

Club Grubbery - Raw transcript of interview:

2026-03-02 Graham and John speak with Dr David Cartland, and from Australia, Dr Mark Hobart.

Hi everyone, and welcome to another fantastic interview with, uh, club Grubby. Great to see you back on John.

Thanks Hoodie. Yeah, really looking forward to this one. Uh, we're, we're smashing them out, so, uh, great content,

right. So, uh, you know, we have with us today, uh, returning after, uh, just a couple of weeks and an interview that went gangbusters with, uh, Dr.

David Katlin from the uk. Welcome back on Dave.

Well, thanks for having me. I remember from last time we chatted, um, both of your jaws collectively dropping as the story came out. It was absolutely.

Absolutely. And, uh, sitting in the dark because he lives in Victoria, which is a very dark place to be these days, is Dr.

Mark Hobart. We still call him doctor, even though a lot of people in authority are trying to ban that, uh, ban his practice. Oh,

you're allowed to call me doctor. They, they, oh, they tried to stop it, but no, they can't take away, uh, the right for people or to call myself doctor. I can't call myself, uh, a medical practitioner or registered medical practitioner, but I can call myself a doctor or medical doctor.

Right? We're gonna get right into this now, ladies and gentlemen. Uh, last week you would've seen a link that I posted on an a b, C four corners documentary called scd. The documentary was about a butcher of a gynecologist in Melbourne at the Epworth Hospital, who, which is one of the most prestigious private hospitals in Victoria, who.

Literally butchered, I don't know how many hundreds of women over a long period of time, he removed healthy ovaries from women saying that they had diverticulitis. And when the pathology was done after the operation, there was no trace of diverticulitis. It would appear that he was doing this because the item number in me, in the Medicare system was one that paid the most amount, uh, the higher figure.

So those of you who would've seen that would've noticed, uh, a couple of things. Firstly, that that went on for years under the noses of people who thought and knew he was doing the wrong thing, but nothing was done. There were reports made over the years about his conduct and nothing was done. And the other thing that highlighted was that, uh, while nothing was being done about this particular practitioner.

It wasn't being handled by apa, the, uh, the health regulator in Australia because they were too busy censoring and banning doctors like David Katlin and Mark Hobart. They were too busy fluffing around defending the COVID narrative rather than doing what they were initiated and installed to do. And that is monitor safe practices of doctors who should be, uh, considering their oath first doing no harm.

Now, obviously this gynecologist was doing lots of harm and he knew he was doing it. The second thing that highlighted was that towards the last half of the interview, several gynecologists practicing in and around this particular patient and looking after the patients that he destroyed after the event, all admitted that it was very, very difficult to speak up in the medical profession because of a culture of nepotism, a culture of bullying, and a culture of a culture of professional elitism.

And an organization such as a PRA that senses doctors who speak out, and that's why they didn't speak out. And there were several gynecologists with decades of experience who said they, they couldn't risk speaking out, but they had finally spoken out. Now these two doctors here are victims of that organ, uh, uh, victims of the medical authorities that do these kinds of things to doctors all over the world.

It's been reprehensible what's happened, but APA needs to hang its head in shame and APA needs to be called to account. And so we're going to discuss all of these issues and the heartache that is what these doctors are going through again, because as we speak, Dr. Mark Hobart is days away from what will probably be the final hearing that decides whether he goes back to his practice or not.

A practice that is decades old that was started by his mother and father, doctors. Where he played dominoes and played Woody and set in the surgery when he was a kid. And when he did his medical, um, medical training and got his license to operate, he took over that particular practice and was faithful to the service of people in the western suburbs of Melbourne for many, many years.

And now all that's gone. What's gone? A professional doctor with, with empathy for his patients, an advocate for his patients, and a doctor who was serving a community, which is, uh, considered probably on the lower scale of social, of the social scale in, in Melbourne and Victoria. These are people who do it tough.

They're really battling Aussies and Dr. Mark Hobart was their hero and that was demonstrated when the authorities came into his, his, uh, surgery and shut it down and confiscated his records in one of the most gestapo like tactics. Johnny Lader, I think we've seen in medical history.

Yeah. There's not much you can say about it.

Hoodie. It was an absolute disgrace. Uh, I remember at the time when it, when, when it was on the news and they were raiding, uh, mark's, uh, surgery and, uh, poor old Craig Kelly, uh, uh, was screaming from the, uh, from the rooftop about it and, uh, right, right. Rightly so. Uh, APA is an absolute monster. They're an octopus, uh, that's got their tentacles everywhere.

And they, they, they not only need to be reigned in hoodie, they need to be disbanded. That's what needs to happen. They're a disgrace. Um, and uh, the sooner that happens, the better.

Absolutely. So we're, we're going to put these two doctors together because they have a lot in common. In fact, before we press record, uh, each was saying to the other, oh, you did it harder than I did, and so on.

But these guys have really done it tough. Uh, lesser men would not be here today. Uh, and you know what I'm talking about? A great many doctors have taken their own lives. Uh, because of a PA and other organizations around the world. Now APA has a habit of suspending people indefinitely without giving them any end date or anything.

And some doctors have been suspended for years without any kind of justice at all, just on the whim of some bureaucrats who probably responding to one letter of complaint, which is normally what happens. One letter of complaint means everything comes stumbling down. So we honor these gentlemen before we get into their story because they have their professional integrity to stand up and do the right thing in the midst of, of, of turmoil in the medical profession around the world at, at times when doctors who seem to be kneeling at the altar, a big pharma who seem to be kneeling at the altar of the Medicare systems around the world, more so than they would be looking after the, uh, and advocacy of their patients.

So we salute these gentlemen and, uh, mark Hobart, I'll go to you straight up for the first question. Um, where, where are you at now with all of this? How close are you to seeing some kind of solution or conclusion?

Well, I, I finally got my court case, uh, on the 14th of April. This is the court case where they, uh, charge, uh, try to prove their charge against me that I'm guilty of, uh, professional misconduct.

So after four and a half years, it's finally got to court. I've been to the Supreme Court and the Supreme Court of Appeal, uh, because of the delay, uh, in this court case. And, uh, so it's finally, it's coming. Uh, so it is the, the delay in the procedure, it, it has, uh, destroyed my practice and, uh, made it very financially difficult for me.

So, um, that, yeah, it's too long.

So Mark the, uh, mark the, the, the building that you occupied and your parents occupied in practice, is that still in your possession?

