2025-25-01 Graham and John speak about Australia Day 2026

Good day, Johnny Buddy. Good to be back. Happy Australia Day, mate. Am I allowed to say that?

Uh, well, I, I don't know. Uh, probably not. It's probably against the law now. Is it?

I don't know. I don't dunno. Anyhow, we're gonna cover off on all of that amongst the whole bunch of other things, Johnny. And, uh, we will, I've gotta tell you, um, if I'm a little bit sunburnt and I'm looking it a little bit red that, uh, my mate Jardine and I erected a flagpole down the front of our property today, and we ran up the, uh, we ran up the blue flag.

Good stuff. We did. And this morning I drove out of the driveway and, and, uh, my neighbor, uh, Steve, who I don't, we don't often see eye to eye. In fact, uh, quite often we don't, uh, for various reasons, uh, probably because we're both old and crotchety. Um, he was, he was hanging up his flag out the front as I drove down.

And for the first time in ages, we looked at each other and laughed and give each other a thumbs up because we had that one thing in common. We love our country. Mm-hmm. And we're not gonna be swayed from flying the damn flag. Mm-hmm.

Mm-hmm.

Well, his wife makes good biscuits too, from what I remember. Yeah, she does.

She does indeed. And I'll tell you what else, uh, the flag I got, I'm hanging up. I got from Barnaby Joyce. He sent it to me because I'm in his electorate. I wrote to him and said, I want a flag. And he sent it to me. And guess where it was? Made? Australia. Australia. I think by Clark's Flags one of the few manufacturing industries.

That's still going, Johnny. Yeah. Well there you go. In Australia. There you go. So mate, we've got a lot to cover off on. Um, the dust is nowhere near settling on the hate speech bill on what happened in Bondi, uh, the government's reactions to what's happened in Bondi. Uh, we've, we've got the aftermath of the bush fires in Victoria.

We've got the machinations all around the hate speech bill, uh, of the division in the coalition. Now. There's so much stuff to talk about. Mm-hmm. So, Johnny, I'm always doing most of the yaking usually. Yeah. So I'm probably, I'm feeling like I'm gonna have a bit of a rant in the last half. So, uh, give us an update that.

Now, first of all, there's a great video going round done by, uh, a lawyer. I'm sorry I've forgotten his name. Uh, he's, he's put out a bit of an expose on this hate speech Bill. Johnny, this has gotta be singly singularly the most draconian piece of legislation ever passed in Australia's history.

Yeah. Well, well look, hoodie, I, I, uh, I can't work this out to be completely frank with everyone out there, how, how anyone in parliament other than those obviously woke politicians from labor.

Uh, voted in favor of This is Beyond Me. Uh, and, and it draws into question, uh, what we've been led to believe and what we've maybe, uh, falsely believed about people like, uh, Andrew Hasty because, uh, if, if they are saying, uh, uh, the day before that they're not going to vote this stuff in, and then they end up voting it in, and when you read the documents and lawyers have read the documents and are concerned, uh, and wonder what it's going to, uh, mean for this country, uh, in terms of free speech, we are in a lot of trouble.

Uh, I mean, I've spoken today with, with a couple of lawyers and, and hopefully we'll be able to do a bit of a. A debrief at Stu, some stage with, uh, Steve Kelly and, uh, Tony Nicoli in relation to this. But, uh, I, none of this fair is good for Australia hoodie. I, I, I don't, this is rushed. The whole thing's rushed.

It's, uh, it doesn't pass the pup test and why they've, uh, voted this stuff through without knowing what the consequences of it are is, is outrageous, in my opinion. I, I, I, I think it's unforgivable. I, I've read stuff online that says it's, it's, uh, uh, treasonous, uh, that it's, uh, you know, these people are traitors.

And look, I, I, I, uh, you know, I've gotta say, I, I, I, I'm, I'm tending to agree with 'em. I, I think it is an outrage.

Well, I think, uh, given the, uh, the salary of most of our politicians and the fact that they were elected on a promise to represent their constituents. At the very, very least, John, every single one of those politicians should, should have said, no, we're not voting on this now.

Uh, this has been rushed. We haven't had time to digest it. Uh, and the fact that, uh, so many of them voted for it means that they were just told to vote for it. They didn't know. They still don't know. They haven't got a clue what they've unleashed in this legislation. And, um, and, and that just goes to show that they put the party ahead of their constituents.

