health. For a cold, yes, it might've been a bad cold, but for a cold where I couldn't provide for my children.

Mm-hmm.

That was an unfair thing to force upon me, and that's the reason I had to say no. 'cause the risks didn't, you know the benefits of a vaccine that you could take.

Didn't stop you from catching it and didn't stop you from spreading it and didn't do much else, and didn't reduce severity to not doing

it. Yeah,

it, it was, it was a no brainer decision, but it was still difficult 'cause it cost hugely financially and emotionally. It was a really hard time, not just for me, but for a lot of people.

Let's forget that Adrian McCrae has not only put WA on the map, uh, worldwide for his port headland motion. I mean, he's done more for tourism wa than, than probably anyone else. Uh, you know, through exposing the fraud of Covid. Uh, but the way that Ro uh, Roger Cook, uh, spoke and treated Adrian McCrae and de essentially disgusting, was absolutely so despicable towards those people who've been vaccine injured.

Yeah. Is grace. I mean, this bloke, uh, you know, he should be trotted outta parliament. He should be put on trial and he should be locked up. Throw away the

key. You're a grab.

Yeah,

that's,

but that, I mean that's why they pardon fauci, isn't it? I mean, seriously, that's why Biden pardoned fauci 'cause they know it's coming and they pardon him for future crimes.

That's disgusting. Mm-hmm. That, that shows how evil it was if they had to pardon the US big doctor before he could be charged with anything. If that doesn't throw warning bells to everybody. You, um, our healthcare

system here in Western Australia is already under really great stress, you know, uh, hospital ramping has, uh, gone up to 8,000 hours or something like that.

It is, it is very scary, and we are going to see more and more people with very serious conditions, cardiovascular, autoimmune, uh, and then also turbo cancers coming through. All those people will need to be treated. The cost of that is going to be immense. And to not prepare for that is, is dumb. And, um, criminal, basically.

Criminal.

It's criminal. Criminal.

Yep.

Louise, uh, let me ask you, we we're, we're bringing up Adrian McCray. Now I've got a lot of time for Adrian. I really do. And um, and it's pretty clear from uh, Roger Cook's attitude towards him that there is a vendetta from Roger Cook to the Port Headland Shire Council.

Um, it's pretty clear that he's gonna try everything he can to put them into administration, which would be a disaster. It would be a disaster for Port Hedland. Have you heard any movement in that area within the, uh, within the house?

No, no, this has all happened. Um, all post the Rising of Parliament. Um, you know, it, yeah, it, it's unbelievable the, the overreach of government.

So we've had a lot of changes to a lot of legislation as well. We had the local government, uh, act changed, uh, and I had a lot of, uh, contact with a lot of the, the councilors in various councils about that overreach, you know, and what they're gonna be able to do to those councils. Uh, and, and yeah, we, we are seeing it play out now.

You know, first instance with Port Headland, uh, heaven only knows, you know, what they're gonna do next to, to councils and yeah, it, it, it's just more, you know, my saying power corrupts and absolute power corrupts Absolutely. It's a very, very good example of that. And that's why we so desperately need people to understand, you know, that their preferences, you know, where they're gonna vote, who they're gonna go get to go in that upper house.

Um, because, you know, the, the voting system has changed so much for this election. Um, that if they vote like they've always voted, um, you know, it's not, it's not gonna be a good outcome for Western Australia at all.

Are you guys all speaking to Adrian mcc,

sorry,

mate's.

Probably how I ended up here. Um, after his port headland thing, one of the girls here in Kholi, Carissa, hi Carissa, she, um, we went up into the Kholi council.

Tried to get a motion brought forward, realized that that wasn't the right thing to do. Um, I went up the next month, we presented some facts and figures and we actually got to have a sit down with the mayor. Um, and they've actually written a letter to Roger Cook asking for investigation into the DNA contamination.

