

# 2029-04-30 - Club Grubbery - Elaine Mullaly

**Graham Hood:** [00:00:00] Well, good day everyone. Good day, John, and welcome back to another great episode of Club Grubby International. Johnny, how are you?

**John Larter:** Good mate. Couldn't be better. And, uh, yes, international Irish. This, uh, tonight. Here we go. Yeah.

**Graham Hood:** It's the luck of the Irish and uh, we've really been interested to hear what's going on in Ireland because there's been some serious butt kicking going on over there.

**John Larter:** Mm-hmm.

**Graham Hood:** And there's a lot of, a lot of news in some circles, but we're amazed in Australia how little we hear of what, what's actually happening with the protests. Why are we surprised? So we are really grateful to have Elaine Mullaly with us, uh, from Ireland joining us. What part of Ireland are you from?

**Graham Hood:** Elaine?

**Elaine Mullaly:** I'm from, uh, [00:01:00] county le, a little town called Port Arlington. I believe there's a Port Arlington in Australia too.

**Graham Hood:** There is in Victoria. Um,

**Elaine Mullaly:** and uh, so I live in Port Arlington County, le, it's about an hour from Dublin. It's right in the Midlands. So we're in the heart of Ireland basically.

**Graham Hood:** Alright, so you, you come highly recommended by, uh, several people that we've interviewed internationally, especially from Canada, uh, in Sherry St.

**Graham Hood:** Louis, who, uh, who's been a great, uh, supporter of our program and provided us with a lot of guests from, uh, Canada and elsewhere in the world and Britain. And we've had Andrew Bridget on, which has been great

as well, thanks to Shari. Um, as we said in the intro, we're hearing a lot of stuff about what's going on in Ireland when we dig deep.

**Graham Hood:** But we believe there's some major things going on over there. So before we get into you giving us an on the ground view of what's happening in Ireland, give us a bit of a broad brush of you and your life, how you found yourself in this position. What were you doing before you became an activist? Because you're obviously very active.[00:02:00]

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, yeah, so I, I have a business in my hometown for the last 18 years. Um, and I have two daughters. They're 21 and 22. And about five years ago, I woke up one morning and looked out into our back garden and I said to my husband, do you think we'll fit two log cabins out in the back garden? And he was like, why would you want to put two log cabins in our back garden?

**Elaine Mullaly:** And I said, where are our girls gonna live? And, and that was the first point where I realized, my God, we are actually in a situation in this country where, you know, predominantly people, we don't mind paying high taxes. Um, we don't mind working really, really hard because there's a prospect. Everybody ends up with a roof over, they own their own house.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So you end up with a roof over your head at some stage in your life, so you don't mind being crippled with all these taxes. But I just realized that morning that Ardent is going in a very, very, very. Very dangerous direction in relation to the future and what's going to be here for our children. [00:03:00] And that kind of gave me the kick in the butt that I needed to get going because up to that point, I was obviously raising my children and running a business, and I was very oblivious to the fact that the Irish government seemed to care less and less and less about the Irish people.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So as a result of that, um, I'll make a long story quite short, I founded a political party. Um, it's called Independent Ireland. Um, there was an election coming up, so we ran 58 candidates in our local elections. We got 23 of them elected. We ran three for, uh, the Europeans. We got one elected. Um, and we have, we had three sitting tds who came on board and joined the party.

**Elaine Mullaly:** They would be like our meps, you know, abroad. MPS abroad. Um, and after about a year of running that party, uh, I was the chairperson of it, I realized that the party. Needed to be very firm in a direction, and that is center right. [00:04:00] We don't have any center, right party or movement in the country.

**John Larter:** Yeah.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, so I obviously, I put up a bit of resistance in relation to when I say or will I go it, the fit just wasn't there.

**Elaine Mullaly:** I was working very, very hard. But we, we, the party needed more courage, needed to stand up more, and particularly around areas of immigration, which was, which was a huge concern to me at the time. So I left independent Ireland. Um, there's some very good people, and by the way, I have to say that, and I ran as an independent candidate in the general election in November of 2024.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, I didn't get elected, but as a first time candidate and as an independent, I, I did extremely well and I really haven't stopped since then. I was, um, one of the organizers or, you know, very heavily involved in the Spoil the Vote campaign. Uh, last year for the presidential election, not sure if, if you guys know, but our government set the whole presidential election up last year.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So there was absolutely no conservative [00:05:00] right-leaning, um, candidate in the race at all. They, they, it was originally left, left, and far left. Um, but then one of the, one of the parties ended up with egg on their face because their candidate, fina fault candidate had so much baggage that he had to pull out a race.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So we were left with a al candidate and a far, the, the, the left, the, the left, all aligned themselves and put and got a candidate on the ballot. So we. We had no choice. We had absolutely no choice. So we started a campaign, it was called Spoil the Vote. We got 213,000 people in Ireland to come out and spoil the vote in the presidential election, sending a very clear signal back to government.

**Elaine Mullaly:** I believe it was the highest ever spoil the vote in Europe. And the second highest, highest ever spoil the vote globally. So that was last year. And. Bring you up to date. I'm now involved or have been very active with the protests, uh, that, that have been going on over the last couple of weeks.

**Graham Hood:** Wow. That's that's great.

**Graham Hood:** And, uh, you know, John, everything that, uh, Elaine is telling us about Ireland we're experiencing here, isn't it? It's all from the same playbook.

**John Larter:** Yeah, a hundred percent. It is. Uh, but it sounds as though there's a lot more, uh, boots on the ground there actually getting, uh. Getting involved, uh, in the, uh, in the protest space, which is completely different here.

**John Larter:** You know, I, I think to be honest, uh, you know, there's probably been one really significant event and everything else has just sort of not really, uh, not really, uh, had an impact.