Mm-hmm. Every Australian deserved the right to have their representative say, no, we're not doing this. We'll vote on this in three months time. Yeah. Because the reason being John, is the legislation already exists for Asia Federal police and state police forces to act against radical Islam. And let's face it, this government is having two bob each way.

It doesn't want to call out radical Islam because it knows that's. Western Sydney votes will go in another direction. I dunno where because who else is there to vote for anymore? But these, these politicians are putting their electoral welfare ahead of the welfare of this country. The powers already exist under the preceding gun laws to go in and disarm these, these mongrels and to get rid of them.

Mm-hmm. Let's face it, they, they, if Asia, look, we know John, that the Australian Signals directorate had been monitoring club grubby for a long time. Regional, um, regional Australia's a basket case.

I mean, you, you talk about places like Morey, you can, you can't even get, uh, judges that want to go out there, uh, to appear in the court. It's that

bad. It's that bad. So this, at the very least, every politic. In a bipartisan fashion should have said, no, we're not voting on this. Now. This is stupid to bring this in so quickly.

Hmm. So, and then after it's been properly and thoroughly reviewed independently as well by, uh, by, you know, people who work in the judiciary and the legal fraternity, that this could be properly examined by constitutional lawyers, then a vote is taken. But for this to be rushed through the way it has shows to me that there is no leadership in Australia,

well, it, it demonstrates to hoodie that, that this is likely, uh, another sinister crackdown, uh, on, on the Australian public.

Uh, this is just another version of, uh, the pandemic. Uh, this is another, another grab for control. Uh, this is, uh, an outrage and, and, and anyone who voted for this without, uh, you know, pausing and, and saying, well, hang on a. You know, what you're trying to, uh, solve can already be solved. We, we already know, the, the response to what happened in Bondi, uh, was a disgrace.

How does somebody who's not even a citizen of this country that is on a visa end up with six firearms in western Sydney

legally registered

and they're going backwards and forwards to Malaysia, uh, or the Philippines, or wherever they went? I dunno, somewhere, uh, now beggar's belief hoodie just beggar's belief, uh, uh, about, you know, or just blame it, blame it elsewhere.

And, uh, we will, uh, essentially take every Australian citizen's, uh, rights. And we'll shut down free speech and, uh, uh, and we'll, uh, send this country to hell in a hand basket at any cost. And that's the, that's what's going on here. And, uh, you know, shame on these conservative politicians that, uh, didn't, uh, show some, uh, moral compass and, and, and some ticker.

And actually, uh, uh, stop this. Uh, there was, there was a few, there was a few standouts who were absolutely, uh, magnificent and correct. Uh, but there was some very, very weak individuals in that parliament. Um, and I think a lot of questions need to be asked, uh, as to what went on. I mean, even, uh, Jacinta, uh, Amgen price, uh, you know, said she couldn't get to the vote for whatever reason.

Now, I, I, I mean, I, I would love to hear the explanation as to what went on there. I mean, I, I, you know, these people, uh, their only job is to vote. Uh, on, on legislation at the end of the day, that's what they're getting paid for. And it's not good enough. It's not good enough to say that you, you know, got lost coming outta the toilet or didn't know whether to turn left or right, or didn't hear the bell go.

I mean, come on.

I saw some of the names of those who voted no, and I was quite surprised. I'm not a fan of Sarah Hanson Young, but she voted that.

Yeah. Yeah. Well, I, well, I, I think that that demonstrates that, uh, those, those politicians that did actually read it, uh, were, uh, and, and look, there was obviously some deal struck you, you know, certainly, uh, that's what it appears to me.

I mean, who knows? What's going on? You know, as Albanese promised, uh, some of these national politicians, uh, you know, a, uh, five year tenure as the ambassador of the Holy Sea, I mean, who, who knows what's going on here? We, we, we, we probably will never know, but that's the sort of stuff that's in play. Um, and, you know, I think people are right to say that, uh, uh, you should always back a horse if it's called self-interest.

Uh, and, and that's what's gone on here. Um, but this is not in the interest of Australia.

I'm rewriting the national anthem. I

reckon

you should. I'm rewrite. Well, I, I actually felt like when I put the flag up this afternoon with surrounded by friends and family and we sang Advance Australia Fair. Mm-hmm.

Um, actually, Michael Greg Griffith done a piece, I believe, I haven't read it yet, but I love the title, advance Australia Wear. Mm.

Mm

Uh, you know, great piece of, uh, great, a great, uh, provocative statement there by Michael, just in the title, but I felt like we should have ran our flag up at half mass. 'cause I think, I think, um, uh, I think we should all be mourning mm in Australia as a result of what's happened with this, with this hate speech.