Yeah. Well, I have to sell it. I'm trying to sell it. Yeah.

So is, is there any chance that if you are restored to full practice, that you would, you would keep it and start your practice up again?

Because how long has there been a Dr. Hobart in Sunshine?

Uh, my parents started it in 1956. So, uh, I, I, I would certainly go back and practice, but, uh, because of financial reasons, um, I, I, I have to sell it and sell it reasonably soon. Um, unfortunately, uh, so

70, 70 years of Dr. Hobart's in Sunshine.

Yeah, that's right.

Far out. Johnny.

David, how's that? Uh, listening to that, I mean, your, your story, we went through that a fortnight ago and it was horrific. But, uh, you know, these people are in lockstep, uh, all over the world, aren't they? These, uh, governing.

It's really sinister John, and I think at the outset of the interview today, you mentioned about this, um, gynecologist running riot through patients, harming them.

We've got a collection of those in the UK too. Um, literally pages and pages of, one of the arguments we used in my case was proportionality. Why are you striking this doctor FY you were raising his ability to practice medicine for writing five letters and for calling out doctors with spreading misinformation.

Funnily enough, gynecologists saying it was a hundred percent safe in pregnancy to vaccinate when there's just no grounding for that statement. So yeah, we've got, we've got druggie doctors, we've got drunken doctors, we've got sex offender doctors practicing. We've got, um, we've got our very own gynecologist butchering women in Blackpool.

He's been let off without a slap on the wrist, nothing. And yet you've got this line of doctors, one after the other, like ducks lined up being shut down by the Gestapo, which is GMC, which is the equivalent of the a r. Um, just like I say, sinister, the lockstep. And I'm just feeling when you said four and a half years, well, I'm three and a half, four years into my sentence here as well of, uh, of being made the, uh, target of GMC.

And it just, it does mess with every, all aspects of your life. You mentioned the financial side mark. It does. Um, I spent the night last night just tossing and turning, thinking over the case for the 300, 380th night in a row. It just, it messes with your mind. It messes with your physical health, your mental health, your finances, you know, and, uh, I just want, I'm just a person who, you know, defends, medical ethics, patient safety, and I really, the, the thing that's really kept me going is justice.

Trying to keep justified for the justice in this, like where, where is the justice? When we got rapist doctors, this is a real case from last month, a rapist doctor was let off by the GMC 'cause it was a one off rape. One off rapes are okay, but writing five letters of exemption outside any international sanctions for travel in September 23 is a strike off offense, dishonest behavior, uh, and irremediable.

That's what they said to me. And I brought the professor into disrepute by writing five letters. And I, I read my response. That's what kept me up last night about the principles in which I wrote those letters. It was three, I think I mentioned 'em in the last interview, is do no harm. And I believe with my autonomous practitioner, hats on these don't work and they're harmful.

Yeah, so all loss and no gain. Secondly, you know, freedom to say no and bodily autonomy, the principle and valid refusal of consent with capacity. These are things, these are the tenets of ethics, let alone the discussion about informed consent. So here's the doctor struck off for maintaining the ethical principles of the profession.

Like I say, very unusual situation, but yeah, hearing Mark's story, you know, I was brought it all back 'cause followed your story from the start and yeah, one of the first targets of the, uh, of this lock step. Attack on doctors, good doctors.

I'll just jump in there quickly. Uh, this may help you, uh, with your case, I don't know.

But, uh, I was filling them according to the criteria on the, uh. Um, immunization register certificate for temporary, um, exemptions. And you could give a temporary exemptions for, for acute severe medical conditions. And most of my patients, uh, that I gave exemptions for, probably all of them really, uh, were suffering from severe anxiety and depression at, uh, at the prospect of the vaccination because, uh, if they had though, they'd done all, they'd done their research.

They often, they knew more about the side effects of the vaccine than I did, and they didn't want them. And, but if they didn't have them, they couldn't work and then they wouldn't be able to pay their mortgage and, and support their family. So, uh, when I asked them, had the opportunity to ask 'em, about 50% had, um, suicidal ideation.

So I, I think they fulfilled the criteria for acute severe medical condition. So I gave them a temporary exemption, uh, usually for three months, sometimes six months, but usually for three months. And, uh, that's what I gave up until they, uh, suspended me. I thought it was quite reasonable to do that if, um, I dunno if that makes any difference in your situation or not.

One of the unusual things, mark, in the UK and all round, um, our hearing of doctors that did fit freely complete these exemptions for various reasons. I mean, I was very clear with the GMC that I wasn't writing vaccine exemptions as they called them, or vaccine certificates. What they finally called it was falsifying medical notes, which just frankly is a complete distortion on what I did.

So there was a form in the uk, I dunno if it was universally used across the world, called the proc form. And the proc form was a form of self. Um, exemption. So you went through the reasons. There's about 12 or 15 qualifying reasons according to this organization pro. And what I would do with that letter is I'd let them fill it in as it was a self exemption, and then I would write as a perspective as a doctor.

I believe these ought to be valid reasons. Whatever you've ticked based on those three principles that I've just mentioned. So I wasn't even falsifying medical notes yet. If you read the reports, Dr. Carton struck off for harassment according to our doctors and falsifying medical notes, which I didn't do.

And it's funny because the GMC didn't even have a copy of the letter. So when we've asked them what international regulation did he flu, they keep going on about this point, you floated international regulation during a worldwide pandemic, and they're, they're quoting the date, September, 2023. Now, if you look, it's, it's not difficult.

All international regulations were lifted in May 23. That was the last one. USA to lift it.

Mm.

Um, all, all other countries were lifting them in 21, 22. So the, the relevance of me doing a letter of support for a patient in 23 September when there were no regulations. Mm. It's the complete distortion of what happened.

And I dunno how my barrister missed that, to be honest with you. I mean, I didn't turn up to the second half. It may That's unbelievable. Yeah, exactly. So it's not as if I even exempt

your exemptions in 2023.

Yeah. Yeah. This is what I'm saying. I got

you for that. That it's unbelievable. It's,

it, it, I mean, that's my last at all. Mark was literally, I've put, I've put the eight pages of the, uh, mh, not the M-M-P-T-S, it's called the Tribunal. So last night I put the eight pages up and you'll see that I'm harping on about these far right conspiracy theories, such as bodily autonomy and you know, the ethics of informed consent.