**Graham Hood:** Mm-hmm. Yeah. Yeah. So, um, you know, obviously our, our protest movement out here started, started around the, uh, vaccine mandates.

**Graham Hood:** And, uh, and, um, you know, people were, people were being locked down and, and it was terrible. I mean, the city of Melbourne, uh, second largest city in Australia was locked down for almost, what, three [00:07:00] quarters of a year. I mean, it was just bizarre. Mm. And some of the rules that we saw, so that got, uh, people like John and I fired up in what we are doing.

**Graham Hood:** And, uh, and, and from there, it's been one thing after another. And now the people who slept through the COVID era. Now starting to wake up, uh, when they're looking at digital ID and central bank digital currency, uh, the renewable energies, um, debacle that's going on here, and all the other things that are happening around transgenderism and in other words, the, the woke left agenda.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Hmm.

**Graham Hood:** Um, has it been a similar trend over there? I mean, what, what have been the triggers and what is the main thrust of what you guys are doing at the moment?

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, look very similar. Like you say, we're experiencing the same thing. It is a global playbook. Uh, back in the COVID era, um, again, I would've been quite active.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, I would've been vocalizing my points. We had, Ireland had some of the, the longest lockdowns and the, and the harshest, some of the severest, uh, with two [00:08:00] years of in and out of lockdowns. It was, it was tiring. Um, but our government very successfully were able to manage any protests around that by implementing a five kilometer rule.

**Elaine Mullaly:** You weren't allowed leave your house, you weren't allowed go beyond five kilometers of your home, which meant that you couldn't go up to

Dublin to protest. There were protests organized, but. Um, you weren't supposed to be go to them because you weren't supposed to be allowed to leave your house. So they managed all of that.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And then there was a, there was a big protest, uh, which was planned in, um, St. Patrick's Day of 2021, and the government put a ring of steel around the city and stopped people coming in. From all over the country. They shut down trains, they shut down buses. They put blockages, blockages on roads to stop people coming in.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So it was a very strong effort to put in back then to stop any protesting. It kind of worked 'cause I think people lost heart. Then it was kind of like, well, what's the point? Because we can't get in. Or, you know, they, [00:09:00] they don't seem to have the same effect. Um, and. I would've been working at the time as well with some very, very brave and courageous doctors, Irish doctors who weren't afraid to speak up about the, the harms that the vaccines could potentially do.

**Elaine Mullaly:** 'cause remember, we didn't know at the time how harmful they were or weren't going to be. Uh, we created video help myself and a friend of mine had create videos on. The harms that masks can do for children and the harms that the potential harms of these vaccines could cause to children. We were trying to encourage parents not to let their children get vaccinated because there was such a push on here.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, so then bringing that forward, the whole transgender. That's been pushed in in our schools. Um, our children now receive, uh, free school books, and the school books stay in school. But some teachers have flagged that these books are just inappropriate for young children, [00:10:00] and they're very much trying to push the whole trans agenda.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And in fact. Our, uh, tea Shock. The leader of Ireland came out yesterday and was asked a direct question, do you believe there's such thing as a transgender, transgender child? And he said, yes, of course there is. And he doesn't want any debate around it. The issue. Uh, I, I can send you guys on the, the video it's doing, it's getting a lot of publicity, uh, basically on social media because our mainstream media are probably like every other media in the country, they're bought and paid for by government.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So they won't challenge, they won't question, and they won't report on what is really going on in Ireland. So we're probably experiencing very much the same thing as, as, as a lot of other countries. Um. It feels as

though Ireland is a Petri dish because we're an island off Europe. Um, and it's very easy.

**Elaine Mullaly:** The Irish [00:11:00] government are really suckered into what's happening with the European parliament. The Irish will take the, the presidency of the European Council in July on the 1st of July this year for six months. They want to be the best boys in class. And they also are pushing extremely hard at bringing in the digital id using children as a means of doing that.

**Elaine Mullaly:** They're saying, well, we need to protect under 16 year olds online because, um, you know, they don't, we need to verify their age. We need to verify they, their, their, they are who they say they are. So for their safety, we're going to bring this in. And they currently have a trial. Going on in in Ireland at the moment on using digital wallet.

**Graham Hood:** Same thing going on here, Elaine. Exactly the same thing. Exactly. And we, we've been feeling like a Petri dish as well. As I said, Melbourne was the most locked down city in the world. Unbelievable. Johnny

**John Larter:** Elaine, uh, [00:12:00] Ireland, obviously no stranger to, uh, internal unrest, uh, around numerous issues and, uh, and conflict over many years.

**John Larter:** Do, do you think that the current state of, uh, play this, uh. Is what I view as the worst, uh, era since Nazi Germany, uh, I, I is, uh, is unifying Ireland in some respects, uh, to, to, to fight.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, you see, I would like, a lot of people would like to think that, but. Um, the, the party who would've always symbolized Uniting Ireland, um, hin Fe, uh, have proven to be very, very disappointing in recent years because while it looks like they want the Brits out, they want everybody else in and.

**Elaine Mullaly:** This is worrying because now we actually have no party that will stand up and say, you know, this is what we want. We, the, the fighting [00:13:00] Irish is a little bit of a myth because people are so dumbed down by technology and, um, you know, I suppose college, our, our third level institutions have become grounds for conditioning and programming our, the next generation.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, so that that has all, there's all different factors and I believe COVID has caused harm, as in, I believe that what the government did during the two years, that suppression and, and that overreach into people's lives, um, and pushing people back into their homes, uh, cutting off all social interaction.

**Elaine Mullaly:** After doing an awful lot of damage, there's, there's young people now who, who probably, who, who will be, they've become much more comfortable in their own homes. They don't want to be out socializing the, so unless you're a big, heavy, a drinker, um. You're not going to go out much. Uh, there's not many places really for them to mix, but the, the older [00:14:00] generation have been pushed back into their homes that they don't, they get mass online now, and it, the, the, the country has changed.