Bill. I think we should all hang our heads and grieve, um, Australians, we have lost our voice for we're no longer free. It started and it's gonna finish and I'm gonna write it and we'll do it. But, you know, I love, it's just, yeah. It's just, we, we are no longer free.

No.

And we, we have, uh, we have seen the sacrifices of Aussies on battlefields all around the world, squandered by a gutless, uh, bunch of politicians on all sides with no backbone.

We have a jellyfish for a prime minister. Um, has there ever been a more unpopular prime minister in the history of this country? I

doubt it. No. Well, you know, you know the other thing that infuriates me, uh, hoodie and, and I'm sure a lot of people out there would feel the same, but just don't wanna say anything.

I mean, Chris Mins, uh, about two hours ago put out a, uh, a a a, um, a Facebook PO Post. It says, uh, this is the premier of New South Wales. Happy India Republic Day. The Indian community contributes immensely to our state enriching New South Wales across multiple areas of life. Today, I extend my warmest regards to everyone celebrating.

We are so honored that you have chosen to call New South Wales your home. Happy India Republic. Day 26th of January, 2026.

Now Chris Mins, are you gonna wish every Australian Happy Australia Day tomorrow, or is that gonna be a bit too politically sensitive for you? Um, is the Australian flag still flying over Parliament House in Cambridge on it's the biggest Australian flag in the world? Is that still flying or are we, uh, are we having two Bob each way and sort of, you know, will, will, will Anthony Albanese and his labor, labor cronies, uh, be attending Australia Day celebrations tomorrow and, uh, and praising the people of this country for the contributions that they've made?

Or is he gonna be skulking thinking that, oh, some, some people might think that I'm, you know, I shouldn't be doing that. I mean, are we, are we Australian or what I want to know, John, when if we do have another Olympics, who will someone carry the Australian flag into the arena for our team? Or are we not doing that anymore?

Um.

It seems like they're gonna carry everyone else's flag. Uh, um, I mean, what, what country are we living in here? You know, this is, this is just a, it's, it's unbelievable to me. I mean, yes, we should celebrate other cultures, but I mean, tomorrow is Australia Day, uh, front and center. That's it. And it shouldn't be overshadowed by anyone else's day.

India, whatever. It's, it's,

it's not invasion day. And I am so uplifted by some of the, uh, Australian Aboriginal cultural leaders who have put out videos saying that this is not invasion day. We've all benefited from their progress made in this country, uh, since, um, since the Europeans came here. And we're all one.

And the sooner we realize that we're all one, the better off we'll all be. Uh, some wonderful, wonderful comments made by, uh, Aboriginal statesmen. Uh, you know, and I thought to myself, one guy, uh, who made a, a beautiful video with a smile on his face all the way through, I thought he's got more leadership quality than our prime minister.

Mm-hmm. Mm-hmm. Yeah. 'cause what has Albanese done, but divide this country. Yeah. That's all he is done.

That's all he he's done. Yeah. That's all he is done Now here, how do you spend half a billion dollars, John? On the voice referendum? Yep. Because you wanted everyone to vote Yes. To give people a voice, and then you bring in a hate speech bill to shut people down.

How does that make any sense to the average Australian?

It can't, can't make any sense. Uh, and, and as you said earlier, I mean, you go and speak to outstanding Australians like Uncle Richard, uh,

just an perper price. Another one. Proud to be Australian, proud to, to celebrate, um, Australia Day, not invasion day. Yep. For goodness sake. Mm. You know, I, this, this, this madness has to stop. He, we have spent our entire lives, John, when we went to school, we used to, we used to have to sing the national anthem.

It was God Save the Queen. Back then, in my day, we used to sing that. And we used to stand at attention in front of the flag raising at assembly every day.

Mm. We were taught someone play the piano, wouldn't

they? Someone played piano. Yeah. Yeah. And we'd have a, we'd just finished having our bottle of milk that was left out in the sun in the morning.

Um, you know, and, and, uh, we, we were taught to be proud. Be proud of your country. Show an interest in your country. That's not nationalism, that's humanity. That's community. We celebrated each other. And back then, Johnny, my school was full of Wags and Dagos. Mm-hmm. Who were the Wags and the dagos? They were Greeks, they were European migrants who settled in Australia and made Australia fantastic.

And they called, they called us all kinds of names and we called them all kinds of names. And we played together and we fished together and we, we went hiking together. And we played footy together. We all got on. We never took each other too seriously. It was great to be alive. And I, I re I remember back in the day, probably long before you, John, when the Vietnam War ended, there was this big thing in Australia about Vietnamese boat people invading Australia.