You know that that's in my rebuttal. And I said exactly what I did, and I called them letters of support. Yet they've twisted it around. And even with the harassment, you wouldn't believe what they did with the harassment cases. This was me simply having a debate with Dr. Which they kick out one side of the story Yeah.

And create a beautiful narrative. So it is a very. Job, to say the least, but the, I think I'm in your situation now that the lawfare system is, they spend all your money, all your funds, you know, so, you know, we just about raised enough money for a judicial review from

Yeah.

To get this in front of a judge rather than just the kangaroo court.

And it's 50,000 quid in the background. You get, um, lawfare happening on the other side. So I've been law fared into paying out that judicial review fund to some other person who I can't mention. But, so there, it's a multifaceted approach to kind of ruin all aspects of your life from your career, your reputation damage, um, your ability to practice medicine.

And as, as you may have heard, if you watch the interview last week, they've, they've taken away my ability to work because on top of that mark, they put me on a criminal list in the uk. So it's called a criminal records bureau check renamed DBS. And despite me not committing any crimes, because falsification of medical notes in the UK is imprisonable, harassment of individuals is a criminal offense.

So. I've got no conviction. I've got no criminal record. This was never put through the criminal system of beyond all reasonable doubt. They used a civil balance of probabilities, measured, did it on the balance, did he harass this person or not? Or did he falsify medical notes or not? So it's ironic that they haven't put this through the criminal system.

They would've done if they could believe me, they would've loved to have got bars in front of my face as well. Yeah. But then it's also led to me losing my hobby as a referee because being put on the criminal list has had a knock on effect to referee in football matches. So I'm banned from that as well.

My hobby. Well,

it, it is, it is terrible to, obviously they're, they're trying to crush you and the fact that, uh, the, the main reason is they're trying to crush you, you oppose their illegal, uh, political agenda.

Yeah. I think

Graham

Graham

said,

I think that's,

there's that prohibitive effect isn't there, of making people like myself targets and ruining our career.

So, you know, it's the most common rebuttal I get when ask doctors, why haven't you spoken out? So we seen what they've done to you, Dave. It's perfect. And it's, it's not like they haven't done that before. Over the years. They've made, you know, targets of people. So they don't, and we heard at the beginning about the, the, the gynecologists that wouldn't speak out through fear of God because, you know, they know what happens when you whistleblower.

Yeah, that's right.

Have you ever seen on the back of a, uh, packet of nuts, uh, a warning to say that if you're anaphylactic to, uh, peanuts, uh, that you can eat them at the, at the emergency department?

I've not seen that.

Does that make sense? I, I mean, 'cause that's what the, that's what the morons are doing, aren't they?

I mean, you're writing exemptions for people who have, in some cases had, had severe anaphylactic reactions to the first mRNA jab. Uh, I, I, I know of numerous people. Uh, and then they were told. To go to the emergency department in case it was severe the second time round, and you'd be okay. I mean, this is how mad these organizations are.

And, and mental health, I mean, you raise the mental health earlier. Now that is an absolutely valid reason to be fearful of having a vaccine for whatever reason. Uh, yeah, you could be depressed, you could be any number of things. And they're the first to hold up the banner of the mental health. Uh, when it suits them.

They want to tick that box all the time because they wanna appear to be, uh, as, as if they're really looking after everyone's mental health. But at the end of the day, they really don't give a stuff about it. Uh, and because you see this sort of stuff where you're corralled and, uh, you, you, you can't, there's no validity given to any mental health issue at all in relation to these things.

Uh, it's the, the idea that they wanna push their through their i, uh, agenda. And if some people die in the process, well, too bad. We, uh, those lives have to be lost, uh, otherwise, uh, for the greater good of, uh, our, uh, society. That's, um, what, what, uh, the, the philosophy was, which is back to front. Uh, uh, the end does not justify the means.

Mark. What is this? Not regulators.

There's a

delay,

I think, to keep talking over you.

No, that's okay. Uh, Dr. Mark Hobart, what does this cost you personally, as far as relationships are concerned?

Well, it's, uh, my family, uh, we're still, uh, a tight family. Uh, my family support me. It's been a strain, uh, financially, mainly, uh, it's put, uh, uh, uh, you know, put us under stress and, and you've gotta put your faith in.

Um, uh, uh, well, you gotta put your faith in things other than money to, uh, get you through. Uh, but we're, we're managing. I, uh, I. Uh, but it is a stress and I can understand how that, uh, people, uh, would, you know, collapse under, under this sort of pressure. It, it's, um, I shouldn't, I've had a couple of medical problems myself.

Uh, I had, uh, well, I may as well say I had a heart attack in May, 2023, and then I had a stroke in, uh, December, 2024. Uh, luckily I recovered from both pretty well. Uh, uh, and my cardiologist told me when I've had the follow up after the stroke, he said, and I was, I didn't, I didn't prompt him. And he, uh, he, he, he just said, you.

Heart attack was caused by stress, and your stroke was caused by stress. He just, he just came out and said it straight out. Um, and, and I thought it was because, uh, it was pretty stressful, uh, during those periods so I can understand, uh, suicides and that I could certainly understand that, that it's, it's, it's a horrible pressure to, to live under.

But, uh, um, touch wood, uh, I'll, I'll, I'll, I'll, um, uh, I'm, I'm, I'm older than David, which is good. So my children have grown up. Uh, but it's still difficult. So, um, I would imagine it would be much, much harder for David than for me. Uh, I, my heart goes out to, um, to David. And what's he, he's had to go through.

Yeah, it's quite ironic because we moved down from the Midlands in, in the UK down to Cornwall. I dunno if you know the geography of the UK that well, but it's that right down the bottom, bottom, bottom left, and uh, to enjoy a better life. And it was ironic. I was looking forward to a life of surfing on the local beaches, hotspots, and, you know, walking the coastal paths and beaches and, uh, and balance that up with a very part-time career.

Um, and it just went wrong so quickly. And I, I still to this day look back and think, where did it go wrong? Should I have done it differently? Um, I did try the right way. I tried the academic way in my practices and to speak to seniors and managers and try and do slide presentations, but that was definitely as social media happened.

But yeah, I mean the GMC in the UK's got a problem with, um, suicidality of doctors under investigation. I think there's been over 30 suicides completed. Suicides. Uh, I think that's in the last seven or eight years, but one in three in the latest. Um. Um, survey of doctors going through investigation. Were expressing some levels of suicidal ideation.