**Elaine Mullaly:** It's changed so much in six years that it's almost unrecognizable. And that's not to mention the actual physical aspect of the mass immigration that we're after witnessing. Um, I, I just think. You know, there's a, there, there's a boiling point here, bubbling at the moment, but we, I don't think we've actually reached boiling point.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, and I think what happened in the protest recently, it was called a fuel protest. But let's be honest, it's much bigger than that. It's, people are just fed up of, of the government not being answerable to us, to squandering billions of our taxpayers money, um, without any accountability, without any. They don't even have to tell us what they're spending it on.

**Elaine Mullaly:** It's just been flittered away. And yet our own people are struggling to heat our homes and to put food on our tables. Um, you know, everything's gone through the roof and the [00:15:00] government just keep, keeps seeing to want to be taken more and more money. And there's less and less in our pockets. And I don't think people want handouts.

**Elaine Mullaly:** I think we just want to do it is work and not be absolutely crucified in taxes. Exactly.

**Graham Hood:** Exactly. So what, what's the, the main driver of the current protest over there? What's the agenda that's getting everyone out?

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, it kind of presented itself as, um, as a fuel pro crisis protest. And I'd say one of the reasons it had to pretend pre present itself is that, is because the Irish government and media don't really like protests.

**Elaine Mullaly:** They, they'll say it's, it's a democratic right, and everybody's entitled to a peaceful protest, but they do everything in their power to shut them down. And they also do a lot of, uh, damage. They put, um. I'm gonna say fake people, but they put their own people into cause to cause obstructions and to create this sense of, [00:16:00] um, violence, shall we say it.

**Elaine Mullaly:** That's, it's, it's not coming from us. And then they're painting pictures of far right, calling everybody far right, and all of that. So there, this is bubbled up because the Irish, the haulers, the farmers, the construction workers, um, and many other small businesses. Our running out of. Ways to keep ourselves alive.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And the, there was a meeting organized. We do have an Irish Farmer's Association and an Irish Road Haulage Association. Both associations are basically controlled by government, so they're, they're, they're being well looked after and they're going in and they're negotiating on behalf of all of these people.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And they're negotiating on behalf of all of them. But yet, there's the, the people that they're supposed to be negotiating for are not seeing any benefits to what's been offered, like. 10% of a liter of green diesel is, is, is nothing to these people when they're pe. When the government are taking 65% [00:17:00] of every Euro that we spend here on petrol diesel, the government take 65% out of that.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Do we have an excise duty? We have carbon tax, we have a Nora tax. We've gotten better energy tax. We've got that at 23%, so they're absolutely screwing us. 23% of

**John Larter:** that

**Elaine Mullaly:** 23% va. That's after all those other taxes that I mentioned. Wow. So that's how they're taking 65% out of every liter. So the problem can be solved very quickly if they really want to, but they don't want to.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So their answer is, oh, let's give you a, a, a VAT rebate, which means that the, the haulers, et cetera, have to. They have to buy their produce upfront and then wait and get the VA back at some point from the government. Some people apply for it, some don't. It's, it depends on the holier. It doesn't apply to all holers either.

**Elaine Mullaly:** It only applies to, I think, commercial international ones with licenses. [00:18:00] So. There it was present. So, so the, the, the first meeting that I was at was the, the biggest meeting, and that was in Port Leash where all the holers got together and they all discussed it. The holier construction workers, I call 'em Holers, but it's a much bigger bra, uh, group of people.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And they discussed what they were going to do and we need to get out and protest. And there was a couple of politicians in the room and they were of the mindset, no, no, no, we don't need to protest. Let's put a committee together. Let's go to government, let's give them two weeks and, and blah, blah, blah.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And somebody in the room stood up and said, I don't have two weeks. My business is gone in two weeks. We have to get out on the road now. So they went out the following week and you thought, well, I, I, I'm not sure if you did see what happened, but they brought the country to a standstill very peacefully.

**Elaine Mullaly:** There was absolutely no problem with ambulance, emergency services or anybody that had hospital appointments. Everybody got to their appointments. There was no, no, um, damage caused there. And [00:19:00] in the meantime, the media were getting were, were watching what was going on, and the government started to get very, very nervous.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Uh, so they called the Irish Hall Road College Association and the Irish Farmers Association back into a meeting on Sunday evening, which is unheard of. Um, it's hard enough to get our lads into the doll when they're supposed to be there. So to get them into a sitting when they weren't supposed to be there can show how under pressure they were, but.

**Elaine Mullaly:** They also did was all of these peaceful protestors at four o'clock on Sunday morning. The Guardi, the Riot Squad and the I and the Irish Army, all the Irish army didn't actively, they were just, they had tankers there. They didn't actively go in, but they were seen on different sites. But the Irish Guardi and the Irish right squad were brought in at four o'clock in the morning and they're terrified.

**Elaine Mullaly:** These men who are sleeping their cabs on O'Connell Street and in different places. And they terrified them and they basically [00:20:00] bullied them to get off the streets. That was the order that was given off the streets. The protestors were never going to, uh, resist. They always said that we're here, it's peaceful protests, we're making our stance.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And then that, that evening, so the Sunday evening, the IFA went in and the Irish Road Holvers Association went in and they took another offer. And then it looked like the. The protest was over 'cause the government had given this offer, that's not what happened. The protest was over because the, the, the protestors were literally bullied off the streets and, and told, get off, you know, we're gonna cause harm if you don't get off the streets.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Threatening that they were gonna to their machinery, which would've been destroyed, et cetera. So, um, it, it didn't end amicably or it didn't end with a deal. It ended with them being told to get off the streets. And as a result, it's not over. Like this is, this is not the end of what we've just seen. [00:21:00] Um, there is still an awful lot of unhappiness on anger, frustration, uh, and almost panic about what are we going to do next here.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, I was invited to a meeting on Monday evening, just gone in a small little village called Claw in County Offley. And this is a tiny little village and a little town hall. And it was jammed, jammed to capacity with people who had traveled from all over the country to see what's gonna happen next. And, um.