Vietnamese Australians today are some of the vertebrae and the backbone of this country. Dai, they're magnificent Chinese as well. Mm-hmm. Chinese have played a major role in Australia since the gold rushes in the, in the 18 hundreds. Yep. You know, some amazing companies that, that were developed, uh, by Chinese Australians in those early days.

They were pioneers up in the Palmer River goldfields. The Chinese suffered terrible persecution. They were put in front of the, uh, miners that were marching out to the Palmer River through Hellgate because, uh, the aboriginals who were cannibals at that time up there were eating the Chinese 'cause they ate rice.

They said they were sweeter to eat, and the colonials were putting the Chinese coolies in front of them because the, the aboriginals got everything they needed without it having to attack the whites. The, the, the history of this country is, is steeped in that kind of stuff that relates to immigration.

We're all immigrants here, Johnny. I remember clearly, clearly when you and I were at Cora Kai with Tony Nicoli and, and Roland Crystal and Dave Vans and all the others. Salvation Army, offering a half lukewarm sausage in a star piece of bread with a bit of lettuce and tomato to the workers and the people in the COI flood area, commandeering, everything they could lay their hands on.

And we kicked them out. Remember we kicked them out.

We

kicked the salvas out. Who replaced them? Do you remember? The Indian Sikhs? Remember the Orange Turban brigade that turned up from Byron Bay? Yep. With trailer loads of the most beautiful food. There were Muslims there working in the crowd. We were all working together.

Yep. You know, I live in a community, a very, very small community in rural New South Wales, and we've got a pharmacist who's a Muslim and the more, a nicer bloke you would never wish to meet. The most cooperative gentle man, you know, you know he's a Muslim because he closes his shop at lunchtime on Friday and doesn't open again until Sunday.

He's devoutly religious. His wife, a Muslim lady, is the town doctor. We'd be stuffed without 'em. And they're beautiful people, and they're respected by everybody in the town. They contribute. They're not radical fundamentalists. You know, I've got mates that I flew with who were Jews, just beautiful people who took their families to their synagogues and they celebrated they weren't radical Zionists.

Mm. You know, all this hatred that goes on and on and on and on, and people choosing sides. It's not our point to choose. It's not our place to choose sides. You know, Iran's being destroyed because of the Muslim clerics. Our heart should be bleeding. For those people in Iran who are striving to rid themselves to these people who would happily see half their population murdered to keep their jobs.

Not much different in Australia, I'll have to say. So the Iranian people are over there struggling for their freedom because of the radical clerics that run the country. Radical Zionists who run Israel, who, who think nothing of creating another Holocaust. You get even with people for one that was committed to them, who's caught in the middle, all the innocence.

How often do we keep saying this? All the innocence. The innocence on October seven, the innocence in Gaza sense, innocent blood being shed all over the flaming place by people who are claiming the moral high ground. Yeah, and I'm sick and tired of Christians who are saying, we've gotta stand with Israel, not geopolitical Israel.

We don't. I've said this a hundred times in Galatians 3 28, 29, let me read it to you. There is neither Jew nor Greek for you are all one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed. Heirs according to the promise. In other words, if you and I believe in Jesus Christ, John, we're spiritual, Israel, we're citizens of spiritual Israel.

Now you look at Israel. Israel itself, geopolitical Israel is one of the most, uh, secular countries on earth. Look at some of their shining stars apart from Netanyahu. I mean, let's, let's just look beyond that. But look at, uh, the, the, the brains behind the World Economic Forum. Sel, Hara, the man who says publicly that God's dead.

It's just taken us a little while longer to bury the body. The man who says we are all controllable, we're all part of the Internet of things. The man who says that some people are wasting resources and should be terminated, he's

a citizen of Israel. Mm. So do we stand up for his rights? And here's the thing, if you're a Bible believing Christian, you need to know this.

If you believe in Jesus Christ, then there's only one way to get to heaven. And that's through Jesus Christ. And I remember when we interviewed some prominent, uh, Jewish figures, uh, on club grubby. I remember Naomi Wolf, every time I mentioned Jesus, I was, I think I made a comment about, this is so terrible.

I mean, I can't wait for Jesus to come and put all this right. She could hardly contain herself. Her, her body language was, she was just not wanting to be part of that. And we interviewed, uh, professor Harvey Re who was sitting there with a, with a yamaka on his head. And when we prayed at the end of it, he bowed his head and he prayed with us.