You know, I felt, I felt several times about striking out and I've had panic attacks and, you know, chest pains myself and you just, I'm only 40 grief fit and healthy, do my referee and, and, uh, it's just a stress on everyone. It's a stress of my poor wife who's stood by me, luckily through thick and thin.

I've got four kids, you know, spanning, you know, seven years of age to 17. Uh, got five dogs, you know, just a lovely time. My life.

That's

The

dogs will kicked you. Okay.

Well, I've seen my wife, I mean, I've seen my own appearance change over the five years with stress. What stressed us to a man's face. Yeah, yeah,

yeah, yeah, yeah.

How he lives his life. And, you know, the last few weeks I've been taken to my bed, my wife kicked me outta bed at three o'clock the other day. I just couldn't get out. I just couldn't get my point. You know, like I said, I took away my hobby. That's the thing that got me outta bed at the weekends. I took away my referee, and that's really hard.

The most that.

So Davis, has your, has your wife ever gotten to the stage where she just says to you enough, can we just forget about this for a week or a day, or.

Yeah, she wants me to get rid of, get rid of, because again, my platform now, and this is why they still keep going after me, is my platform on social media channels with sort of half a million followers.

That's dangerous to them. They don't want this loud, um, academic guy, you know, spitting out facts left, right, and center and published papers and government data sets that were ignored and concerning articles, et cetera. So yeah, she does, she wants me to get rid of social media. She wants me to just switch off from it and I, I'd love to be able to, but I've got this internal fight for justice now, so I've got a plan to take on the GMC, take the head of the snake, whatever that looks like.

The problem is in the UK we've got probably an international phenomenon event, ju judiciary, we haven't got judges that can be trusted. If you had judges that we, we could trust, I'd have sold my house and took them to the high court from day one.

Mm-hmm.

But you back at this tap, and particularly when our regulator, um, invests in big pharma.

They're supposed to be a neutral charity, but they've got investment portfolio in Merck and AstraZeneca from Lena. Mm-hmm. Conflict interest.

Yeah. Situations exactly the same here in Australia as you, David. And, uh, yes. You, you lose faith in the, uh, justice system and that sort of thing. I have to say that, yeah.

I, I, I think I'm the same as you. What keeps me going is fighting against them. Uh, that, that sort of gives me, uh, um, the urge to keep going rather than just, uh, you know, I think if I didn't, then I would, uh, could go spiral downwards, you know what I mean? So, uh, yeah, I think that's, uh, I feel the same way.

We, we've gotta fight.

John. John, you and I have had discussions for the last couple of years. You know, how, how much longer are we gonna do this and what's the point, and all that sort of stuff, but we just can't let it go, can we? I mean, every time we say we're gonna wind it back, what did we say earlier this year, at the beginning of the year, we're just gonna do one program a week.

One good, really good interview a week and then, uh. What we thought we'd do is get a whole lot in the can in storage, so we could space them out week after week. But the interviews have been so incredible, so earth shattering in their content that we can't afford to lock them away in a vault for, you know, several weeks.

So we're just pumping them out. We record, this'll go out straight after we finish recording it. Um, we can't give up. Can we, gentlemen? Can we, you know, how can we walk away from this? This is so blatantly evil. You, you

know? Yeah. You can't, if you walk past a standard, then you are accepting that standard and we cannot accept that standard.

Well, interestingly enough, would he, uh, uh, look at today, I mean, John Ruddick in the upper house of New South Wales Parliament, uh, questioning Dr. Kerry Chant, uh, and, and, uh, her performance in there was, uh, was, was. Horrible. Absolutely horrible. And at the end, he asked her whether she had any regrets about COVID and the management of, uh, and, and she basically said the only regret she had that was, uh, that, uh, the communication.

I, I mean, these people are in another planet. Uh, you know, when you look at what's come outta New Zealand, uh, in the last couple of weeks with this FOI document to the coroner, uh, and I can read, read a bit of this. I mean, this is. This is a document, uh, and, and this is why we have to keep going because this stuff just keeps, keeps surfacing, uh, and it'll continue to surface like the Epstein files, just every, every day there's a new chapter.

Uh, so this was in, uh, 21, uh, and this was written by the Ministry of Health to the coroner, uh, in New Zealand. As of this date, New Zealand has 12 confirmed cases of COVID-19 and no deaths. According to the director of public health, COVID-19 does not or repeat that, does not have a particularly high mortality rate and is not particularly transmissible.

Now, why were we at war over this? Hmm.

It lists up. I mean, you look at Wuhan when it all happened, allegedly, you know, and the flights were open, we were seeing Heathrow packs in London. You know, there were no particular measures. And it was quite ironic the day they locked us down for our first draconian run, it was one, a one-off lockdown to flat on the curve in the NHS.

And bear in mind, I was working in the empty hospitals at the time, so there was no curve too flatter as far as I was concerned.

Mm-hmm.

Uh, and so they, they locked us down on the day. They downgraded the disease from high consequence to low consequence infectious disease. Try and make sense of that.

Meanwhile, things like the New Zealand document from last week saying, we're not that bothered about this. It's a circulating cold and flu thing. You know, just get your M sip out and your vitamin C and D jobs are gonna, but no, you couldn't say that. You can get struck off for saying Vitamin C is good for COVID.

That's my colleague Sarah, my friend found out. Well, she hasn't been struck off, but she had a fight on her hands. Vitamin C.

Yeah.

Well, you know, where, where do we, where do we go from here? Like, David, you, you've still got another couple of, uh, uh, arrows in your quiver, haven't you?

Uh, no. I mean, I look at my, I mean, they've literally taken everything out.

I know they put me on this criminal list. That's the big, you know, I can't even retrain in anything else. When you're a doctor, you kind of make a decision early on in your life, um, to, to do it. So every decision you make is geared to being a doctor, so you kind of typecast. It's like the actor, isn't it?

That has always done horror movies and tries to do comedy. Just doesn't work. Same thing here. All I know how to do as a doctor, that everything was in the library study in medical textbooks to pass exams, to pass our, to get

to where I am now. What was, and I was a damn good doctor. You know, I had, the funny thing is the GMC kept repeating how there were no patient complaints.

There was no clinical negligence that my patients and staff loved me. They were given 340 character references that they didn't read. 'cause they said they weren't relevant apparently. I mean, they were making all sorts of wild decisions. But I think the, the real arrow in my. Well, the lack of arrows in my quiver really now is that they've put me on this criminal list, which is unjustifiable.