**Elaine Mullaly:** What is gonna happen next is that we just, we need to keep finding people who are not afraid to stand up, to speak out. Um, there will be elections coming up. People think there's gonna be a snap election. I, I can't see it, but in the next couple of years, there will be elections anyway. And the only way we are gonna make any change here is from the inside out.

**Elaine Mullaly:** It just, it's not happening from the outside in because the government [00:22:00] don't care.

**Graham Hood:** Are you seeing, um, are you seeing the police behaving in a way that you would never have expected 10 years ago?

**Elaine Mullaly:** Yeah. Yeah. I mean the, and by and large. Here, which are our, our, our police by and large, they're, you know, they're, they're, they're lovely people and like they have, they have families, they have mortgages, they have bills to pay.

**Elaine Mullaly:** They're under pressure themselves. So we kind of reckon that they weren't. The usual guards, you know, our own local guardee that were, that were, that were brought in, that they, they possibly brought them in from the north or somewhere were, were, they're not really sure because they were just so

heavy handed against these men who really were not going to be, they were of no threat to anybody, and they were never going to be a threat to anybody.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So, but yeah, we have seen, you know, you wouldn't expect the guardian are, are meant to uphold the [00:23:00] peace and, you know, protect the, to protect the people. Um, so it just, it felt like a little bit of a betrayal. But again, that's another tactic by government to cause division. They want us to, to. Not like our guardee and, and, and fall out with them and have this division.

**Elaine Mullaly:** But I think it's unnecessary. You know, I think, I think people are seeing true what's happening more and more. At least that's what I hope, uh, because a lot more people are talking to me about what's going on and they seem to, to know they can, they can detect it for themselves. I was yours trying to explain to people and now they're explaining it to me.

**Elaine Mullaly:** It means you're after getting through some way.

**John Larter:** Mm-hmm. Johnny

**Elaine Mullaly:** no.

**John Larter:** Elaine, uh, uh, whereabouts is, uh, island now, uh, post COVID. Uh, are, are you seeing people, uh, overwhelmingly getting sick? Um, how's the healthcare system have, have those that refused to [00:24:00] be vaccinated, gone back to work? Are the doctors still being punished?

**John Larter:** I mean, how do things look in Ireland?

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um. Well, there's no restrictions or, um, you know, you'd never really hear anybody talk about them much anymore. It's like it never happened, I think, to a lot of people. Um, but like the discrimination that I was shown at the time and people like me who chose not to take the vaccine.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, was like, I'll never forget it. And we weren't allowed to sit indoors. Uh, people were asked for their COVID certs everywhere they went. A lot of people, the majority of people who I speak to about this will tell me that they took the COVID vaccine because they had to, as in they felt they had to, uh, you couldn't travel without it.

**Elaine Mullaly:** You couldn't visit sick or elderly people without it. Our nursing homes or hospital staff, they all felt compelled to take it. There was a bully and a coercion [00:25:00] at the time that people had to take it. Um, now,

um, we see there has been. A massive surge in deaths. Um, there's a huge increase in stage four cancers presenting very, very quickly.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So it's not, people are not getting stage one and then stage two and developing, they're actually presenting with stage four. A lot of tumors, a lot of, um. Heart problems. Uh, there is a lot of people sick. Um, and, and I, again, I think that's partially why the fight may be gone outta people because they're trying to look after their own health and obviously get themselves back well again.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, but statistically, I, I wrote to the CSO, which is our central statistics office in 2021, and I asked him for a breakdown of how many people. [00:26:00] Who died in, who died in Ireland in 2020. So when there was no vaccine, how many people died with just COVID on their death certificate? And the answer was 61. So 61 people died with just COVID, who had no comorbidity, who weren't sick with anything else.

**Elaine Mullaly:** 61 people. So we locked down our country. We masked our children, we closed businesses, we closed our schools, we did all of that. And we know that the measures that they implemented are not effective. So why did they do all of that? It was a, a complete exercise, uh, for control. That's exactly why they did it.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, since 2021. We have seen excess debts over the five years of that since the, the vaccinations come in of approximately 25,000 [00:27:00] excess debts, um, over the, over the five years. It is actually, it is higher. But I'm err on side of caution here because obviously you'll have the media coming out and saying that's not true because our RIP or the the CSO say there was XR ip, IE.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Has been a website that's been used. It tracks all of the debts and, um. Well, sorry. The CSO will, will actually state that there's been excess debts, um, because they have to report, they have to give figures accurately, but they'll give different reasons for the excess debts. Um, but up to 2020. We had a consistent rate of death rate in Ireland, and, and if there was a, an increase, it was a couple of hundred, it dropped a couple of years.

**Elaine Mullaly:** It's not in, it's nothing like we're seeing now. Um, and there's an element of denial also at the moment. And people, there's still people will say, no, it has nothing to do with the vaccines.

**John Larter:** Mm-hmm.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Maybe it hasn't, but you know, [00:28:00] my eyes can only tell you what I see. And, and very, very few of these people who, who.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Pre 2020, um, very few of them had anything wrong with them, and now all of a sudden they're either dying very, very quickly or they're, they're quite ill. So it hasn't been a good few years to be, to be honest. Uh, seeing that has been harsh because a lot of us were, I was hoping I was very wrong about the damage that these vaccines could do.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So,

**John Larter:** well, we all were, weren't we?

**Graham Hood:** Yeah, we all were. Even, uh, even I think yesterday I saw an article, Sydney Morning Herald. It might've been, or anyhow, the Australian, I think of a, uh, leading oncologist in Queensland saying that, uh, he and his cohort are miffed at the increase in the number of young people presenting with stage four cancers, and they can't work out what's causing it.