And we also were able to get put forward a Royal Commission into the COVID-19 response and the ongoing issues. So that was from Kholi, but that's how I ended up here talking to politicians and they're going, you need to make a voice. So here, here we are. I was lucky enough to find these people up, seen safe, stand up in Parliament, and make a stand and get suspended.

That spoke volumes to me.

I, I saw the, uh, Kur Mayor as somewhat recalcitrant around all that. I'm glad to hear that he was persuaded otherwise.

He, he's covered his bases. Let's put it this way, but he still put his signature on the bottom of the letter. Mm-hmm. So he's, he's making a stand for his constituents.

But you can play that two ways. If it comes to something good, he can say, look, I, I wrote the letter. Mm. If it doesn't come of anything, he goes, I was only doing it for my, my Yeah. Concerned people. Yeah,

so I ended up tabling all of the material from the Port Headland, uh, council meeting in the upper house here.

So they've got all of that data. Then more, uh, data around a DNA contamination came out. Just before Christmas and on Christmas Eve, I sent all of my parliamentary colleagues an email saying that this is an emergency, we really need to do something. And I had one response back, which was from Sue Elle telling me that, um, it wasn't her, uh, her department.

And that was it. So they've all been warned they have all the data. Right. And they are just ignoring it, and that, that is willful.

Yeah. Whatcha hearing around the corridors? Uh, uh, Sophia and uh, Louise, are you hearing, uh, from staff that, uh, mps are injured from the vaccines? Uh, staff are injured? Um. Uh, what's hap what's happening?

Uh, I know of one MP that is injured that has spoken about that, but, uh, I haven't heard from anyone else. I don't have any of you. If you have heard of anyone, Louise,

what I've noticed, which I think is really weird, and it's not just in the halls of parliament, but it's everywhere I go, um, it's this cough that every, everybody's got this really chesty cough.

Um, and I noticed the increase in the. Staff at Parliament House, um, being off sick, uh, that was the first thing I noticed. And quite significant sicknesses as well. Um, but yeah, you know, I've definitely noticed in my own community, you know, we've got excess death rate, um, you know, people, people that, uh, you know, got, like Sophia said before the turbo cancers and, and autoimmune conditions and stuff like that.

Um, and, and you know, like I said, maybe it's just being brought to the fore, but it does seem to be, um, yeah, there seems to be a lot more in in society.

I want to, I want give you each an opportunity to make a pitch to the, uh, west Australian electorate, um, as we wrap this one up. Adrian, I'll start with you.

What would you like to say to the people of Western Australia? I.

There's a, there's a lot of people here wanting to just donkey vote it because they're so snotted with the, the government, um, they're literally, you hear every day, there'll be people, oh, I'm just gonna draw pictures. I'm gonna just do this and do that.

I'm suggesting you actually vote the independence in, because that's gonna annoy them even more than anything else. They don't want people with an individual voice in there. I also would like, you know, to say that Tony and I we're both just normal blokes. You know, we're, we're just the average person fighting for the average person, and we both sit down and talk about it, that the, what's lost in a lot of parliament is people have forgotten what Parliament is.

You're meant to be public servants. They're not public servants anymore. They serve other things. They're not self-serving the public. They've lost what it means to actually serve. So many times you, you know, you watch the video of people in Parliament and it's like nine people in there. It's like they're getting paid big bickies and then can't even sit in the room and listen.

I mean, that's, that's offensive. You know, most of us down, you know, in retail, would love to have the wages of that type of thing and then not turn up to the job is just. I find that really bad. So, um, that's, that's my big one if you're gonna protest. And the other one would be when you're numbering your, your upper house and lower house, just stop numbering before you reach the major parties.

So, number the rest. Don't even give them your, don't even give 'em a preference. You know, it'd be absolutely hilarious if neither labor or liberal managed to get, you know, more than a handful of seats. It would really, really rattle 'em. To just stop numbering before you reach the majors. 'cause the upper house has nothing to do with who runs power.