So it really takes out Can't you appeal that? Surely you can appeal that. Yeah. I mean, this is part of it, Graham, they, they, they, it's the abuse, it's the process is the punishment. So I could easily win the judicial review when, when the decision first came in for the gym. So you get one month. So you can imagine, I mean, I took to my bed for a month and just was sick, licking my wounds, got really depressed.

You are not in the mood for a fight. We just spent six weeks, you know, bearing in mind they pushed me to a near suicide attempt. I think I shared that with you last time. Yeah. And, and we reconvened and they let trolls into watch it. For example, they were told by their own psychiatrist to make it private, yet they opted to make it public Every decision, including getting rid of all of my witnesses ability to speak.

Not have you ever heard that in your life, um, a defendant not being able to use any of his witnesses in a tribunal, it's just utter kangaroo court, but, but being put on the dbs? Yeah, I mean, I can appeal it. It's another, I mean, GGMC was 20,000 pounds plus VT to appeal and if you lose, you pay GMC cost, which was six grand a day per barrister.

Two barristers, uh, plus my own legal costs. Then if you wanna do a JR it's 50 grand plus. That's just a start. Um, and you've just spent six weeks fighting the GMC. And then, you know, the appeal at the high court for the DBS is thousands of pounds in legal costs. And finally, the fa the football Association, that's another legal case Again, going to the high court, this will take months and months to sort out for, for, and it's all followed through from that original GMC decision to strike me off for harassment that's not been tested in a court or a criminal charge.

And falsify medical notes, which I didn't do. Like I say, their reason for putting me on the children's list was that I was willing to fly out international policy. So if I was to work with children in the future, I may take it upon myself to allow my own ideas and opinions to overall child safeguarding policy.

And so, hence we think it's proportionate to put you on the child's. Ban list to never work with children ever again. Bear in mind, the children were never mentioned in any of the GMC. There was no child involved, so it's quite a leap, isn't it? To extrapolate what the GMC found me guilty of Unemployment tribunal.

Bear in mind, this is not a court of law. This is like a quasi judicial. Now, these guys haven't got any regulators. They're admitting evidence that shouldn't be admitted in a court of law. They admitted that. They said, look, we know entrapment. The way they found out about me doing exemptions is they booked an actor in.

That's how Snidey they were. They booked an actor in and all they got, the actor only got a on offer of a consultation and a free letter of support. Um, and you know, and we said, look, you can't allow this in in the UK courts. You're not allowed to allow entrapment and said, we are the GMC. We can allow whatever we want.

They even said at one point, the European Court of Human Rights Act does not apply to GMC tribunals. This is what we're dealing with. It's absolutely, I mean, if you look, I, I, I actually ask any of you to read the MPTS. Google it. Google it. David Cartland, NPTS, and see how one-sided and twisted. Um, and it's just complete false, but they've run with it.

The papers run with it, you know, the papers don't care. It's, it's been documented. Dr. Katon was struck off by the GMC, so there's no smoke without fire. This is what people keep telling me. And then you read all these articles about it. They call me an internet pest, one paper, an internet pest, and all I've done is called out

obstetricians saying that the vaccines a hundred percent say in pregnancy pre-roll out, when there was no data to that effect.

She's still working.

Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Yeah. I, I've got no qui Graham to answer your original part. I don't think I've got any quivers left. If you've got any to lend me, that'd be good.

Yeah, it don't stand the, the pan shillings and paints, doesn't it?

It does come down to money. Yeah. And like I say, I'm, I've done a crowdfund again, it's getting up to a, a point where I can now probably put in a, a judicial review for the high court, for the DBS because that's the easiest win.

'cause that list is only for criminals and it's only for people who've demonstrably harmed vulnerable adults or children. I've done neither. So that's an easy win. But again, it's that time. It takes the stress, the legal counsel required just to, you know, put in a slam dunk case to get rid of it. They've got no justification.

It's an employment tribunal. It's not as if you know the GMC actually, what they should have done, if I was found, you know, suspect of harassment of doctors, they should have waited for the criminal system to catch up with me, get me arrested, get me charged, suspend me in the interim, and then take it back to tribunal.

Once I'm charged by a, you know, a group of peers in a jury or a judge or. In investigators from the police, but that wasn't done in my case. That's what happens with sex criminals. Doctors that are sex offenders. They get suspended, suspended, suspended while all the court stuff happens, and then they get struck off.

Mostly suspended, actually. They don't get struck off for sex offenses in the uk. That's the, that's the idea. That's same here.

Yeah.

Yeah. Just the one off rape and all that.

Mm.

Mental,

yeah. Yeah. Oh,

well, if it's good for Andrew Winsor, Mount Batten. It's good for the medical profession, isn't it? So, uh, we, we, um, we need to, uh, we need you both to put your crowdfunding links on Mark.

We've got one for you. Have we got one for you, Dave?

Because we do have a lot of, I'll dig out. I'll dig it up. Yeah. Like I say, it got up to a decent amount ready for the JR. And then it's, it was kind of like taken away by a, another legal, um, battle that I had in the background, so,

okay. Well, we,

there's one way of enough of they try and get the money off you, don't they?

We have a lot of viewers around the world and a lot from the UK who, uh, who would happily support you. And of course, of course, mark. Um, you've pulled a lot of heartstrings over the last few years, mate. A lot of people

are out there really rooting for you and wanting to support you. And so, uh, we urge everybody involved listening to this, sharing it.

Please share it and make sure that, um, if there's anyone with a little spare cash that they can help these doctors. Because when they have a win, we all have a win. That's the truth of it, isn't it?

It is, it is. Because we can put up a good fight and it'll get, uh, it is at a public court and there'll be some, it'll get this message that'll get out there.

Even if we lose the case, if we can fight a, a case that is solid, then it'll, it'll show that they're unfair. Yeah. Which,

yeah, I, I agree with that. When, when we were planning my legal battle for the DBS, the criminal listing, you know, we sat down, we said, actually this would be a really good thing if they put you on the list.

'cause it's so outrageously audaciously, dystopian and ridiculous that actually we get public eyes on this. We get media involved. And that's the thing when you've got, we've got a lot of people now who are sort of citizen journalists getting them, getting their eyes, getting their podcasts on it, and they can't hide.