**Graham Hood:** Uh. I mean, they're ruling out the vaccine, they're [00:29:00] ruling out mRNA technology every time. No, it's not mRNA, but we dunno what's causing it. Well, you know, for goodness sake, they've gotta, they've gotta stop pretending and actually examine the data. We presented reams and reams and hundreds of hours of expert testimony on this program.

**Graham Hood:** Uh, Sally from the Philippines, John, the, the, uh, the death data that she's correlating from. Bureaus of statistics from countries all over the world is showing the same trend, massive increases in deaths related to the period of the vaccinations and drops in birth. Yeah. And drops in birth. We're seeing, uh, countries like, um, Greece that are declining in population, uh, their government's really concerned about the fact that the birth rates have gone down and the death rates have gone up, and nobody can explain why.

**John Larter:** Mm-hmm.

**Graham Hood:** I mean. It just, it's staggering. Which is another reason why we, all of this silk need to keep presenting.

**John Larter:** Mm-hmm.

**Graham Hood:** We need to keep [00:30:00] presenting.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Well, we, we, we have, um, we have death rates gone up, birth, indigenous Irish, birth rates gone down, but our population is increasing because we have a mass immigration crisis in this country.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And

**John Larter:** they're

**Elaine Mullaly:** not coming

**John Larter:** from Greece.

**Elaine Mullaly:** No, they're not coming from Greece. Um, and I'm, I I, I would say we have a similar crisis in relation to a mass immigration crisis. I, we, we we're losing a serious amount of our own, uh, highly educated. Um, you know, experienced intelligent workforce. Um, I, I've lo my, my eldest girl, 22, she's had to move to find a job and live independently.

**Elaine Mullaly:** She's no longer living in Ireland. Um, because she could not, it was impossible. She could find a job, but she couldn't afford to move out. And there's, there's, there's over three quarters of a million of adult children. I say children, they're adults who are still living at home with parents because they [00:31:00] can't move out.

**Elaine Mullaly:** There is no accommodation here. There's just nowhere to rent. There's nowhere to buy. Um, you know, greedy landlords and vulture funds have the, the whole country is destroyed. Um, so we're,

**John Larter:** but governments keep bringing them in. I mean, the same thing's happening here. Uh, we've got veterans sleeping in cars, uh, and under bridges, uh, in, in zero degree temperatures, but, uh, they just keep flowing through the doors.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Yeah, and I, so, sorry. Just something I'm interested to ask you guys is, it's so strict for our children to go to move to Australia. We had, there's all these guidelines and they have to have, it's strict and it should be, but how are, how are others able to bypass? That

**Graham Hood:** depends where you come from.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Ah, okay.

**Graham Hood:** If you, if you're, if you're from the subcontinent from India or Pakistan, you'll have no trouble at all. [00:32:00] No trouble at all,

**John Larter:** and especially if you've already got a relative here. Uh, and they love the labor, the labor government loves moving these, uh, these people into, uh, electorates where they, uh, where they can support the voting process Very early.

**John Larter:** Uh, in fact, they're indoctrinated, in fact, encouraged, uh, bribed, I dunno what you want to call it. It's corrupt. The holding's corrupt. Uh, they end up going and, uh, living in these, uh, in these marginal, uh, seats. And, uh, uh, you know, they're, they're essentially, uh, you know, told, you know, you need to keep voting labor.

**John Larter:** Uh, we're the ones that got you here.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Mm-hmm.

**Graham Hood:** Look, I, I, I've got a, um, my wife and I have a very dear friend who lives in Norwich, in, uh, Britain, in England. Um, and, uh, Nadine, I know you watch these programs, so we're thinking of your sweetheart and you're in our prayers. Believe me. Uh, she's living with her elderly [00:33:00] mother, and obviously not all of the UK or, or, uh, or, or Great Britain itself is suffering crime waves.

**Graham Hood:** It seems to be in pockets. But in Norwich, if they're not locked in their house by three in the afternoon, they live in fear. They absolutely live in fear of home invasion and, uh, not being able to walk on the streets as women. Um, are there pockets of island where there are those concerns as well, or is that just being overstated by some?

**Elaine Mullaly:** No, it's, it's true. There's a, there's a video recently of, um, of dokey, I think in Dublin, one of the parts of Dublin. Anyway, it's near the beach and. There was, um, definitely there were, uh, migrant men who were all like literally beating the heads off each other with sticks and belts and all sorts of, uh, that was on Monday evening, one of the first nice days we happened to have here this year.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And people were terrified to go out because, um, if you get caught in the crossfire, [00:34:00] um, and. Back a few years ago, we had the murder of Ling Murphy, um, not far from where I live. Uh, she, it's only a, a 20 minute drive to Tmore. A teacher, a beautiful lady who was savagely killed, um,

by a man who was living here for, for years, never worked, never did anything, but he was a migrant.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And we've had a lot more. There's, there's actually too many at this point for, to keep ignoring it. Um, and, and that, you know, violence is one thing, but two days ago we, I read a report of a Nigerian man who's living in the uk who's flying to Ireland every week for his social welfare payment. Um, he has seven children and he had.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Managed to, through use of ai, he managed to apply, successfully apply for 145 credit [00:35:00] cards, uh, which at, at a cost of 804,000 euro to a banking institute. And he was in, up in court. So he, he's, after doing all of this, he's after scamming the Irish State. That's my taxpayer's money. That's my money. He's, he's Cameron.