So there were people with different viewpoints in Judaism. There were people with different viewpoints in Islam. My son-in-law and my daughter and my, my three grandkids are, are, um, of the Islamic faith. They don't run around plotting to kill Jews and everybody else. They're normal, beautiful people, and they're citizens.

My my son-in-law has done his citizenship. He's an Aussie now. From Egypt, and he's an Aussie. My father fought in Palestine during World War ii,

Ukraine. I mean, we look at what's going on in Ukraine, we've gotta put all this into perspective. Innocent blood, innocent people dying, thousands and thousands of soldiers every week. Innocent civilians being blown apart on both sides of the divide. And what's that all about? Back in the sixties, I was young enough to remember in horror, the Cuban Missile Crisis.

It was about to unleash itself because America wasn't happy that Russia was gonna have missiles on its borders. And now Ukraine wants to be a member of nato and nato. NATO are considering it. And yet Putin says, no way. I've gotta have a buffer. I don't want you having missiles on my border. It was all right for the Americans to have a standoff with Russia back then, but Russia can't have a standoff with Ukraine.

And Ukraine is one of the most corrupt governments on the planet. Mm. It has played. It has played host to some of the most corrupted foreign corporations in the world. Everything from child pornography to sex trafficking, drugs, you name it. It's all coming outta the Ukraine. It's a scourge. That's not the people's fault.

We forget that the Roman Catholics are responsible for 60 million deaths in their history, at least, that were people that were murdered. The Spanish Inquisition wasn't a very pretty thing to go through. They killed 60 million. There weren't some good Catholics. There weren't some good Russians under Trotsky, who I believe was a Jew.

Trotsky was a Jew. With Lennon. They killed 20 to 30 million Russians in the Bolshevik Revolution. There are good and bad Jews. Be the head of the uh, gun party in is in Israel. The founder of Israel virtually claimed himself, I think on a CNN interview, that he was the father of global terrorism because he was the one who blew up the King David Hotel in 1948 and killed 83 people.

He was the father of terrorism, a Jew. It was Jewish radicals who blew up cars, car bombs in Jerusalem. When j City councilors, Muslim city councilors, I think they were trying to vote in and something to do with Temple Mount, it was radical Jews who set car bombs into the, into these guys and blew them to pieces when they were going to work.

Back in those days, they didn't have the internet like we have now. They didn't have social media. The only way they could get attention was terrorism. The only way they could get the attention of the world media was to do something drastic. It was a means to an end. One thing led to another. So let me, let me just ask every one of you watching this, who can point the finger?

Who's to blame? Did Radical Islamists celebrate what happened on October seven? Disgustingly? Yes. Did radicalized IDF soldiers celebrate the massacres in Gaza? The video evidence says yes. We're in a battle between good and evil, and the sooner we realize that, the better and the sooner we stop pointing figures, fingers at each other and choosing sides, the better off we'll be too.

'cause right now in Australia, while all that's going on, all that political haji barges going on, about marches on the harbor bridge and burning the Australian flag, I, as far as I'm concerned, if you burn the Australian flag and you're not from this country, you should be sent back where you came from. If you don't love it, then go.

But to to, to outrageously insinuate that everyone who marched on that bridge that day was that way inclined is crazy. There are a lot of people who don't like seeing kids blown up. John. There are a lot of people in Canberra when we were there for that three weeks that were there because they didn't want to be mandated.

Mm.

They didn't want their borders closed. They didn't want their kids vaccinated against their will, but the agenda was hijacked by all the fringe elements just like it was on the Harbor Bridge.

And I think that's the, the, the key here, isn't it? I I mean, it's not, it's a mistake to compartmentalize this.

I mean, it's really just as simple as there are good and bad people. Uh, that's it. That's, that's a, that's it. There's good and bad in every single culture. Race and ethnic origin and every religion and marginalizing different groups is not the way forward.

Johnny the Sikh in, in wool Gul. Now, wool Gul is a beautiful coastal town just north of Coffs Harbor.

It's predominantly Sikh. Yep. Because the Indians, the Sikhs came out and they were the founding fathers of, of the banana industry. They knew bananas. Now, Johnny the Sikh, he's a wonderful bloke. He, he just about runs well, GGA, he's got an accent as broad Aussie as you and I have, and he wears this big orange turbine.

And every time you see him, you laugh and joke. He's a magnificent man. And here's the other thing that gets my grop. There's a lot of people saying, oh, have you noticed all the semi-trailers being driven by Indians? And how, how come all the seven elevens and all the service stations are owned by Indians?