So, you know, if you are the judge there, stood there however much your back pocket's stuffed by, um, illegitimately sourced dollars from big pharma, you've gotta actually make that judgment that we're gonna keep they can. On a criminalist, having committed no crime, how do you justify that? And then obviously outta the, how do they uphold that at the football association?

Sorry,

I was gonna say like Alexander Sol Nitin, uh, you know, they could have just not paid any attention to, and kept him quiet and not know the world wouldn't have learned about Alexander Sol Nitin, but because he had to fight and, uh, the, the word got out and, uh, he became an international figure and that helped overthrow the, uh, Soviet, uh, government.

So yeah, this publicity, even if we don't lose, it's, uh, it shows the corruption of the system, which maybe is, uh, more important than we realize.

Mm-hmm. David, just in terms of, uh, being, being on that list, ha, has there been any follow up of, uh, bureaucrats in terms of your own family? Have you had a knock on the door?

I mean, because obviously you would think that if you're on, on a, a list and you're, you're a potential predator, uh, that they would be concerned about your own kids.

Yeah, I mean that's, that's the next thing we're waiting for. Really. We know automatically when you put on the DBS list, you are, uh, your, it flags up a children's services referral locally.

So the ne the next point, I'm gonna get a knock on the door for somebody. I'd love to know what they're gonna say. And so we are here to see what sort of parent you are. 'cause you wrote letters of support for people to travel during a non sanctioned period of time. Um, and we just need to know if you're feeding your kids okay in dressing the voke, it's ridiculous.

But you know, in, in all of this, the GMC strike you off. There's no follow up. You know, that's something that should be there for people who are struck off because it is sold destroying. Secondly, DBS put me on a list and it was an exchange of letters. We put in a great rebuttal. You know, they ignored it.

I've got loads of safeguarding people saying, this is absolutely weaponization of the system. He's not committed any crime. There's no harm. Why are you doing it? They ignored it anyway. No phone calls, no humans, nothing.

No meetings, no hearing. And then finally, the fact they've banned me from what aspects of football without talking to me.

There's not phone calls, there's not a hearing. Every, even murderers are given the right to a hearing, aren't they? Murderers, but they banned me from all of these things without even listening to anything I've said.

Well, I think to put it into context, but the real problem here is, is the actual, the way they process, uh, you, you, you're guilty.

And until you can prove yourself innocent, uh, there is no presumption of innocence. And they drag it out because they know that you're financially strapped. And you've gotta go through all these, uh, kangaroo courts before you can get anywhere, uh, that, that's supposedly reputable to fix up the problem.

Now, the, the, the issue, uh, with that is the finances. Uh, ultimately, uh, there, there is no question about that. But look what happened here in, uh, Australia, uh, that they've introduced hate laws, uh, in Australia, that they're only passed and retrospectively passed recently. And the gentleman got up on stage on Australia Day, which was, uh, January 26th.

So we're talking less than, uh, two months ago. Uh, took the, uh, microphone for 40 seconds and made some comments. Uh, and he was charged and he is already in jail. He's got a, uh, a, a, uh, 12 month, uh, custodial sentence with a non-par parole period of, of nine months. Now they can deal with that in the space of eight weeks.

But you and, uh, mark, uh, being struck off and many others around the world, uh, in this same, uh, situation, just just four or five, six years, it just keeps going on and on and on because they, they, uh, they, they're, they're destructive. They're, uh, they're, they're callous. And, uh, it is Gestapo. Like, I, I don't care what anyone says, this is what it's like.

It's, it, it is, uh, it's beyond belief.

There is no justice in the legal system. That's

nothing to do with justice mean, we've got now, I mean, we had somebody arrested for thinking a prayer outside an abortion clinic. We've had various people with flags, you know, whatever their political position is, freedom of speech, unless it's criminal, you know, and, and people are being pinned down to the ground, you know, so we are definitely catching Australia and Canada up in the, uh, Orwellian states.

I mean, it's, and I mean, I've been to the police myself. I've got a full on committed team of stalkers related to a lot of this reporting that's gone into the FA and to the GMC, et cetera. The 256 complex, mainly from trolls, some of them are quite physically stalking me, physically stalking me into football matches and around town.

They're following me saying that they've watched me do the school run and you report 'em to the police, nothing, no action. In fact, they actively NFA not for action any of these things yet they came around my house only three weeks ago in front of my children and my dogs, and came to issue me a polite invite for an interview under caution for harassing.

Probably one of my worst harassers. And based in Thailand. The guy who's posted about me over 800 times came around my house about five tweets where I've just named and shamed the guy saying, this is Mr. X. Putting a picture up of him saying, does your wife know that you tweet about another math relentlessly 800 times?

Please stop. Yeah, you creepy or something. They show me this, please. So did you write this? Well, you, you know, this is causing alarm and distress. I said, hold it right there. Let me read this out and I won't say it 'cause I'm not sure when this goes out. But there were two or three death threats in what he'd said about me, quite grotesque, death threats about what he would do to me with a baseball bat, you know?

And they've come around my house and they're soon to come and get me, but they're not soon to protect me and my family. My, they've been putting pictures of my wife, they've been putting pictures of my dogs up. They've been, you know, opening porn websites. We've now been getting emails saying all the things they're gonna do to my wife when I'm in prison.

It's absolutely horrific what they've done. It's not just the GMC and the fa and the DBS, it's, and I don't know who these people are when I say they. I'd like to tell you who they are, but they're pretty committed. They're pretty unwell, psychiatrically, I would say. But they've got keyboards and they've got phones, and they're allowed to freely hide behind anonymity.

'cause police can't even find out who these people are. Uh, literally. It's worse. It's worse than you could imagine. It's not just all the stuff I've in public about.

It's very, very suspicious behavior. I, I wonder if, uh, I mean, you can't answer this question, but, you know, the thought that comes to my mind other being paid to do this, is this, is this a, uh, uh, an agenda that's, uh, financed by, you know, by people, uh, that, uh, you know.

Have a vest.

Interesting. Several them of them actually have got links to the police. Several have got them openly. They openly boast their free masons. They're police, they're ex politicians, their ex doctors and nurses, so they let little bits out about their identities.

Right.

You know, most, most of them are just, uh, but they, they have this anonymity that they hide behind.

Seem seemingly. Yeah.