**Elaine Mullaly:** He's after getting 800, 4,000 euros out of banking institutes. There's other petty crimes there. But to really add insults to injury to the Irish people, when these people get caught and then they go into our court system, they're entitled to, if they don't speak English, they're entitled to an interpreter, which we're paying for, and they're entitled to free legal aid.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Legal. So we get nothing. And, and when they come here and break the law, they get, they're still getting it. It just makes no sense. But our, our towns and our communities are not safe. Uh, my town, we've seen a massive influx. It's a small town population of about 8,000 people. Um, we have seen a massive influx.[00:36:00]

**Elaine Mullaly:** The data around all of this is, is, is. Purposefully not available. So if we ask any questions, you're not allowed to ask questions around ethnic ity or race or anything like that. That's a no go area. You know, don't be asking questions like that. How many people, how many would be getting our social housing?

**Elaine Mullaly:** There's, there's people in this town on, on social housing list for years, uh, who have a legitimate claim to housing and they're being bypassed. By people who are coming out of asylum centers because they're put onto the, once you get, once you're granted asylum, you're put onto the housing list. So they have all, we don't know how many people are actually living in our communities.

**Elaine Mullaly:** The one thing we do know is that our government made a conscious decision not to up the security in relation to these men, mainly men

coming here. So they, there was, there's thousands of people, the government themselves have [00:37:00] said about 80% of people who came here seeking asylum have no right to seek asylum.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So they're what we would call illegal immigrants, 80% of them. But the problem is, is that we don't know who those people are or where they are because they came in with no documentation. 'cause our government let them,

**Elaine Mullaly:** it sounds like a bad joke, but it's true.

**Graham Hood:** The one thing we are fortunate is the tyranny of distance works in our favor. There we were getting, uh, quite a few illegal immigrants coming, uh, across from Indonesia, uh, from Afghanistan and, and places in the Middle East. Uh, but that's largely being cut off now, so we don't have the close borders like you have in Europe.

**Graham Hood:** And we see, we watch, we watch in horror the number of people who are just walking up the beach and getting all the assistance they need. Um, it's just absolutely bizarre. But have you got, um, any idea what the next month or so is looking like in Ireland around the [00:38:00] protest? Uh, sure. Everyone's been sort of pushed back a little.

**Graham Hood:** What's gonna happen next? What's your next move?

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, well, because we're heading into a very busy season for all the construction and. Farmers. Um, we've had a particularly bad winter, weather-wise January and February and well into March. We're pretty wet. Um, they literally have to make hay while the sun shines, so they have to start getting onto their back to work and do their, their farming, et cetera.

**Elaine Mullaly:** So. It's kind of at the moment, uh, there, it, it feels like there's a, there's gonna be an awful lot more meetings on the ground. We need to go back to grassroots and connect the people who are genuinely concerned. Who are not afraid to speak about that concern. So in other words, not the ones who are talking behind closed doors or whispering in your ear when you're going by, you're doing great work.

**Elaine Mullaly:** It's the ones who are actually prepared to stand [00:39:00] up and say what needs to be said. And like the worst thing that's going to happen here is that you're going to get called far right? Um, and the term far right,

where that's come about is. The centrist government parties as you that they call themselves, they've gone so left, far.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Left,

**Graham Hood:** yeah.

**Elaine Mullaly:** That our centrist are now being labeled as far Right. But we're not, we're not, we're we're common sense, you know, concerned people that have our eyes open and we can see what's happening and we're not being bulldozed, we're not being told, you know, you, you can't. It's the same as. You can't convince me if, if you told me in the morning you want wanted me to call you Greta, I'd say, fine, I'll respect, I'll call you Greta, but if you asked me to refer to you as a woman, I can't do that.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And the government are trying to do that with us. Tell us, this is what is your [00:40:00] experience? This is what's going on in the country, but we know it's not. Everybody knows it's not. That's the problem, is that you can't convince people who can see things exactly as they are. So we need more of those people to step forward.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, you know, we're, we're all highly contactable. On our social media there, there's, there's a good group of people. Um, we actually, there's a four of us who do a weekly podcast. It's called The Irish Question. Um, we've only started this in early January, and one of the aims of that is to highlight what's, you know, what is actually going on in politics in Ireland, and to question what's going on in Irish politics in Ireland, but also for people to find somewhere.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Like an umbrella where they can come to and, and possibly run for the next elections under the, the kind of the whole movement of stand up and question stand up and challenge. We're not doing enough of it, so do it a bit more and. So there's, [00:41:00] there's a whole lot of things happening. There's also going to be a big push on the universal social charge, which was a, a, a credit that was, um, a tax that was brought in as a temporary measure many years ago.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And that was never brought back out. So, you know, the way government bring in all these taxes and they say they're temporary and they never go, they never get rid of them. So we're like, there's gonna have to be some kind of a push done on this. Um, there's a whole lot of little things

happening, but, but they're all going to, at some point join together and, and become stronger.

**Elaine Mullaly:** And that's gonna happen. As more and more and more people are actually getting more and more and more fed up. There's a mentality. Here I am. All right, Jack. And that all right, Jack, uh, cohort of people are not all right anymore.

**Graham Hood:** No,

**Elaine Mullaly:** and that's, that's what's happening. That's what's happening. So that's

**Graham Hood:** what's happening here.

**Graham Hood:** It's happening in New Zealand as well, Canada as well.  
[00:42:00] Um, we're, we're seeing a lot of, a lot of people opening up to that prospect, but. What's it like in your awakening community there as far as, uh, unity is there, is there division and infighting amongst those people who are waking up?

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, I think yes, you're gonna get that in every community and you know, there's, there's, there's different extremities of, of what people are prepared to talk about and there's different rabbit holes that people are willing to go down.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, my. My main concern is the future of Ireland. In relation to housing, mass, immigration, um, accountability, all of that end of stuff. I know there's other things going on in the world and we all do. And it is a case of, well, which battle do I want to fight and which battle is, is it important for us to solve first?