A lot of people don't understand that the upper house and the lower house is very different. Lower house dictates who's running the country. The upper house just has to check stuff through, make sure it's good or bad. And people think that it's all, all parliament. So now upper house, you don't need labor deliberate at all.

You don't even need 'em. They don't even need to be in the building for the upper house, for the upper house to run. So don't even number 'em. That'd be my 2 cents.

Johnny, uh, you know, it, it, we're in a situation now where for the first time, I think in electoral history, we've got a, a group of independents on one ticket that have got themselves above the line.

Surely that is enough for anybody who's dis disenfranchised or disgruntled. I mean, you'd have to be a donkey to, to go in into that booth and, and cast a donkey vote when you've got an alternative like this, wouldn't you?

Look, this is a real opportunity for the people of Western Australia and look, I would absolutely encourage them.

Uh, with, with everything, uh, within me to say, please, uh, vote for these people. I mean, they have proven to be people of integrity, of compassion. Uh, they, they are willing to listen. They're willing to work with the people of Western Australia is certainly no d no doubt about that. I mean, here we have a real opportunity, uh, to keep the Mongols honest and that's all it's about.

Uh, we need to make sure that that upper House of Parliament is, is the checks and balances. Uh, we don't need the labor and the liberal party in there at all. Uh, let these guys do their job. Let them work out what the people think is sensible and common sense. Throw the, uh, woke textbook out the bloody door.

We don't need it. And, uh, restore. You know, these state governments to, to actually achieving outcomes for the people. Stop wasting money, stop, you know, pouring resources into these garbage things like these L-B-G-Q-T days and Mardi Gras things and dressing up all your SES cars with bloody rainbow flags.

Who gives a shit? Nobody cares. We are fed up with all this crap. We've had enough

and, and, and I've got veterans, uh, on both. First response in that, that are dying in the gutters and can't get services. And we're having, um, holidays and bits and pieces

and the Ben Falconers of the world are sacked people that have dedicated their bloody entire lives to serving their states to be thrown out the door on the whim of this idiot cook.

He couldn't run a hot bath.

Yeah. Couldn't agree with you more. Johnny, Tony, uh, your chance to make a final pitch to the people in wa.

The big thing that I can say is I haven't been able to work for eight years because I've been on a pension. I've put my feet on the floor. I thank my wife for Rachel, a huge amount of support, but just been empowering the people to have responsibility again, that we can help make you thrive and get back into the community and get to do the things that you need to do to provide for your family, to provide for your community.

Governing more for the people. Let's give them, let's give them KPIs. Let's make 'em accountable.

Fantastic stuff. Louise.

Yes. Um, very much what everybody said, power to the people. You know, we, the people control those preferences. You've always controlled those preferences. So let's, let's educate people on how they can make a difference and, and be heard, you know, voice to the voiceless and let us get in there. Let us hold them to account.

I sit on the legislation committee. We had one piece of legislation referred in the last, uh, 40 years. It's usually the busiest, uh, committee of all that tells you exactly what's been going, what's, what's been going on. So restore that power to the upper house, uh, to hold the majors to account and deliver what the people of Western Australia need.

That's right. And you're lucky Western Australia to have an upper house because Queensland doesn't run and they really, boy, do they need an upper house over there. Yeah. So give us a big pitch.

Okay, so column M, number one, above the line. Yes, you'll get five strong-willed independents who are clever, who want to listen to the people, do the right things for the people, hold the government accountable, and provide some serious pushback to the bad leg.

Legisl bad legislation that I have pushed through over the last four years.

Yep. That's, that's perfect. That's perfect. I'm envious of you and wa that you've got this choice. I mean, this, this is milestone stuff. If you don't use it, you're crazy because that is a, at least 30% of people in WA who are fed up with the majors and, uh, you know, John, we, we know for a fact that if.

A couple of good independents run, uh, for the Senate and WA in the federal election. They'll steamroll it in because the people are done and dusted with these major parties. And why wouldn't they be with the arrogance of people like Roger Cook? What an arrogant twit that guy is. We had the great debate over there and I MCed that event in Perth and he didn't even have the guts to turn up.