Yeah. You

know, but I, I've always owned my name. I've always done all my social media as Dr. David Carland because I've got these views and I'm free to express them. That's, that's the European Court human rights. Well, there's one, there's one identification for them that cannot be disputed by anybody.

And that is, they're evil. That's what they are. They're evil.

Mm-hmm.

And, uh, you know, who knows who's putting them up to it. Uh, we got the, we got the same amount of stuff as well. It's just, uh, it's evil. And, um, uh, that's, that's the game we are fighting at the moment.

Well, the la latest thing at the moment, Graham is apparently on a pedophile that they're, they're creating images of me with Jimmy Savile and other famous pedophiles and St.

Carlin's on the Epstein list. I've been, I've been, I've been made into Adolf Hitler. I've been made into mass murderers in the uk. Um, my face next to the other per just, I mean, honestly, and you take it to the police and you know, I know if I made an unsavory Unworked tweet tonight, even if I made my account Joe blogs, they'd find me and they'd have me under caution by the end of the day.

But it's very two tier policing. We've seen that across the world now, aren't we? We there, I mean, we've had one, one case of a guy who was, um, put in prison for a tweet. Um, quite, quite a nasty tweet, but it was a tweet

and it was removed, um, after an hour. Took the dog for a walk, got two years in prison. The same judge has when put a suspended sentence on, um, child pornography.

On the same day suspended sentence. So it's the same judge giving out tweet, you know, custodial sentences and suspended sentences for child pornography. Try and make that make sense. But as you mentioned, it's evil. It comes down to that. It comes down to evil.

It does. I think that's a good segue into closing this one off with a prayer.

Let's do it, shall we, Lord, father in heaven, we just thank you that we're able to communicate around the world. Lord, we have, uh, Dave Carland in the UK and we have Mark Hobart in Melbourne and, and Johnny and I, and there will be people all over the world watching this particular broadcast. And we thank you, father, that there are people taking an act, active interest, who have a wholesome approach to this.

Lord, surround these doctors with your angels. Father God, they need all the support and love they can get. Fill 'em with your Holy Spirit, God, and lead their legal processes, and of course, God and lead their families. Keep them safe as well. Father God protect them. Have them know that they're standing in integrity.

And that's all that you ask for. All of us to do is to stand in the light of truth. So Father, give us that light of truth and that we may bathe in it and be set free. We ask in Jesus' name. Amen.

Amen.

Um, so David, if you would, uh, send Suzanne your link to your funding, uh, we'll get, we'll get that put in, uh, mark, we're gonna do the same for you.

And, um, we thank you both for coming on the program tonight and, uh, we wish you all the best. Please keep us in the loop. We want to have you back on again. And, uh, we thank you for coming on and Johnny and I will be straight back after the break.

Thank you very much. Thank you.

Thanks for having us. Next time you see me, I'll have a stethoscope around my neck.

Hopefully

I remember that. God bless you. Bless you guys. See you. Bye. God

bless you all. Take care.

Well welcome back everybody. Back to Club grubby. John, that was, um, it's gut wrenching, isn't it, to see too incredibly. Genuine and, uh, professional medicos being treated like that. It's just incredible, isn't it?

Oh, look, hoodie, I find it very difficult to believe that, that a medical overarching board, uh, in charge wouldn't matter if it's nursing, doctors, paramedics, anything, uh, you know, in all these different states can be wielding the same stick. Uh, they've got no compassion. I mean, you, you've just gotta hear the stories of those two gentlemen.

Uh, the financial hardship alone, uh, should be enough. Uh, and, and really at the end of the day, by any standard, the, the, even if, even if you were to, to agree with, with the, uh, authority stance, I mean, it's, it's at the absolute minor end of any scale of, uh. Wrong. Do, uh,

you know, we know it's not, but I mean, instead of raping, uh, beyond belief,

well, it just doesn't pass the pub test in England or here does it? It just doesn't pass the pub test. And that's ultimately, that's, that's the name of the game. Is it fair and reasonable? Is it lawful and reasonable? It's neither.

It's none of those things. Uh, John And, uh, we, uh, we see our friend John Ruddick, uh, libertarian, uh, politician in New South Wales had Kerry chant, um, in, uh, in a committee hearing. Uh, tell us about that. Dr. Kerry Chan, of course, being the medical officer of, uh, new South Wales.

Yeah. Well, and, and what, uh, what really, uh.

Was that, uh, Dr. Dominic wants to see what, uh, what he had to say, uh, from, from John's, uh, from John's social media post. But Kerry chant ham, uh, people will be absolutely, uh, incensed at what she had to say. Hoodie, I mean, John, uh, ruddick press her about, uh, uh, the, the vaccines and the fact that, uh, that they came from nowhere.

Uh, he asked her about how long it takes to usually get a, a, a vaccine to, to market. Uh, and, uh, he said, well, you, you know how, how, how do you get these things and say that they're, they're okay after such a short time period. And she said, oh, well, you know, the, they, they, they were being looked at in other countries.

Before we took them on, essentially. Um, but you know what got me was a closing comment hoodie. Um, and, and I'll see if I can, I can drag it up here and, uh, let everyone listen. But I mean, what, what she essentially says, uh, is the only regret that she's got. Now, I, I might be, uh, uh, misinterpreting this, but I be, I I think she's basically saying the only regret she's got is the communication.

And she talks about the, the letting people make their own decisions. Um, uh, individuals.

Yeah,

individuals. Um, yeah, it's just not coming up there at the moment, but, uh, um, I'll, I'll, I'll try to get it up. When we can, uh, and I'll, I'll apply it, but, uh, it's only just happened obviously. So we're, we're, we're, we're, we're, uh, well here we go.

When

I just listen to this

bettering communicating those risks and benefits, um, but in terms of the guiding policy, it was always around what was in the best interest of individual individuals. But I acknowledge that we can do better at communicating risks and benefits that, um, for individuals to make those decisions.

Dr. Kerry Tar, the two

for individuals to make those decisions. Well, I, I mean, when, when did she just suddenly decide that individuals could make decisions? Uh, Hui because, uh, I was pretty sure that, uh, we're all mandated. I mean, here we are. We we're still, uh, we're, we're, we're, we're in the early part of 2026.

And the new Wales police are, are still, and many other bodies are still stopping people from going back to work, uh, on the advice of Dr. Kerry Chan. I mean

Yeah.