**Elaine Mullaly:** And uh, whereas others just want to get into everything and  
[00:43:00] they, the division kind of comes because there's a frustration around, yes, but what about this? And I'm kinda going, yeah, that, you know, that's there. But that's another ba it's a fight for another day. So we need to, um, I think we all need to swallow our ego here and work together and put everything to one side for the sake of the future of Ireland, and in your case, probably Australia and New Zealand and whatever, wherever else.

**Elaine Mullaly:** But we just need to come together, forget our differences. They can't be. If, if we can agree on 80% of of what we want, then that's

enough, because don't forget, the left are all aligning with one another and they, they don't agree with half of what each other wants. So if they can do that and they can form that alliance and that allegiance to one another, we should be, we've, we're more than capable of doing it.

**Elaine Mullaly:** We just need more egos swallowed [00:44:00] and more people stepping forward and saying, I'm willing to overlook that there's, there's actually. There's nobody in this country that I won't work with, nobody. I will sit down and talk to anybody who wants the freedoms that I want, who wants to retain those freedoms. I will sit down and talk to any of them,

**Graham Hood:** but just, this is so global, Johnny, isn't it?

**Graham Hood:** Because everything that Elaine is describing is identical to what's happening in Australia. Even the the division amongst the, the awakening people. Um, it's all about agendas and egos and all that sort of stuff, which has been a constant battle. Mm-hmm. Um, you know, we spent a lot of time pulling knives out of our back from people on our own side, in our own trench, and it, and it would just be so much easier and, and, uh, we would achieve so much more if we, if we just decided who the enemy was and focused on them and not on each other, uh, that would be amazing.

**Graham Hood:** So we're seeing all of that happening. Everything is identical. Have you got any more [00:45:00] questions for us?

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, I suppose like how do you guys see, uh, your country turning back around? What's it gonna take and, and is it possible? Have we gone too late,

**Graham Hood:** Johnny?

**John Larter:** Oh, I don't think it's too late. Uh, I, I, I, I think one of the, uh, really important things to, um.

**John Larter:** To do in, in, in the, in the short term is to, is to try and get people in the mainstream media to actually tell the stories. Because I, I think once that happens, um, you know, we, we could see a turnaround in, in all this, uh, the, there's already massive, um, um, sentiment, uh, uh, um, negative sentiment towards the government, uh, that, that we haven't seen.

**John Larter:** Um, I was surprised that they weren't tipped out at the last election, but. Um, I think hoodie and I have said that, you know, people just

haven't suffered enough. Uh, they, they need to, you know, be, [00:46:00] be piled into the dirt a bit longer, uh, to actually wake up, uh, to what's going on. And that seems to be the playbook around the world.

**John Larter:** These, these, these successive uh, governments just seem to be continually elected by people that you just think, what, what are you doing? You know, these people are the problem. They need to be. Thrown out. Uh, and, and we're seeing a rise of, uh, support for politicians in Australia that are, that are by and large telling the truth and calling it as it as it is.

**John Larter:** But I do really think that, that, um, I. That key is to, is to get that story of what's gone on that the, the, the dreadful stories of, uh, those injured by the vaccine, those horrific stories, those of lost, lost family members that were punished during that COVID period. That those horrific stories, uh, are similar to what occurred in, uh, the Nuremberg trials, et cetera.

**John Larter:** That that needs to be exposed. And I, and I think until people have a [00:47:00] real. Understanding of what's gone on and, and the, and the gravity of the situation that's here. I mean, people are only just realizing that thalidomide was bad, believe it or not. I mean, uh, and, and that's 50 years ago. So there's hope.

**John Larter:** There's hope, but I think we just have to keep, uh, you know, tapping away and, uh, you know, we try and do that. I mean, I, I was having regular conversations with a, with a guy, uh, Rick Munn, uh, in, uh, island on t and t Radio. Uh, with Steve Kelly, we, we were, uh, a guest on his program telling the people in Ireland what was actually happening in Australia, and he couldn't believe it.

**John Larter:** I mean, he, he, he was just a, a gast at what, what was going on here.

**Graham Hood:** Yeah.

**John Larter:** Um, so, you know, it's funny, isn't it, that you can, you can have, uh, those, those conversations, uh, you know, halfway around the world, but, uh, sometimes they're more difficult to have in your own country.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Yeah.

**Graham Hood:** Yeah. I'm of the opinion that, um.

**Graham Hood:** The more my wife and I have done a lot [00:48:00] of extensive touring around the country, talking to communities and encouraging communities to build strong networks at a local grassroots level. I think, I think the battle is gonna be won at the grassroots, and that needs to be really encouraged. And we've seen local community groups set up that look after each other.

**Graham Hood:** They're, they're setting up bartering systems and alternative ways of living without. This overarching government, and we're all, we're all preparing for the day when everything just collapses and how are we gonna survive? And I think those who are gathering together in their communities now and working through how they're gonna manage that are in a much better mental state.

**Graham Hood:** Because I think I, I said the other day to somebody, if Australia was one person, a person, it would be in the psych ward. Australia is suffering from incredible anxiety. Uh, people are spending too much time down rabbit holes. Uh, they're living in the darkness and they're mining for evil. Uh, it's been a big thing for me for a long time.

**Graham Hood:** I've [00:49:00] seen rational, uh, normally healthy people so bogged down in the evil that's going on around the world. And that is a self-fulfilling prophecy because the one thing evil thrives on is fear and anxiety. And so, you know, we encourage people on the program, you know, we'll say to them, don't at the end of the show, don't forget what you did yesterday.