Why? Because Aussies don't wanna do it. We don't wanna do it. You want, if you haven't got a job and you want to be a truck driver, get a license and go and do it. You'll get a job. I've been talking to business owners in the last week, John. We've been traveling around doing some things and I, and you know, I I, I've talked to them about, you know, what's it like?

I had a tie fitted the other day on a trailer up in the Gold Coast, and the bloke was working his guts out. He was the owner of the business. And I said, mate, it's a hard, you worked a ladder, a ladder of sweat. It's a hard business. Fitting tires is hard. I said, you know, you, how long have you been running this business?

He said, I've been going for 35 years. Wow. I said, man, you should be thinking about retirement. Shouldn't. He said, I can't. I can't get any staff. I can't get anyone to work for me now. We can't winge and moan about immigration from that context, uh, when we are not prepared to do the work. And to that end, we've gotta look at our trade unions.

Most of them aren't worth the paper. They've got their name written on. They're the backbone of the labor movement. And the labor movement is destroying this country.

Mm-hmm. Yep. Well, and people have gotta look at those. You, you know, you, you, you shouldn't look at it as though a, an Indian's driving down the road in a truck.

You, you should be looking at it as an Australian's driving down the road in a truck.

Yeah.

You know, they're, they're, they're citizens. Yeah. Uh, whether they wear a turban or they don't wear a turban, doesn't matter. They're Aussie citizens. If they're out having a go and they're respecting this country and they're doing the right thing and they're flying the Australian flag Yep.

In the front of their places, they are every bit as Australian as anyone else.

Absolutely they are. And even if they're not doing that at the moment, they're here because the jobs need to be filled. And Aussies a great, many of us are too lazy to do it. We're too lazy to do it. And, and, um. At the end of the day, I mean the real issue, John, is the fact that we are bringing in lots of people and we can't look after the ones we've already got.

We've got terrible cost of living. Yeah. We did our, we did our, uh, fortnightly food shop today and it, it's almost gone up by half as much again. And, um, and I, I dunno how people are affording to live. I dunno how people are affording their electricity bills now, Johnny, I've also been told by a mate of mine that if you wanna see Australian flags flying everywhere, you know where to go to all the camps around the country where people are sleeping in their cars, they're all flying Australian flags.

Yep. And I'll probably be using those Australian flags in another three months time to keep warm.

But what we've experienced as a nation and, and, and as a world, uh, over the past five plus years in relation to COVID and these mRNA vaccines and everything else that's come along with it, the control, the, the human factors.

Absolutely, absolutely. We, we truly are a mess. I'm, I'm actually grieving, I'm grieving.

Prime Minister. Uh, but we look back on the year that was, and some of the disgraceful bits of behavior. Susan Lee, the other day on Sunrise with Natalie Barr, Natalie Barr, what is a woman like that actually doing, interviewing anybody, uh, after her disgraceful behavior with David Ko during that Christmas, uh, COVID thing.

I mean, that was the most disgraceful piece of television I've ever seen in my life. Natalie Barr just has no credibility in my mind, but she's interviewing Susan Lay and she says, um, you know, um, is, you know, where, where do you stand with the nationals? She said, the door will always be open, but I'm not fa, I'm not looking at that door.

I'm looking to the Australian people. We want to get this right, Susan, for goodness sake, take the cotton wool out of your ears and listen to the people. You've got everything wrong. You've got everything wrong. You handed this country to a bunch of morons. Hmm. Because you're no different. Your policies aren't ha are hardly any different to the people who are running this country.

So our fingers should be pointed at the political class, John.

Your Everyday Australian who you plead to serve and not happy. And we know how that ends unless you start doing something about it. Mm-hmm. Time for a prayer. Johnny. Sounds good, Lord. Father in heaven, we need you. Lord. We've said some controversial things tonight. Some people will be hating on us for saying it.

Some people will say that we're too soft. Others will say that we dunno what we're talking about and we've committed hate speech. Lord, help us not to take ourselves too seriously. Help us to take the work we do seriously, but not ourselves. And help us to thicken our skins and see reality for what it is and realize that we're all God's children and we've all got decisions to make.

As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord, the peace and serenity that gives me and my house. Lord, I thank you for and I pray that every Australian will start looking to you for the answers.

Give them strength, courage, and integrity, and the humility to admit when they got it wrong. 'cause we need to heal. In Jesus' name we pray God bless Australia. Amen. Amen.