Oh, infuriates me. I, I,

it, it, you couldn't make this stuff up, as

she said you couldn't make it up. And she's got this little cardboard thing in front of her saying Ao AO PSM, uh, public service medal.

I mean, these people are no more entitled to a medal for anything. I mean, it's, it just, it makes my blood boil.

Yeah. Unbelievable. Well, of course, most people are now, uh, struggling with, uh, a lot of anxiety and stress, Johnny, because, um, you know, the cost of living has gone through the roof in this country already.

And now we have a war in the Middle East. Apart from the human, uh, tragedy of, of the potential of, of that conflict in the Middle East and how far it will spread, uh, we're gonna see oil prices go through the. Cost of living is gonna get exponentially worse. Yep. And, uh, we're all gonna feel a pinch. Um, and, and you know, there's a couple of things about all of this that strike me as a little odd.

Firstly, how a small country like Israel can command the, the militaries of the world. And in fact, and, and the biggest superpower in the world, how a small country like Israel can get the biggest warship, \$13.5 billion worth of aircraft carrier anchored off its coastline. Um, you know, and there's so much going on here, like we've got the Iranian people who are celebrating at the moment, and I'm fearful for those people, John, because the way these things pan out in history, the Americans charge in with the Brits and the allies they charge in, they, they, uh, obliterate a place.

They obliterate the, uh, the, uh, government. Turn it into chaos. And then when they've done their bit, they wipe their hands. They encourage everybody to go to revolution, then they leave. And how many times in history have we seen it, John, where the countries have ended up worse off? I mean, when are we ever gonna learn?

It's just, it's mind boggling. This stuff, it really is mind boggling. Um, and all I can say is that, uh, as I said, for a small country to have that effect, they must have something on somebody. I, I, uh, I, I just think, I just think there's a lot more to this than meets the eye. Um, and that's being discussed at great length.

In fact, John, John, once

again, we

go on.

No, I was just gonna say, well, once again, all these, uh, the sad part is, and this is, this is where it all comes down to it. I mean, it's all those people in the middle and they're the ones that suffer, um, whether they be Iranians or troops or, uh, people from, um. You know, look, look at all these people who are stranded in airports.

Uh, now, you know, uh, uh, I mean, could you think of anything worse? Uh, you know, the fear of these people, uh, not knowing what's going on. Um, I mean, we, we, we, uh, we, we experienced a bit of that the other day when we interviewed the, uh, senior former senior constable from Canada was stuck in, uh, Mexico. Uh, yeah.

As all that was unfolding. Uh, so these things are very, uh, you know, they, they seem to just, uh, happen so quickly, don't they? And you're caught off guard, though. I mean, very difficult to, uh, and, and people must be very nervous about traveling. What are you? I, I, I mean, uh, what do you do?

Well, you know, I've got a couple of,

I mean, you would've thought going to,

yeah.

I think we've got a bit of, I think, I think your internet's playing up a bit, John. We're getting a little bit of, uh, interference. Um, yeah, I've got a couple of international trips planned. We're gonna New Zealand very shortly

for a bit of a, uh, speaking thing over there. And, uh, and then of course the US a in May for another event over in Florida, uh, which I've got serious doubts we'll get to, to be honest with you the way things are.

But what we're hearing too also is that if you've got travel insurance and you are, uh, you're outta pocket, you know, so we're, we're urging people. Do not cancel your bookings or your flights. Leave it in the airline's hands to, to either refund you or give you accommodation or whatever. But once you cancel your booking, you cancel your contract with them and you won't be covered by travel insurance.

So be very careful about that. The other interesting thing I, I noted Johnny, there's a couple of interesting points outta this. Uh, the, the first one is that it's, uh, rather interesting that the USA secured massive all reserves from Venezuela just before the Middle East conflict. I find that very interesting.

I find that they went in and apparently Venezuela has got the capacity to produce so much oil. It does. Already. They've gone in there, they've isolated the Venezuela oil from China. Now, China's gotta be wondering where they're gonna get their oil from because, uh, you know, they, they draw a lot from Venezuela.

Well, that's now been cut off. Uh, they used to draw, they draw a lot from the Middle East. That's gonna be cut off if the Straits of Hormo close, which they probably will. And, but, uh, America first they secured their oil supplies, so, um, don't worry, boys. We're all right. Uh, you guys and Australia has, according to reports today, about 25 days of fuel supply.

And then we are cactus. Uh, we're cactus. So, uh,

well, I doubt whether it'll be 25 days now, Woody, because I think it'll be like toilet paper. Uh, I, I think there'll be queues up at service stations. W Watch, watch this space. Uh, that'll be the next thing here. Uh, there'll be gear. For miles.

Yeah, absolutely they will.

And the other interesting point, John, and I'll take you back to, uh, 2022, maybe you and I, uh, in watching various television programs around the country in mainstream media being discussed at David Caution, Natalie Barr, but slightly amused at Carl Stefano on the Today Show, who seemed to, uh, seemed to want to say something but didn't quite say it.

And you, you remember he said, well, you know, he said to Nick Cosworth, well, I'm done. I'm not having any more, you know, I'm done. And I noticed him glance across at his producer, like his producer's probably going like this to him. Um, and you and I could see that he was uncomfortable. And we started a campaign.

Do you remember that? Come on, Carl.

Come on, Carl.

Come on, Carl. Spit it out. Carl. Well, I am absolutely delighted to see that he is, um, that he's finally bitten the bullet and he's coming out, uh, in Tucker Carlson esque, uh, performances. He's, uh, he's interviewing relevant people involved in the political arena, but not only that, he had a panel of a couple of guys on, uh, I think Choco and, um, uh, another guy has got a podcast when two worlds collide.

I forget his name, Sam, I think. But, um, they were discussing Epstein files. They were discussing, uh, you know, all, all the so-called conspiracy theories. And Carl has just been really natural. Um, and I think this is a really good sign for where we can go with all this stuff. So, Carl, the invitation is there, mate, seeing that you're spreading yourself around.

Come on to club grubby, or if you want us to come onto, uh, to the Carl, um. Stefan OIC show will be there. Make no mistake. We'll be there. And, uh, let's have some really good down to earth conversations about what's been going on in this country. And let's wake a few more people up. Carl, come on. Carl.

Come on Carl.

Come on Carl. So great stuff. No, congratulations. Carl Stefano, a lot of people are going crook. Ah, where were you? No. Yeah. Okay. Alright. But, um, you know, I think, uh,