**Graham Hood:** Got you to today. Uh, you've given away so much to a government that wants to take, take, take. Don't let them have your serenity. Don't let them have your peace. Get out and enjoy your country. Island is a beautiful country. Australia is a beautiful country, so we really need to look after our mental health and we nearly, we must keep the fight going.

**Graham Hood:** Um, and I, I'm of a personal belief that, uh, one protest after another is not achieving anything but negativity because the more we front up at a well-publicized protest, or the more of those we put up that aren't well attended, it just sends a wrong message to governments and those people we're fighting against that.

**Graham Hood:** We've lost our [00:50:00] ticket, we've lost our will. And um, so I think we need to totally re-strategize and part of that. For John and I has always been, we've gotta get outside the bubble. We have to be, we have to present reasonable, rational, disciplined arguments. We have to stay focused in

order to break out into the mainstream so we can get into the living rooms of those people who are still asleep.

**Graham Hood:** And I think that's how we see change. We've gotta get the tipping point. We've gotta get closer to the tipping point. And I think that's global. I don't think that's just Australia.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Yeah, I, I agree. I think that we are, if, again, focused, keep the, keep the dialogue so that people can relate. Um, I speak to people regularly and they would all, I, I try and meet them where they are because I saw what happened in 2020 when I first saw that.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Vision, the image that came [00:51:00] from Wuhan in China of somebody lying down dead on the street. And I said, oh my God, what we're gonna experience in this country is going to be horrendous. Yeah. I di didn't think it was going to be as bad as it was, but I knew that the, the intention was going to be to really, really put the fear in people.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Mm. So I've been, I've been awake since then, and it's a case of, um, not everybody is on our wavelength. Um, I respect them. I respect people who took the vaccine because they were bullied. They were coerced. Yeah, they were lied to. There was all sorts going on, and, and a lot of those people wish they hadn't.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Um, so we just really need to keep working with them and they're now awake and that's the most important thing. And, um. And all the other rabbit holes. I just think we need them for another day. We don't need them at the moment. We need to focus and just, there's that much been thrown at us. You know, you're, you're, sometimes I see [00:52:00] myself standing with a baseball bat and it's like, right, what am I gonna hit today?

**Elaine Mullaly:** It's, but we, it's, it's that concentration and it's that focus that's, that's gonna win through on this. And I do believe that good will always win over evil. That's, that was with me from a child, a little fairytale that, that I hold in my heart. And, um, and I do believe that that's, that we're at, we're at that point in, in, in history where, where we're the good people and we're on the right side of history.

**Graham Hood:** Yeah. Well it is a battle between good and evil. There's no doubt about that. And I think that's a perfect segue to, um, bring this to a close with a prayer.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Mm-hmm.

**Graham Hood:** So let's do that, shall we? Um, dear Lord, father in heaven, we pray for our nations. We pray for its people, we pray for its leaders, even those who are at odds with what we're trying to achieve, Lord, because we need them to be strong.

**Graham Hood:** We need them to listen to the people. We need them to read the room, and they're not reading the room, father. [00:53:00] So we pray for leaders that really wish to lead for the right reasons, for the right people. Father God, we know there's an evil agenda and most people it, it isn't being hidden anymore, yet most people look at it and say, no, they wouldn't do that.

**Graham Hood:** They don't realize just how dark and evil this stuff is getting. So we just pray for the people of Ireland, the people of Australia, the people of the world who are waking up to the level of this battle between good and evil, that they'll be strengthened with the Holy Spirit and that they will stand convicted in their faith.

**Graham Hood:** They will stand as true. To their conscience as the needle is to the pole. So Father, we, we need courage. We need wisdom, we need compassion. We need mercy, and we need grace, and we need it all in abundance. So please grant those to us, to us now as our prayer and your precious name, Lord. And we ask you to, to be with, uh, Elaine and her family and strengthen them and surround them with safety.

**Graham Hood:** In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

**John Larter:** Amen. [00:54:00]

**Graham Hood:** Thanks for, for coming on, Elaine. We'd love to get you back and, and please feel free to update us, uh, with what's going on over there. And we'd love to get you back on air whenever you want to. So.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Brilliant. I'd love that. Absolute.

**John Larter:** He was, he wasn't too bad alone. I thought he was gonna have a bit of PTSD there halfway through with your, uh, Irish accent.

**John Larter:** Given his old boss,

**Elaine Mullaly:** he hung in there. Well, all right.

**Graham Hood:** Oh, I tell you

**Elaine Mullaly:** what I was gonna say, top of the morning to you, but it's not, it's evening time. Probably morning.

**Graham Hood:** Yeah. He said, he said to me once, I think you're mentally ill. I think you are. Um, yeah, I, but I'm still here. I dunno where he is. He's, uh, he's slipped off the perch somewhere.

**Graham Hood:** If you're watching Alan Joyce still love you, mate. Remember you fondly, God love you. You know, doesn't a torch around the head with a selli wouldn't do.

**Elaine Mullaly:** 30 tree and a turd

**Graham Hood:** Turkey tree and a turd. Oh, [00:55:00] Johnny Latty, you've often been hate to say.

**John Larter:** Just couldn't make this stuff up.

**Graham Hood:** You couldn't make this stuff up.

**Graham Hood:** Uh, God Love Ireland. God love you all who are watching this program. And don't forget Australia, what you did yesterday got you to today. Just keep doing it, keep sharing it and stay calm, positive, and, uh, focused. We will get through this one way or the other. Make sure you make decisions that put you on the right side of history.

**Graham Hood:** God bless you, and we'll see you next time when we come back for another great interview and we've got a mass of them being lined up. Suzanne is actually struggling to fit him in. John, we're gonna be in for a busy period. Uh, so some great things happening. God bless you, you we'll see you next time on Club Grubby.

**Graham Hood:** Bye for now.

**Elaine Mullaly:** Bye mate.