He's so arrogant. And the big question we are, and we know you're gonna watch this Roger Cook. I bet you do. Good day, Roger. Um, the big question I posed to you, your empty seat on stage at the uh, exhibition center in Perth was if you thought there was the slightest chance that someone was tampering with your DNA or your immune system, would you like to know about it?

'cause that's all we're asking. We deserve the right to know because there's enough evidence out there to prove that that's happening. You haven't even got the guts to turn up and answer questions. You don't have the guts to call a proper thorough independent inquiry in your own state because you know as well as everybody that if a proper independent inquiry is, is conducted with full judicial teeth, your backside is grass, mate, your backside is grass.

You are one of the most arrogant politicians, and believe me, that's something because we've seen a few of them, Johnny.

We've seen a heap of them, mate, I tell you. And, uh, look, we've had enough. I tell you, you, you spend one more dollar on this, uh, rainbow flag garbage. Whilst there's veterans, nurses, every day, Australians sleeping under britches with their kids in cars.

You, people are, are, are on another planet. I tell you. We're coming for you and we're starting at the Western Australian election. I hope to God you people are booted out.

Just one quick one. Um, like we are doing this with nearly no funding for a start, but just imagine if the minor parties and all the independents got control of the upper house, whoever gets part, they're not gonna pass anything unless they do something for us.

And that is we want a real investigation and work out what the hell went wrong with covid and how do we not do the same mistakes twice so people have to vote the independence in, and then the miners then after. Because we've gotta show a force that we're all. We've just had enough of the majors and what they do and the only way to fix that is in the upper house 'cause we will never get the lower house, but we can definitely stir trouble up from the upper house to make them pass stuff that will help the people.

Well, Sam Grs, if you don't want to, I know you don't like people from over east telling you what to do. Uh, I married a West Australian lady and I know that for a fact, but, uh, I tell you what, if you don't want the fox getting the run of the hen house, then you need to put these independent candidates into power in the Senate.

You need to do that in the upper house. Boy, you are lucky. You have got a golden opportunity. There are millions of Australians who would love to be able to do. What you guys can do, and you are gonna be able to send a message to all these fat cats in the federal parliament who think that they've got at home and hosed what's going on in America is shaking, uh, shaking ground what's happening in Germany.

You've got a politician coming outta the woodwork in Germany, who's, who's, uh, really kicking some butt over there for the same reason. Um, the world is changing. The pendulum's coming back from the left and it's swinging hard towards the right. And any politician who doesn't jump on that bandwagon is crazy.

That's why Peter Dutton is a nut job. Johnny Lanner, he's a nut job.

Well, and hoodie, let's, let's call it for what it is. I mean, what a lineup we've got and it speaks volumes about what you're going to get because these guys have been able to organize themselves to, to put themselves front and center for you today.

I mean that that speaks well, had to fight

hard John to get this together. It wasn't, there wasn't no cat walker. It was really hard to fight hard.

You've gotta make the upper house an independent collection of common sense. And that's what's on the screen here for you today. Uh, you've got opportunity. You go for it.

Yes.

Well, I'm gonna do what I don't normally do. I'm sorry, Sophia. Oh,

we are not foxes identifying as chickens, by the way, just putting that forward. Yeah, we we're the real deal here.

I'm gonna call you guys the Mars of the chook yard Big, the big white sheep dog. I'm, I'm gonna do what we customarily do and let's bring this to a close with a prayer.

And so, dear Lord, father in heaven. We thank you for the courage, the strength and the, the, the, the willingness to put egos aside and agendas aside to come good for the people of Western Australia by these five candidates. Father God, we pray that they will be triumphed. We pray that the people will vote sensibly and we pray that they will get all the support they need with how to vote cards.

And all the other things that they need to get this up and running, because if they do Father God, it will set a trend right across the country. So we pray for them. We ask you to bless them, and we ask you to bless this great nation of Australia. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
